Student Wellbeing and Safety - Vaping

I would also like to take this opportunity to address an important wellbeing and safety matter. The College has recently installed more advanced vape detectors in student toilets. These have been implemented to protect students from harmful practices while on College grounds. The detectors are linked to each specific room and are time-synchronised with nearby cameras. This means that students who enter and exit these spaces can be identified if vaping occurs.

Where a student is found to have engaged in vaping, appropriate consequences will apply. From Term 2, students involved will also be required to participate in an after-school educational program focused on the harms of vaping.

Fire Alarm and Emergency Response

On occasions where vape detectors or fire detectors in toilets trigger the College fire alarm system, the fire brigade may be called to attend the site. Where alarms are determined to be false and linked to student behaviour, the College may forward the associated costs to the individual student and their family.

These measures are in place to support both safety and accountability. Our priority is to ensure a healthy environment for all students.

As we look ahead to Term 2, we are confident in a strong and settled start, supported by our new staff and returning colleagues. We encourage all members of our community to take time over the break to rest and recharge.

Thank you for your continued support of Emmanuel College.

I will conclude by bringing to mind all which Easter provides to us. As we approach the season of Easter, we are reminded of the message of hope and renewal at the heart of our faith.

Uniform in Terms 2 & 3 – Formal Winter Uniform

A reminder that winter uniform is required at the commencement of Term 2. Please see below for required items. College winter skirt (with black opaque tights only; socks not permitted) OR:

Socks. GIRLS: Black opaque tights with skirt or Black Socks with shorts or trousers (Short ankle or knee-high. Not sport socks. No branding with shorts or trousers.) **Note: Skirt length to be no shorter than the top of the knee.**

BOYS: Grey Socks (Short ankle socks. Not sport socks. No branding.) Black leather lace-up school shoes (not sandals/buckled shoes, or black leather runners)

Adherence to the uniform policy is compulsory and students are required to wear their formal academic uniform for this event. Also, a reminder that all boys are required to be clean shaven on the morning of their scheduled photo day. Please see below for dates:

If you do come across such content, please contact the College directly so we can address the matter appropriately and provide any necessary support. Thank you for your cooperation in this matter.

The College provides psychological and counselling services at both campuses, including a youth worker, John Kalka, who works with the wellbeing team to enhance the connectedness and resilience of all members of the College community. *Students under 15 years of age wishing to access this service would generally require written permission from parents. Students 15 years and older can sign their own consent, but please note the counselling team can work with families in this process.*

What a big term it has been for our 2026 Year 7 cohort across both campuses! From bright, first-day smiles to confident student guides at Open Day, our new families and students have thrown themselves into every opportunity, and the results have been wonderful to witness.

Year 7 Welcome Night: Community and Connection

Our Information and Welcome Night was a lovely evening of community. Here we went through some of the must-know information for our families, such as Compass, uniform requirements, how to access support, and so much more. We celebrated with a Welcome Mass, shared bread in fellowship, and capped it off with everyone's favourite: a sausage sizzle! Both SPC and NDC held their Open Evenings recently. Not only did we welcome many prospective families through our doors, but many of our Year 7 students volunteered as leaders and guides after only eight weeks at the College! Introducing our new Transition Team - a fresh role at the college!

Our new Transition Coordinators are a dedicated staff who work closely with the Wellbeing team, Inclusion team and Learning and Teaching team. Transition Coordinators collaborate with primary schools and previous schools for our Year 8–12 new arrivals to ensure smooth transfers. We run welcome meetings and transition activities, and tailor supports and adjustments for each student as needed. We share key information with teachers and families and monitor settling in, so every newcomer feels supported, connected and confident.

Inclusion Leader Spotlight - Supporting Every Student

Here at Emmanuel College, we are lucky to have a large Inclusion Team, with leaders at each year level, led by our Directors of Inclusion, Brooke Clark and Simone Traglia, overseen by our Deputy Principal - Inclusive Practices, Anita Duhig.

Our Inclusion Leaders champion inclusion across both SPC and NDC, ensuring every student can access learning, belong socially, and 'pursue their personal best'. Collaborating closely with teachers, families, allied health and the Wellbeing, Counselling and Learning and Teaching teams, they coordinate tailored supports that make school accessible for all students. Their roles include supporting teachers with differentiated lesson planning and classroom strategies, advocating for students, completing risk assessments, supporting the implementation of assistive technology, and planning for sensory supports and breaks. These coordinated supports allow for smoother transitions, stronger engagement, better learning outcomes and deeper family-school partnerships.

- James Stewert; ACC Cricket Team of the year.

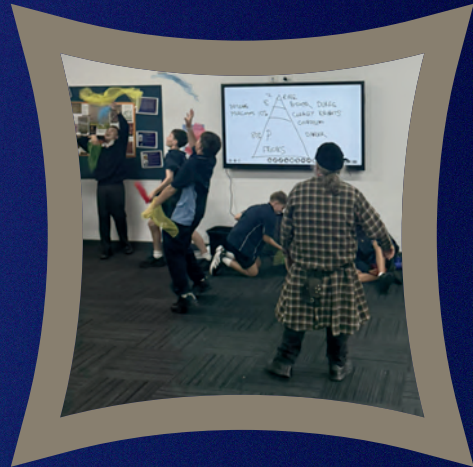
