Principals Address

As we enter the third week of the school year, it is important to acknowledge that this has been a challenging start to 2026. The process of aligning our timetable with the new learning management system has required considerable adjustment behind the scenes. In addition, as we continue to appoint new staff, there has been a need to make changes to some teaching loads during these first few weeks. I sincerely apologise for the disruption these adjustments may have caused students and families. Please be assured that establishing a settled and fully staffed College is a priority, and we are working diligently to ensure stability as soon as possible.

Despite these challenges, it has been encouraging to see the positive way in which students and staff have approached the beginning of the year across both campuses. There have already been many moments that reflect the strength of our Emmanuel College community.

A highlight has been the welcome extended to our Year 7 students and their families. The Year 7 Mass and Information Sessions at both the Notre Dame Campus and the St Paul's Campus marked an important step in their transition to secondary school. These gatherings provided time for prayer and an opportunity to strengthen the partnership between home and school. It has been pleasing to see our newest students settling in and beginning to build connections.

Our whole school Mass on Friday 4 February was a significant occasion. Students and staff from St Paul's Campus travelled to Notre Dame Campus, bringing the College together to mark the beginning of the academic year. Celebrating as one College reinforces who we are and what we stand for. The manner in which students participated reflected a strong sense of belonging and shared purpose.

The St Paul's Campus Athletics Carnival, held on Tuesday 10 February, was another important event in these opening weeks. The day provided opportunities for participation and house involvement. What stood out was the encouragement shown by students toward one another. Such occasions strengthen relationships and contribute to a positive school culture.

This week we also look forward to Year 8 Medieval Day, taking place on both campuses. Medieval Day is always a favourite with students and staff. Through activities and re-enactments, the Middle Ages are brought to life in ways that deepen understanding. The day provides valuable support for the Year 8 History program and reflects our commitment to engaging learning experiences.

We have also launched Calm Classrooms, the first element of the Learn Well at Emmanuel Framework. Calm Classrooms introduces short, structured periods of stillness at the beginning of lessons to help students focus their attention. By explicitly teaching strategies that support concentration and regulation, we are strengthening the conditions for effective learning. We look forward to embedding this approach across the College.

Welcome to 2026

We warmly welcome everyone to the 2026 school year, with a special greeting to our newest members of the Emmanuel community. This includes our Year 7 students, new staff and students joining us across Years 8-12. We hope you all enjoyed a restful break and look forward to a productive and successful year ahead.

Communication

Your child's Homeroom Teacher should be your first point of contact for any questions or concerns. Depending on the nature of the matter, you may also contact your child's Subject Teacher or House Leader. The College encourages parents and guardians to communicate with us as early as possible should any concerns arise. Please make contact via phone or email.

Parents and guardians who visit the College without an appointment should be aware that staff may not be immediately available. In these instances, office staff can record details of the concern and arrange a suitable time for a meeting. We remind all parents and guardians of the importance of being respectful, courteous, and maintaining confidentiality when engaging with College staff.

Punctuality

Families are encouraged to ensure effective communication should your child be late to school. Please make contact with your child's homeroom teacher, the front office or their House Leader. Thank you for your support with this matter.

Uniform

Emmanuel College takes great pride in its school community and student presentation. All students are expected to comply with the College Uniform Policy, which is available on the College website under Our College – College Policies. We ask families to review this information carefully to ensure students understand their responsibilities and expectations as members of the Emmanuel College community.

- Please ensure dresses and skirts are worn at knee length.
- Jumpers or cardigans are not to be worn as outer garments to and from school. If a jumper or cardigan is worn, the blazer must also be worn.
- Students may wear the shirt or dress with the blazer, but the jumper or cardigan must not be worn as the outer layer.

Hair and Piercings

Students are expected to maintain hairstyles and colours that are appropriate for school. Any extreme hairstyles or colours from the holiday period should have been corrected by now. Recently, diamante type studs have been worn at the College. Please be aware that these are not permitted. The only permitted piercing is a single plain stud worn in the ear lobe. Approved jewellery includes a watch and a simple gold or silver cross necklace only.

Please note the following specific expectations:

- Hairstyles and colours must be neat and moderate, with hair kept to one natural colour.
- Mullets, severe undercuts, shaved lines, or similar styles are not permitted. Clippers must not be shorter than a number three.
- Fake eyelashes and artificial nails are not permitted.
- All other piercings, including nose piercings, are not permitted. Plastic studs are not acceptable.
- School shoes must be black leather, lace-up school shoes only. Buckled or T-bar styles are not permitted. Black leather runners are not permitted with the formal uniform.

Required sock colours:

- Girls: black
- Boys: grey

Socks for all students must be worn 10–15 cm above the ankle or be knee-high.

With the PE uniform, white socks must be worn. Sports socks are permitted only with the PE uniform.

These expectations are clearly communicated to families and form part of the enrolment agreement. Consistent application of these rules ensures fairness and equality for all members of our community.

Mobile Phones

As outlined in the College Mobile Phone Policy, students are not permitted to use their mobile phones to make purchases at the canteen. Payments may be made using cash or a physical debit or credit card. Students who use their phones for purchases will receive consequences in line with the policy. Thank you for your ongoing support.

SunSmart Policy

All students participating in Health and Physical Education classes, ACC/SACCSS competitions, excursions, and other outdoor activities are required to wear approved College headwear. Students are also encouraged to wear sun protection when walking to and from school and during recess and lunchtime.

Approved options include a baseball cap, bucket hat, or wide-brimmed cricket hat. Students who do not wear the appropriate headwear will be unable to participate in these activities, as approved sun protection is an essential part of the Emmanuel College sports uniform.

We look forward to the year ahead and hope that 2026 is a successful and enjoyable year for all members of the Emmanuel College community.

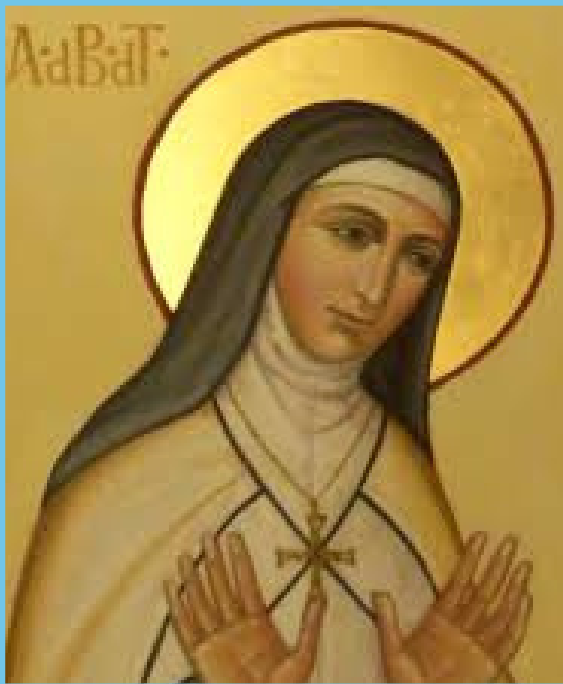

Milestones in our Marianist Family

On the 10th and 22nd January we celebrate the Feast Days of Blessed Adele de Batz de Trenquelléon and Blessed William Joseph Chaminade, respectively. Bl William Chaminade founded the Marianist Family in 1801 and the Society of Mary in 1817. He was born in 1761 and died on January 22 in 1850. In 2000, Pope John Paul II declared Chaminade "Blessed."

Bl. Adele de Batz de Trenquelléon formed a spiritual union called the "Little Society" which had as its goal to create a network of women who would support each other in their faith. The association grew rapidly with Adele writing correspondence to the distant members, whilst also visiting the sick and inviting poor children from the country to her home to care for them and teach them about the fundamentals of the Christian faith. In 1816, Adele de Batz de Trenquelléon renounced her inheritance and rented part of an ancient convent in the local capital of Agen. In 1816 the Little Society and female members of Chaminade's group formed the Marianist Sisters that combine an impulse for mission work with a contemplative nature. The mission work was heavily focused on care for the sick and the education of the poor. Adele De Batz de Trenquelléon died in 1828 and was buried at the convent; her final words were: "Hosanna to the Son of David!"

ACC Coaches' Code of Conduct

As an ACC coach, you play a key role in promoting the values of ACC sport. Please read and commit to the following expectations to help create a positive experience for all students.

1. Promote the ACC spirit

Ensure every match reflects the ACC values of *Excellence, Honour, and Fairness*. Encourage both strong skills and good sportsmanship.

2. Model high standards

Reinforce your school's expectations around punctuality, behaviour, respectful language, and appropriate dress for all age groups.

3. Keep winning in perspective

Focus on participation, enjoyment, and development—not just results.

4. Encourage respect after the game

Shake hands with the opposing coach and officials, and encourage your players to do the same.

5. Prioritise safety

Make sure equipment and facilities are safe. Keep your coaching knowledge up to date and follow good coaching principles.

6. Respect officials

Accept umpire/referee decisions without public criticism. Avoid blaming losses on officiating.

7. Lead by example

Set clear expectations for students to respect officials and opponents. Keep sideline communication positive and avoid excessive “psych-up” rituals.

8. Respect your opponents

Teach players to appreciate the abilities of other teams. Acknowledge that sometimes the opposition is simply stronger on the day.

9. Create a safe, friendly environment

Provide appropriate supervision and ensure spectators—students and parents—barrack in a constructive and respectful way.

10. Take injuries seriously

Follow medical advice before allowing injured players to return. Be familiar with and follow the Concussion Policy.

11. Communicate professionally

When writing match reports for assemblies or publications, remember they are public documents. Avoid negative comments about other schools, staff, students, or venues. Any concerns should be directed privately to your Director of Sport.

12. Submit scores promptly

Confirm match scores with the opposing coach and officials. Submit signed score sheets to your Director of Sport before classes begin the next day.

13. Most importantly—enjoy coaching!

Your enthusiasm and enjoyment help create a positive sporting experience for everyone.





ACC Student Player Code of Conduct

Congratulations on being selected to represent your school in ACC competition! As part of your commitment to your team, please read and follow the expectations below:

1. Give your best—on and off the field

You're part of one of Victoria's premier school sporting competitions. Always play and behave to the best of your ability.

2. Know the rules

Make sure you understand and follow ACC rules. You can get a copy from your coach or on the ACC website.

3. Respect officials

Don't argue with umpires or referees. If you have concerns, speak to your coach, team manager, or captain—they will handle it appropriately.

4. Stay in control

Keep your temper in check. Abusive or provocative behaviour toward officials or players is not acceptable.

5. Be a team player

Work hard for your team and represent your school with pride. Your behaviour reflects on your whole school community.

6. Show good sportsmanship

Be gracious in victory and respectful in defeat. Always shake hands with your opponents after the game.

7. Treat others fairly

No sledging, bullying, rude gestures, or taking advantage of other players. Treat everyone with respect.

8. Co-operate with others

Support your teammates, respect your coaches, and play fairly with your opponents. Without them, the competition wouldn't exist.

9. Respect all individuals

Comments about someone's race, religion, or sexuality are never acceptable.

10. Protect your school's reputation

Your behaviour—both in person and online—represents your school. Avoid actions, posts, or messages that could bring your school into disrepute.

11. Enjoy the experience

Playing sport with your schoolmates is a unique opportunity. Make the most of it—you won't get this time back!





ACC Spectator Code of Conduct

When attending any ACC event, please help create a positive and safe environment by following the expectations below:

1. Respect everyone

Treat all participants, officials, coaches, and spectators with dignity and respect.

2. Remember why students play

Sport is about enjoyment, learning, and teamwork—encourage that.

3. Follow school procedures

If a game is held at a school, follow the visitor sign-in process. If you're unsure, check in at the front reception.

4. Follow photography rules

Photos at school matches are only allowed if participating schools give permission. Approved photos must not be shared on social media.

5. Focus on effort

Acknowledge the hard work and improvement of all participants—not just the result.

6. Keep comments positive

Never yell at or ridicule players for mistakes. Always use appropriate and respectful language.

7. Appreciate good play

Celebrate skill and effort from all teams, including the opposition.

8. Respect officials and staff

Do not harass or abuse players, coaches, umpires, or anyone involved in the event. Respect officiating decisions and encourage others to do the same. Abuse of any kind will not be tolerated.

9. Treat everyone fairly

Respect all young people regardless of gender, ability, cultural background, or religion.

10. Be a role model

Your behaviour sets the tone. Show the students how to support sport positively
