Artist Spotlight:

MARY SIMS

Mary Sims, 1940-2004—a celebrated Memphis artist—was known for her exceptional, stylized paintings that seamlessly blended real and imagined worlds. Devoting countless hours each day to her studio, she built an extensive and diverse body of work over the course of her career, including landscapes, whimsical still lifes, captivating portraits, and rich narrative scenes.

Mary made history as the first woman admitted to the printmaking department at the University of Iowa, where she earned her BFA. She continued her studies in Rome and later completed her MFA at Tulane University. From the late 1960s through the early 1970s, she shared her knowledge and passion as a faculty member at Southwestern, now Rhodes College. After her teaching tenure, Mary focused exclusively on her studio practice and painting.

Her masterful use of scale and vibrant color palettes imbued her works with a mesmerizing, dreamlike quality—captivating and enchanting all who encountered them. Today, Mary Sims's work is not only beloved by local Memphians but also held in major public and private collections across the country.

Garden Club of America Rules


1. Please carefully read and follow Garden Club of Amerca Flower Show Rules, General Information, and Division Guidelines. All rules as stated in The Garden Club of America Flower Show and Judging Guide (FS & JG), 2024 Edition, shall apply. All plant material must be correctly identified with the botanical and common names, if possible. Accepted references for nomenclature are:

- a. Missouri Botanical Garden Plant Finder at https://www.missouribotanicalgarden.org/plantfinder/plantfindersearch.aspx
- b. Royal Horticultural Society Find a Plant at https://www.rhs.org.uk/plants/search-Form
- c. GCA Flower Show Committee Botanical Nomenclature
- 2. The Garden Club of America expects all exhibitors to be aware of the need to promote the conservation of endangered and threatened plants. Plants collected in the wild and listed by the Tennessee Natural Heritage Program may not be exhibited in any flower show sponsored by a GCA club. Cultivated plant material listed by Tennessee's Natural Heritage Program may be exhibited if accompanied by a typed card stating that it has not been collected from the wild or that it was collected out-of-state and giving information concerning its cultural requirements and methods of propagation. Natural Heritage Program lists of endangered plant material will be available before and during the show from the division chairs and are available online by searching the Tennessee endangered plant list.
- 3. Plant material showing evidence of insects or disease must be removed immediately from the exhibition area. This rule will be enforced at any time during the show, whenever the problem is identified.
- 4. Use of the following items is not permitted in Floral Design, Horticulture, Botanical Arts, and Specialty Class of Needle Arts: locally endangered or invasive plants, diseased plant material, artificial plant material, live animals of any kind, taxidermy, natural birds' nests, feathers of any kind, coral, hooves, horns, fur, hair (except wool), shells (sea, turtle, egg, etc.) The Photography Division is exempt from this rule, but all photographs must show respect for the natural world and be taken in an ethically responsible way. Information on invasive plants is available online at https://www.tnipc.org.

Memphis Garden Club Rules & General Information



- Entries are open to all GCA club members, including provisionals, and professionals in their disciplines, except as noted in the schedule. Classes are only open to GCA members with the exception of Horticulture Classes: 136-137 Family Classes.
- 2. All designs must be the original work of the exhibitor(s). Although techniques and components may be inspired by other designs, the application of the techniques and components must create an original design that is distinct from the inspiration.
- 3. Registration is required for all classes, with the exception of those in the Horticulture Division that are weather-dependent (cut specimens, etc.).
- 4. Classes will be filled in the order registration forms are received according to the postmark/email date and time.
- 5. Entering a show constitutes permission to use images of the exhibitor's work in all GCA channels of communication.
- 6. While The Garden Club of America, The Memphis Garden Club, and The Dixon Gallery and Gardens will exercise due caution in safeguarding exhibits, responsibility for damage, loss, or personal injury cannot be assumed.
- 7. Any clarification or change in the rules, as originally stated in the schedule, shall be communicated promptly in writing by the division chairs to all exhibitors in the class and, at the show, to the judges and the passing committee.
- 8. An entry card must accompany each entry. Entry cards will be available at the show and upon request from the registration or division chairs in advance of the show. Information required on the entry card must be completed in black waterproof medium. If a sample or key card will be displayed with the entry, it is acceptable to write "See Key card" in lieu of listing plant material on the entry card.
- 9. The passing committee must pass each entry before the exhibitor(s) may leave the show area. The passing committee reserves the right to refuse any entry that does not conform to the rules of the schedule. The exhibitor has the option of correcting the entry if time permits. If not corrected, the entry cannot be judged but may remain in place, marked "For Exhibit Only" with a brief, constructively worded statement explaining why it was not judged. Judges may not disqualify any entry passed by the passing committee unless insect infestation or disease is evident.



- 11. Only participating judges and clerks will be allowed on the show floor during judging. Flower Show and division chairs should remain nearby but off the show floor until needed.
- 12. Containers and accessories should be inconspicuously labeled with the exhibitor's

- 13. A novice is an exhibitor who has never won first place or GCA Special Award in the division entered at a GCA Major Flower Show or a Sanctioned non-GCA Major Flower Show. An exhibitor who has won first place or GCA Special Award in one division is still a novice in the other divisions. The exhibitor must be exhibiting alone to be eligible for the GCA Novice Award in any division including the Sandra Baylor Novice Floral Design Award. Novice award eligibility is marked on the entry card and confirmed at passing.
- 14. A statement of intent, if required by the class, must be submitted at the time of passing. The statement must be no more than 25 words, typed or printed in black waterproof medium on a 4" x 6" white unlined card.
- 15. All Judges' decisions are final.

16. All exhibits must remain in place and in show condition until fifteen minutes following the closing time of the show.

Dixon Gallery and Gardens Rules

- 1. Exhibitors should exercise extreme caution while working in the presence of irreplaceable works of art. Use of spray paint, paint and aerosols is not permitted inside the museum. Any use of glitter is prohibited.
- 2. Remember to look but not touch the artwork. Stay an arm's-length (12.5") away from all artwork.
- 3. Running is not permitted in the galleries.
- 4. Sketching is limited to pencils. Pens and markers are not permitted.
- Food, drinks and chewing gum are not allowed in the galleries.
- Backpacks and umbrellas are not allowed in the galleries and should be stored in the proper area upon arrival.
- 7. The Museum is not responsible for lost items.
- 8. Floral Design containers and buckets with minimal water will be permitted during installation.
- 9. Floral designs may not be misted or spritzed.
- 10. Cell phone use in the galleries should be kept to a minimum and operated in a manner that is not disturbing to other guests.
- 11. Flash photography is not permitted in the galleries. Only the official Dixon photographer may use flash cameras.
- 12. Be guiet and respectful of other visitors in the Museum.
- 13. Materials and supplies should not lean up against the walls of the galleries or lie on platforms where artwork is displayed. There should be at least 24" between exhibitors' supplies and artwork.
- 14. Pedestals are not to be moved or adjusted.
- 15. No outside boxwood is permitted in Dixon Gallery and Gardens. The Dixon is a Boxwood Trial Garden. Outside boxwood could possibly introduce the very contagious Boxwood Blight.

Division I: Floral Design Guidelines

- 1. Please carefully read and follow the GCA Rules, General Information, Dixon Gallery and Gardens Rules, and Timetable for exhibitors.
- 2. Registration for Floral Design opens at 9:00 a.m. CST on Monday, September 15, 2025 and will close as Classes are filled OR at midnight Monday, February 23, 2026. To register, do the following:
 - Email Floral Design Registrant, Catherine Stallings: ccstallings@bellsouth.net
 - · Include: name, GCA Club, phone number, and first & second entry number preference(s) (A confirmation email will be sent within 48 hours of receipt.)
- 3. An exhibitor is permitted only one entry per Class, but may enter more than one Class.
- 4. The exhibitor(s) under whose name(s) the entry has been registered must create and complete the design. All participants must be listed. Only listed exhibitors and show personnel may be on the show floor at the time of entry. An exhibitor must NOT leave until all of her entries are passed.
- 5. No more than two exhibitors may execute a design with the exception of Class 5. Entry forms should denote class preference in order.
- 6. If forced to withdraw, an exhibitor must notify the Registration Chair and Class Consultant, and find a substitute unless there is a waiting list for the Class.
- 7. All designs must be executed at the show; complex components requiring extensive time for construction may be prefabricated and assembled during the allowed installation time at the show.
- 8. All entries must include fresh and/or dried plant material. Fresh plant material must be in water or conditioned in such a way as to remain in pristine form while on exhibition. Rooted plant material is allowed provided no soil is attached. An organic response in the use of materials is encouraged. An entry not maintained in show condition may have its award removed.
- 9. Mechanics should not be visible unless they are an integral part of the design.
- 10. Anything not prohibited in the GCA Rules, Dixon Gallery and Gardens Rules, Floral Design Division Guidelines, or individual class descriptions is permitted.
- 11. Cut fruit and vegetables are not permitted. Food of any kind is not permitted. Fur, hair of any type, shells, or bones are not permitted: GCA Rules #4 and Dixon Gallery and Gardens Rules #1 and #5.

- 12. Accessories are permitted, unless otherwise stated in the Class description.
- 13. Entries will be staged on 40" x 15" x 15" pedestals painted antique white. Pedestal tops may be enlarged but no more than 5" in any direction due to space restrictions. Designs may not exceed 15" from the center of the pedestal in width or depth. No height restrictions apply. Pedestals will be appropriately placed by the Dixon curatorial staff. Pedestals may not be moved. Pedestals may have up to 1/2" variance from the size stated in the schedule. The designs will be viewed and judged from three sides.
- 14. Once pertinent wall paint colors have been determined by the Dixon curatorial staff, registrants will be notified by the Division Chair.
- 15. The ceiling height of all galleries is approximately 13 feet, except for the Residence Gallery, which is 10 1/2 feet and the Mallory Gallery, which is 9 feet. All galleries have a chair rail of approximately 34" from the floor except the Plough Gallery, which has no chair rail.

- 16. Upon request artwork will be emailed to exhibitor in jpeg form. Exhibitor(s) will also find the art published in the schedule. It is possible that the colors of the photographs in the schedule will not match the actual colors of the art in the show perfectly and the judges will be made aware of this.
- 17. A plant list with the botanical and common names along with a statement of intent should be entered using the entry form. The statement (must be no more than 25 words) should be submitted to: Catherine Stallings (ccstallings@bellsouth.net) by Monday, March 9, 2026. Entry forms may be found at memphisgardenclub.org.
- 18. Questions regarding Class requirements may be directed to the Class Consultant and/or the Division Chair.
- 19. For exhibitors wishing to ship materials in advance, the address is: Memphis Garden Club c/o Dixon Gallery and Gardens 4339 Park Avenue Memphis, TN 38117.
- 20. The amount of water in floral supply buckets must not exceed three inches in depth and two inches in squeeze bottles. Any additional water needed must be coordinated with the Dixon personnel.
- 21. No outside boxwood is permitted in Dixon Gallery and Gardens due to the Dixon being a Boxwood Trial Garden. Outside boxwood could possibly introduce the very contagious Boxwood Blight.
- 22. Nothing is allowed to be affixed to the wall. No part of any design may come within 12" of any piece of art.

23. Class 5: Judges Challenge Class





- 1. Please carefully read and follow the GCA Rules, General Information, and Timetable for Exhibitors.
- 2. Advanced registration for classes 148 and 149 is open Monday, September 15, 2025 at 9:00am CST through Monday, January 26, 2026 at 5:00pm CST at memphisgardenclub.org. For questions regarding registration, please contact the Class Co-Chairs.
- 3. An exhibitor may submit 3 entries per Class, provided each is a different species or cultivar.
- 4. Entries must be owned and grown by the exhibitor for a minimum of 6 months (Friday, October 10, 2025) unless otherwise stated in the schedule. The exceptions are listed below:
 - Classes 1 3 | Annuals (three months ownership)
 - Class 117 | Orchids (one year ownership)
 - Classes 127 | Herbs/container (three months ownership)
 - Classes 138 139 I Immemorial (five year ownership)
 - Classes 144 145 | Topiary (nine months ownership)
 - Class 148 | Garden "Sous Verre" (sixth months ownership)
 - Class 149 | Bust a Move (one month ownership)
 - Class 150 | Par Class (one year ownership)
- 5. Entries eligible for the Elizabeth Platt Corning Medal and/or the Louise Agee Wrinkle Horticulture Propagation Award must have been owned and grown by the exhibitor for at least 6 months (October 10, 2025) and may not have won the award previously. Eligibility will be marked on the entry card and confirmed at passing.
- 6. All rooted entries propagated by the exhibitor must be identified with details of the method and relevant date(s) on an accompanying Propagation card to be eligible for the Louise Agee Wrinkle Horticulture Propagation Award and Elizabeth Platt Corning Medal, if applicable. Check www.gardenclubofamerica.org for further propagation instructions.
- 7. Mats, stands, and saucers are not allowed. If an entry is staked (such as a forced bulb or an orchid), the support must be as unobtrusive as possible.
- 8. Classes may be subdivided and entries moved and/or reclassified at the discretion of the Horticulture Committee or Judges Subdivision is preferrable in the schedule rather than on the floor.
- 9. Containers for container-grown plants are measured at the diameter or the diagonal of the widest point on the inside rim at the soil line. Container not to exceed 10", unless otherwise stated in the class description.

- 10. A key card (diagram or plant list) is required when multiple species or cultivars are exhibited in the same container. Key card must be printed (by hand or computer) in white, unlined card in black waterproof medium/pencil on a 4" x 6" white unlined card. A 4" x 6" photograph with identifying numbers may be used to supplement the key card. Key cards must be legible. Please visit www.gcamerica.org for instructions..
- 11. Container-grown plants must be exhibited in containers that are clean, unobtrusive and compatible with the exhibit. Clean terracotta clay pots are preferred. Stone-like (hypertufa) is permitted. Fully disguised double potting is permitted, top dressing must not float when watered. Worm casting top dressing will be required and provided in Horticulture Grooming and Receiving.
- 12. The Horticulture Committee will provide glass containers for cut specimens. The Dixon will provide all wedging material for cut specimens.
- 13. To designate a preferred exhibiting side, exhibitors should mark the center back of the container with a white chalk mark "X." To designate the order of a container collection, white stickers will be provided for numbering, or chalk should be used to indicate the number sequence.

- 14. After entry is passed and registered, a sticker with the entry number will be affixed to the back of the specimen stand or container. This number will be written on the corresponding entry card, to ensure an entry card if separated from the exhibit container during staging, can be returned to the proper entry before judging.
- 15. The Horticulture Committee will water the exhibits if instructed to do so in writing. Notify the division chairs at the time of entry with instructions for watering.

18. Bonsai are not allowed.

19. All cut specimens must be in show condition at the time of judging. Wilted specimens are subject to removal by the Horticulture Committee. See GCA Rule #4 regarding the condition of plant material.

- 20. Entries for Classes 148 and 149 will require: a plant list with the botanical and common names along with a required statement of intent, of no more than 25 words to be entered using the entry form online at memphisgardenclub.com by Friday, March 27, 2026 date. Changes to the plant list may be made at the show by notifying the passing judge. Classes 148-149 shall be passed in place.
- 21. Removal of entries will take place on Sunday, April 12, 2026 from 5:15 pm to 6:00 pm and on Monday, April 13 from 9:00am to 12:00pm. Cut specimens will be discarded beginning at 5:15pm on Sunday, April 12, 2026. The exhibitor is responsible for the removal of their containers from the Dixon. All items left after 12:00 pm on Monday, April 13, 2026 will be discarded unless arrangements have been made with the Container Return Chairs.

Division III: Photography Guidelines

- 1. Please carefully read and follow the GCA Rules and The Dixon Gallery and Gardens Rules for general information and the Timetable for Exhibitors.
- 2. An exhibitor is permitted only one entry per class but may enter two classes.
- 3. This is a juried show. The first 16 online registrations for each class (by date and timestamp of registration) will be accepted for evaluation by the jury. The jury will choose six finalists in each class.
- 4. Photography email registration will open on Wednesday, October 1, 2025 10:00am CST and will close as classes fill OR on Saturday January 10, 2026 at 10:00 p.m. CST. The photography registration form and a place to upload the digital image will be found at memphisgardenclub.org. Both the form and the image must be submitted at this same time.
- 5. The photographs should be submitted in JPEG format. 1MB 5MB in the SRGB colorspace. Each photograph must include the entrant's last name, first initial, zone and class number (Mercer, M, Zone IX, Class I). Questions regarding this process should be directed to Irene Brownlow, IreneBrownlow2@gmail.com, or Maryan Mercer, maryanmercer@gmail.com.
- 6. Exhibitors will be notified by email that their registration and image have been received.
- 7. The finalists and non-finalists will be notified of juried results by Wednesday, February 11, 2026.
- 8. A photograph previously entered in a GCA, GCA Major, sanctioned non-GCA Major Flower Show, non-GCA Flower Show, or a GCA Focus online contest may not be entered again even with slight alterations and reprinting. This includes photographs entered in juried shows that did not pass into the finalist stage. The same photograph may only be entered in one show at a time. If a photo is not advanced as a finalist in juried judging, it may be entered into a second Juried GCA Annual Meeting or Major Flower Show, or a GCA or Club flower show.
- 9. A photograph previously entered into a Club flower show, may be entered again into a GCA, Zone, GCA Major or a Sanctioned Non-GCA Major Show unless that photograph was submitted for publication in the *Focus* photography gallery or a printed issue of *Focus*.
- 10. Only the photography committee may reclassify an entry, but only with the permission of the exhibitor.

- 11. Each photograph must be the work of the exhibitor under whose name it is registered. In manipulated photographs, any added imagery must be the work of the exhibitor. The composition must have been originally envisioned by the exhibitor and not an AI GENERATOR. Editing must be the work of the exhibitor. No third-party images, stock, or AI images are allowed in entries. Nonrepresentational commercial overlays and textures are allowed. Mounting and printing may be done professionally.
- 12. Editing at any stage must be the work of the exhibitor under whose name it is registered. This includes enhancement for color or clarity, removal of a part of the image, combining images, or distorting the original subject. All post production must be done before the photograph is submitted for jurying.
- 13. Photography entries are limited to subjects consistent with The Garden Club of America interests such as horticulture, floral design, gardens/landscapes, conservation and the environment, historic preservation, civic improvement and the natural world. Plant material is not required but is strongly encouraged in photographs.

DIVISION III

PHOTOGRAPHY

- 14. All photographs must be two-dimensional and printed on paper unless otherwise specified. Photographs must be flush-mounted on black foam core and may not be over-matted. This may be professionally done. Overall dimension of entry must be a minimum of 40" and not exceed 72" in total perimeter measurement. Surface finish is the choice of the exhibitor. Glass and framing are not permitted.
- 15. The printed photograph must match, including cropping, the digital image sent with the original registration. Once juried, you may not further edit or manipulate the digital image in any way, as registered with us. The photo will not be passed if the Photography Committee determines:
 - The print is significantly different from the digital submission.
 - The print is mounted incorrectly.
 - The mounted print does not appear to be in Show condition.
- 16. Finalists' printed photographs must be received no later than Thursday, March 12, 2026. Send photographs to:

POSTAGE: Please include a \$16.00 check, payable to Memphis Garden Club to cover return postage and handling. You may also enclose stamps, UPS labels, or postage meter strips. If return envelope and postage are not included, it will be assumed that the image will not be returned. If the photograph will not be returned, to receive a comment card and any award won, include a self-addressed, stamped envelope. Any award received will be noted on the back of the mount before it is returned.

Recommended: Use two 15" X 19" bubble wrap envelopes, or a reusable mailing box. (Smaller envelopes are too tight to easily get images in and out with their various wrappings.) Wrap your mounted image between two suitable pieces of foam core (this is very light) or non-bendable cardboard, which will be reused for return. Place wrapped image inside reusable mailing box, or inside mailing envelope with folded self-addressed return envelope.

- 18. Each entry must have the entry card affixed to the back of the photograph mounting with the exhibitor's name, garden club, zone, email, address, phone number, and class entered. The top of the photograph must be indicated. Entry cards are found on the GCA website.
- 19. A title or statement of intent may be included on the entry form and entry card itself not to exceed 25 words.
- 20.All photographs will be passed by the photography committee to verify that class specifications have been met. If a photograph is not passed, the exhibitor will be notified and allowed, if time permits, to send a replacement photograph.
- 21. Photos will be hung on the wall in the Dixon Gallery. The Dixon often paints the walls for a new exhibition and the color will not be known in advance.
- 22. The Division Chairs will provide an entry card to be staged with each photograph. Identification of plant material on the entry card is not required but encouraged whenever possible.
- 23. No identifiable images of a child or children may be included in photographs submitted to, passed and exhibited in the Photography Division and published in *Focus*. Featuring identifiable people (other than street scenes) in photographs is discouraged as GCA requires a release.

While Mary Sims may be a renowned artist, she is not the only beloved member of the Memphis community within her family. Her father, Lydel Sims was a syndicated, humorous writer for The Commercial Appeal, leaving his own mark in the hearts of many in the city.

Lydel Sims's book, Assignment Memphis, is a collection of his articles from his time as a writer for the newspaper. The titles of his articles are just as clever as his daughter's paintings, showcasing the family's shared talent for creativity and expression. Using the titles of Lydel Sims's articles are the following photography classes.

CLASS 1: "YOU AIN'T SEEN NOTHIN YET"

Color, Novice Class, 6 entries An image of a reflection.

> A novice is an individual exhibitor who has not won first-place ribbon or a GCA Special award in the photography division entered at a GCA, a GCA Major Flower Show, or a Sanctioned Non-GCA Major Flower Show. A novice exhibitor will be identified on the entry card.

An exhibitor who has won a first-place ribbon or Special Award in a GCA Major Flower Show or sanctioned non-GCA Major Flower Show is no longer a novice in any level of GCA Major Flower Show in the division they won. Only individual novice exhibitors are eligible to receive the GCA Novice awards.

CLASS 2: "FOOLING AROUND WITH MOTHER NATURE"

Color, Macro or Close-up, 6 entries A close-up of a flower.

> Macro: An image in which the subject is larger than the size, the original image must be no larger than 1"x1.5", or a 35mm film slide.

Close-up: a photo taken close to the subject to permit a close and detailed view of the object.

CLASS 3: "REMEMBER WHEN"

Color. 6 entries An image of a traditional landscape remembrance.

> Traditional Landscape: A view of scenery of any kind, from wilderness vistas to urban cityscapes, land, or sea. The primary subject is the scenery, and it must dominate, although the image may contain secondary elements such as people, animals, or objects. City elements predominate in cityscapes; the sea predominates in seascapes.

CLASS 4: "A HAT IS MORE THAN JUST A HAT"

Color, Creative Technique, 6 entries A mask or masks worn at a masquerade ball.

> Creative Techniques: used to achieve a visual effect that significantly departs from a purely representational depiction of the subject matter. The visual effect may be achieved via in-camera techniques or editing. Creative techniques may include representational, abstract imagery, or both. All representative images in a paragraph using creative techniques must be the work of the photographer. Nonrepresentational enhancements, such as purchased textures are allowed. Creative techniques photographs may be entered in any class unless it is excluded in the class description.

Color, 6 entries An animal enjoying a moment of bliss.

> Color Splash: (Spot Color or Selective Color) the selective use of color(s) in an otherwise grayscale image. It is not a monochrome.

> Cityscape: An image that captures an urban landscape, especially skylines though cityscapes can be taken from a variety of angles and perspectives. The primary subjects of a cityscape are man-made structures-buildings, streets, bridges, etc. rather than nature.

Division IV: Botanical Arts Guidelines

- 1. Please carefully read and follow the GCA Rules, Dixon Gallery and Gardens Rules, General Information, and Timetable for Exhibitors.
- 2. Advanced registration is required for all classes beginning Monday, September 15, 2025 at 9:00am CST and closing Monday, February 23, 2026 at 5:00pm CST.
- 3. Exhibitors are permitted only one exhibit in each Class, but may enter more than one class.
- 4. The exhibitor(s) under whose name(s) the entry has been registered must create and complete the design. All participants must be listed on the entry card. All handiwork must be executed by the exhibitor(s).
- 5. No more than two exhibitors may execute a Botanical Arts entry.
- 6. If forced to withdraw, the exhibitor must notify the Division Chair & Class Consultants and find a substitute unless there is a waiting list for the Class.
- 7. All plant material used must be dried this includes flowers, foliage, seeds, pods, nuts (in or out of shells), vegetables, twigs, vines, reeds, etc. Only plant material, mechanics and their surface treatments (i.e. paints, nail polishes, varnishes, waxes, etc.) are permitted. Artificial, endangered and locally invasive plant materials may not be used. Glitter may not be used unless incorporated into a paint.
- 8. Entries must be assembled, or judiciously carved by the exhibitor. Man-made or manufactured figural forms or base material are NOT permitted. Any plant material may be cut, incised or shaped to enhance the artistic effect.
- 9. Non-plant material (i.e. cardboard, metal, twine, string, cording, etc.) may be used only for construction and must not be visible except to knot or string plant material resembling pearls or gemstones in jewelry classes.
- 10. The use of commercially processed products or manufactured products may not be included in design, (i.e. couscous, pasta, tapioca, milled wood, balsa wood, toothpicks, loose glitter, etc.) with the exception of natural raffia, rattan, and skeletonized leaves.
- 11. Thick coatings of resin, epoxy, lacquer or nail polish are not permitted. Gemstones should not be made only from resin, epoxy, or nail polish; they must be made from plant material.
- 12. Reliance on decorative painting to depict scenes, flowers, figures, borders, etc., is not permitted. These must be created with plant material.

- 13. Anything not prohibited in the GCA Rules, Botanical Arts Division Guidelines, or individual class is permitted.
- 14. Botanical Couture entries must be created from all dried plant material or fungi or, if embellished, completely covered.
- 15. A 4"x 6" white unlined sample card must accompany each entry. A small untreated sample of all plant material must be affixed to the card and placement noted. Plant material must be properly identified with botanical and common names. A Statement of Intent (25 words or less) is required and must be submitted with the entry card. Entry cards available on GCA website.
- 16. Registration is open from Monday, September 15, 2025, 9:00am CST to Monday, February 23, 2026 at 5:00 CST. Register at memphisgardenclub. org. For questions regarding registration, please contact the class consultants. Entries will be notified of their inclusion by email. If applicable, make payment to memphisgardenclub.org

- 19. All entries will be passed by two members of either The Botanical Arts Committee and/or the Botanical Arts judging program to verify class specifications have been met. If time permits, an entry may be returned for correction.
- 20. Dixon Gallery and Gardens and Botanical Arts Chairs will be responsible for installation of the exhibits. Each exhibit will be handled with the utmost care. Indicate in writing, and include with the exhibit, any special instructions for handling and display.



- 4. There are no thread requirements. Beading is allowed.
- 5. All canvases will be finished in the same style by the Needle Arts Committee.
- 6. Consultants may be used for the design of the stitches.
- 7. At least two different stitches should be represented in the Needle Point entry.
- 8. Registration is open Monday, September 15, 2025, 10:00am CST. Register at memphisgardenclub.org. Entries will be notified of their inclusion by email.
- 9. Entry fees of \$100.00 must be paid at time of registration. Entry fee includes canvas and finishing but does not include threads which must be selected and purchased by exhibitor.

SCA MAJOR FLOWER SHOW AWARDS

THE GCA FLOWER SHOW AWARDS DESCRIBED BELOW ARE APPROVED AND WILL BE PRESENTED IF MERITED.

DIVISION 1: FLORAL DESIGN

Best in Show Floral Design is selected from first-place winners in the division.

The Carol Coffey Swift Medal of Excellence may be awarded to members of GCA clubs. It is offered in recognition of an arrangement of great distinction in a competitive Class at a GCA Major Flower Show. Either an individual or joint entries are eligible. The entry must have placed first, second, or third. An entry in any challenge Class is not eligible to receive this award.

The Fenwick Medal may be awarded to members of GCA clubs in competitive floral design Classes at a GCA Major Flower Show. It is offered in recognition of creative work of outstanding beauty using predominantly fresh plant material. The awarding of the Fenwick Medal lies in the clear interpretation by the judges of the intent of the medal. A standard of creativity and quality in a highly competitive show rather than Best in Show is required. The design must have placed first, second, or third. An entry in a challenge Class is not eligible to receive this award.

The Margaret Clover Symonds Medal may be awarded to members of GCA clubs in a competitive floral design Class at a GCA Major Flower Show. The design must be an innovative, modern design, creatively combining man-made material(s) with fresh and/ or dried plant material (as the schedule permits). Either individual or joint entries are eligible. The entry must have placed first, second, or third. An entry in a challenge Class is not eligible to receive this award.

The Sandra Baylor Novice Award may be given at a GCA Major Flower Show to an exhibitor who is a member of a GCA club and who has never won first place or GCA Special Award in the Floral Design Division of a GCA Major or sanctioned non-GCA Major Flower Show. It shall be awarded to an individual novice exhibitor for a unique and skillful response to the schedule. The entry must have placed first, second, or third. An entry in a challenge class is not eligible to receive this award.

DIVISION II: HORTICULTURE

Best in Show Horticulture is selected from the First-place winners in the division.

The Certificate of Excellence in Horticulture may be awarded at a GCA Major Flower Show to GCA clubs or club members, non-members, or other organizations for an exhibit of great distinction in a competitive horticulture Class. The entry must have placed first, second, or third.

The Elizabeth Platt Corning Medal may be awarded only to members of GCA clubs only in a competitive horticulture Class in a GCA Major Flower Show. The medal is to be awarded to an entry presented with distinction and originality notable for its cultural difficulty. It must have achieved an exceptional standard of horticultural excellence. Extra consideration will be given to an entry propagated by the exhibitor; full propagation details must be listed on a card accompanying the entry. The entry must have been grown by the exhibitor for at least six months. The medal may be awarded for a single plant, collection of plants, container garden, or cut specimen(s). Individual, joint, or club entries are eligible. The entry must have placed first, second, or third. The medal may not be awarded more than once to the same exhibit.

GCA MAJOR FLOWER SHOW AWARDS

The Louise Agee Wrinkle Horticulture Propagation Award may be awarded at a GCA Major Flower Show to a GCA member for skill in plant propagation. The exhibit must have been propagated and grown by its exhibitor for at least six months and should be distinguished by its prime condition, cultural perfection, attractive presentation and flawless grooming. It is for rooted plants propagated by seed, cuttings or other traditional methods. It can be a single specimen, source plant and its offspring, or a collection. The dates and methods of propagation must be recorded on an accompanying propagation card. The medal may not be awarded more than once to the same exhibit.

The GCA Novice Award in Horticulture may be awarded for an outstanding exhibit to a member of a GCA club who has never won first place or GCA Special Award in the Horticulture Division in a GCA Major Flower Show or Sanctioned non-GCA Major Flower Show. The entry must have placed first, second, or third. challenge Classes are eligible for this award.

DIVISION III: PHOTOGRAPHY

Best in Show Photography is selected from the First-place winners in the division.

The Certificate of Excellence in Photography may be awarded at a GCA Major Flower Show to individual GCA club member or non- member for an exhibit of great distinction in a competitive photography class. The entry must have placed first, second or third.

The Photography Creativity Award may be awarded at a GCA Major Flower Show to an exhibitor who is a member of a GCA club for creative and technical excellence in response to the theme of the schedule. The entry must have placed first, second or third.

The GCA Novice Award in Photography may be awarded for an outstanding exhibit to a member of a GCA club who has never won first place or GCA Special Award in the Photography Division in a GCA Major Flower Show or Sanctioned non-GCA Major Flower Show. The entry must have placed first, second, or third.first, second or third.

DIVISION IV: BOTANICAL ARTS

Best in Show Botanical Arts is selected from the First-place winners in the division.

The Botanical Arts Creativity Award may be awarded at a GCA Major Flower Show to a member of a GCA club for excellent craftsmanship and creative response to the theme of the schedule. The entry must have placed first, second, or third.

The Certificate of Excellence in Botanical Arts may be awarded at a GCA Major Flower Show to GCA clubs or club members, non-members, or other organizations for an exhibit of great distinction in a competitive Botanical Arts Class. The entry must have placed first, second or third.

The GCA Novice Award in Botanical Arts may be awarded for an outstanding exhibit to a member of a GCA club who has never won a blue ribbon or GCA Special Award in the Botanical Arts Division in a GCA Major or Sanctioned non-GCA Major Flower Show or a blue ribbon in the division at a GCA Major Flower Show. The entry must have placed first, second, or third.

DIVISION V: EDUCATION

The Ann Lyon Crammond Award may be presented at a GCA Major Flower Show to an outstanding educational exhibit which best educates the public about gardens. Any educational exhibit that increases the appreciation of any aspect of plants, gardens, or landscape design may be considered for the award. The award may be given to GCA club members, member clubs, non-members, or other organizations.

The Certificate of Excellence in Conservation may be awarded at a GCA Major Flower Show to GCA clubs or club members, non-members, or other organizations for an exhibit of exceptional merit which educates the public on conservation issues and promotes respect for natural resources and responsibility for environmental stewardship.

OVERALL

Judges' Commendation may be given to an entry, Class, section, special exhibit or other aspect of the show that is of exceptional merit.

Award of Appreciation may be given to thank an exhibitor or group for participation. The award may also be given to non-judged Classes.

The Annie Burr Jennings Sweepstakes Award may be presented to the club with the highest number of points earned by its members from all competitive classes in a GCA Major Flower Show. Points are to awarded as follows:


