End of Term 3

As Term 3 draws to a close, I acknowledge the hard work and commitment demonstrated by our students throughout the term. It has been a busy period of learning, assessment and involvement in the broader life of the College. I thank our students for their efforts and our staff and families for the many ways in which they have continued to support them.

For our Year 12 students, the coming break represents an important stage in their final year of secondary education. Trial examinations will take place during the first week of the holidays as students enter the final stages of their studies and prepare for their external examinations. I commend them for their commitment and encourage them to approach this period with purpose, while also making time for rest and wellbeing.

Cultural Week

The final week of term included a range of Cultural Week activities across the College. These activities provided an important opportunity to celebrate the varied and vibrant cultural backgrounds that form our Emmanuel College community. Our diversity enriches College life and helps our students develop a greater understanding of the experiences and traditions of others.

It is important that cultural identity is acknowledged in ways that are thoughtful and respectful. Cultural Week is not simply an opportunity for celebration; it is also an opportunity to learn from one another and strengthen the sense of belonging experienced by every member of our community.

The College takes a firm stance on any occasion when a person's culture is mocked, diminished or treated disrespectfully. Such behaviour is inconsistent with our College values, our expectations of students and our obligations under the Equal Opportunity Act 2010 (Vic). Every student and staff member has the right to participate in College life free from discrimination, harassment and racial or religious vilification. We will continue to respond clearly when these expectations are not met and to educate our students about their responsibility to uphold the dignity of every person.

The Importance of College Uniform

As we approach the end of Term 3, I ask all families to use the holiday break to check that students have every item required to wear the College uniform correctly from the beginning of next term. This may include replacing items that have been lost, damaged or outgrown.

Our formal uniform is an important expression of our shared identity and should be worn correctly and with pride. It promotes a sense of belonging, presents our College positively and helps students develop the habits of self-management and personal presentation that support success in learning and in life. Students are expected to wear the complete formal uniform each day. The College PE uniform may be worn only on scheduled practical HPE days or when its use has been communicated in advance for a particular activity. Formal and PE uniform items must not be mixed. During Term 4, the blazer is optional; however, the College jumper is not to be worn as the outer garment when travelling to and from the College.

The consistent refusal to wear the formal uniform, and the choice to wear the PE uniform instead, are in direct contravention of College expectations. Staff will conduct full uniform checks during the early weeks of Term 4, and consequences, including detentions, will continue to be applied where students do not meet these requirements.

Our preference, however, is not for punitive outcomes to drive compliance. We want students to understand the expectations, take responsibility for meeting them and experience the confidence that comes from doing so successfully.

Research into motivation and wellbeing tells us that young people need to experience competence, autonomy and connection. Clear and consistently upheld expectations contribute to this development. When adults support students to meet an appropriate standard, students have the opportunity to build mastery, self-discipline and self-efficacy. By contrast, repeatedly excusing a young person from reasonable expectations can unintentionally communicate that we do not believe they are capable of meeting them. Over time, this may weaken confidence and encourage avoidance when future challenges arise.

Maintaining high expectations is therefore not about being unnecessarily rigid. It is about communicating our confidence in every student's ability to make responsible choices, correct mistakes and contribute positively to their community. Holding students accountable, while providing the support needed to succeed, is an important part of preparing them for life beyond the College.

Thank you to the many students who wear their uniform correctly each day and to the families who consistently support the College's expectations. I ask all families to prioritise this matter over the break so that every student is ready to begin Term 4 in the correct formal uniform and to wear it with pride.

College Budget and Fees for 2027

There has been considerable public discussion regarding the financial impact of the new certified agreement that will come into effect next year. Like all Catholic schools, Emmanuel College must plan carefully to meet the requirements of the agreement while continuing to provide a high-quality education and appropriate support for our students.

Early next term, families will receive direct communication by letter outlining the measures the College has taken to meet these requirements. The letter will also explain the implications for the 2027 College budget and the steps taken to minimise the impact on school fees and, therefore, on our families.

We recognise that increases in the cost of living continue to place pressure on many households. The College has approached its financial planning carefully and responsibly, seeking to balance its obligations to staff with its commitment to keeping an Emmanuel education as accessible as possible. We believe it is important that families receive clear information about the decisions made and the reasons for them.

As Term 3 concludes, we thank our students, staff and families for their continued commitment to our College community. We wish everyone a restful and safe break and look forward to welcoming our students back for Term 4.

Finishing the Term Well

As we reach the end of another busy term at Emmanuel College, I would like to thank our students, families and staff for their continued commitment to our College community. Throughout the term, we have seen many examples of students demonstrating resilience, kindness and a genuine willingness to engage in their learning and College life.

Our students have represented Emmanuel with pride across the classroom, sporting field, performing arts, community events and other co-curricular activities. These achievements reflect the collective efforts of our students, staff and families. When school and home work in partnership, we create the conditions in which every young person can feel known, supported and encouraged to live "Life to the Full".

As we prepare for the term ahead, I ask families to continue supporting the College in maintaining the consistent expectations that enable all students to thrive.

Every Day Counts

Regular attendance is essential for learning, connection and wellbeing. Every day away from school represents missed learning, interrupted routines and fewer opportunities to strengthen relationships with teachers and peers. Families share an important responsibility in ensuring that their child attends school every day unless they are genuinely unwell or there is an approved reason for their absence.

Please notify the College promptly when your child is absent and work with us if emerging attendance concerns are identified. Early communication allows the College and families to respond before patterns of absence become more difficult to address.

Being Ready and On Time

Arriving at school and to every class on time helps students begin their learning calmly and successfully. Lateness interrupts both the individual student's learning and the learning of others. Families can assist by supporting consistent morning routines, planning transport arrangements and ensuring students arrive with sufficient time to prepare for the day.

Students are also expected to move promptly between classes and arrive ready to learn with the correct books, equipment and technology.

Respectful Behaviour

Respectful relationships are central to a safe and inclusive Emmanuel College community. Students are expected to treat their peers, staff and members of the wider community with dignity and care, both in person and online.

We ask families to reinforce the importance of respectful language, following staff directions, taking responsibility for choices and resolving disagreements appropriately. Behaviour that is unsafe, discriminatory, intimidating or disruptive does not align with our College values and will be addressed in partnership with students and families.

Wearing the Uniform with Pride

The Emmanuel College uniform is an important expression of belonging, equality and pride in our College. Students are expected to wear the complete uniform correctly each day, including appropriate footwear and grooming, in accordance with College expectations.

We ask families to check uniform items before the commencement of the new term and replace or repair anything that no longer meets requirements. If your family is experiencing difficulty obtaining the correct uniform, please contact the College so that support can be discussed.

Thank you to our families for the many ways you support your children and work alongside the College. Your encouragement, communication and reinforcement of our shared expectations make a significant difference.

I wish all students, families and staff a safe, restful and enjoyable term break. We look forward to welcoming our students back refreshed, prepared and ready to make the most of the opportunities ahead.

Indigenous Immersion

Indigenous immersion trips – NAIDOC Week

During the June semester break, Emmanuel College, in partnership with Indigenous Ministries Australia, embarked on an Indigenous Immersion Trip as part of the College's NAIDOC Week celebrations. NDC participants travelled to Dalby, Queensland, while SPC participants travelled to Port Augusta, South Australia.

Participants who took part in both immersions had the unique opportunity to experience Indigenous culture and ways of life firsthand, developing a level of understanding and connection that is difficult to achieve in a traditional classroom context.

Please read below the experiences of various participants who attended both immersions:

Before the Immersion Trip, I had some understanding of Indigenous culture, but I realised there was still so much I did not know. My peers and I embarked on a 4-day trip in South Australia, with an incredible opportunity to meet Nick Wight, who guided us for the Indigenous Immersion; we later visited Pichi Richi Park and different communities, taking on activities with the Dust Feet Mob and Rob Taylor around Port Augusta and the Flinders Ranges.

Through first-hand experience, hearing stories and learning directly from Indigenous people made the experience much more meaningful than learning these topics in classrooms; it opened a new lens on their culture and deepened my appreciation of the enduring connection between culture, country, identity, and community.

For what felt like four days, turned into endless storytelling, meaningful activities and moments of bonding together, leaving a lasting imprint on me as I made connections and memories that I will carry with me. More than anything, the experience challenged me to think more deeply about how I view Australian history and the perspective I grew up with, and reminded me that reconciliation begins with understanding and the willingness to learn.

This was my 3rd time going on the Indigenous immersion program with Emmanuel College, and I can say this was truly the best one. Having the opportunity to travel to Port Augusta with 7 other students and 2 teachers was amazing; it was great to see Uncle Billy (Junglaa) and Larry again and meet up with the Dusty Feet Mob. This time we went to Port Augusta town centre to take part in NAIDOC Week celebrations, then we all had a bit of downtime at the camp,, which was called (Dadirri). The following day, we visited the local sports and recreation centre and shot some hoops with the locals, while also taking part in some traditional Indigenous dances with Junglaa and the Dusty Feet Mob. This was my last Indigenous immersion trip, and it was truly amazing. I 100% recommend it to any Year 10-12s who want to do something like this.

This year, a few students from our school went on the Indigenous Immersion trip to Dalby, where we camped, spent time with, and got to know the local Dhiiyann family. We took part in cultural workshops and learnt firsthand about spiritual, cultural and physical connection to land. The biggest takeaway for me was learning about the constellation stories from Uncle Billy at the fire with my friends, and physically experiencing how societal frameworks shaped the way Indigenous culture evolved into modern-day society. It was a truly special and memorable experience for everyone who went on the trip.
