FROM THE DESK OF CHAIRPERSON AND MANAGING TRUSTEE

Dear Patron

As we brace ourselves for the third wave of COVID, we reaffirm our commitment to improving the lives of children in the onslaught of the pandemic that continues to disrupt lives across the world. The pandemic has irrevocably changed the way we live and perceive the world around us. While there are restrictions on travel, closures of schools and limited medical facilities, and grievous loss of loved ones for many, we also hear stories of resilience, grit and perseverance that come across as a silver lining in the clouds.

Our Surgery Support Programme was halted temporarily during the first half of the year due to the first wave, when hospitals restricted surgeries for children, especially with elective needs. However, in the second half, we were able to pick up pace and during the year we supported close to 600 children with an aggregate amount of support of Rs. 3 Crs. across Mumbai, Pune, Nasik, Aurangabad and other parts of Maharashtra, Kolkata and its catchment areas in West Bengal, Assam, Gujarat, Karnataka and Tamil Nadu, as well as other states like Bihar, Uttar Pradesh, Jharkhand, Madhya Pradesh and Orissa. But one setback was that we had higher than usual mortality rate during the year due to delayed treatment or delayed follow-up of our beneficiaries because of the uncertainties brought on by the pandemic.

Our children have also been affected enormously, especially with the closure of schools and the transition to an online format, which continues to be the norm in the second year of the pandemic. This has not only robbed the children of their intellectual development but also of their social and emotional anchors of interaction and enjoyment. India has over 12 crore children in school and all of them are studying online. Apart from the fatigue and low efficacy of online instruction, children are facing unprecedented mental health problems and emotional burdens which will irrevocably alter the way the children think, behave and operate in society.

In these continuing difficult conditions, our support to children in meeting their health and education needs becomes even more important and relevant. As an organisation we have decided to deepen our impact on our children and go that extra mile to support them in completing their education and meeting their health requirements through more regular follow-ups, extended support and greater interaction.

In 2020, consultation with our network of schools made us realise that many children were at risk of missing school due to financial and economic constraints brought on by the pandemic. We launched our Ekam Education Fund which focuses on supporting children who are studying in 8th to 10th grades and are from underprivileged backgrounds at low-end private/affordable schools, to enable them to finish their schooling. Other than financial support, our team also provides continuous engagement, encouragement and mentoring to each one of the Ekam Scholars. In addition, we launched a scholarship programme of up to Rs. 50,000/- per child for girl students completing 10th grade with a view to supporting their higher studies and professional pursuits. I share the story of two brothers from a Kolkata-based school who were to appear for their 10th and 12th grade board examinations respectively and they lost their father, the only earning member of the family, to an accident, that put the family in financial distress. Even paying the registration fees for their examinations would have been difficult, had it not been for Ekam that supported both the brothers' tuition and registration fees to see them through their term and their board exams. Their story makes us believe that even the smallest act of caring, though like a drop of water in an ocean, will send ripples of faith and resilience to our children!

I would like to personally thank you for your continued support and patronage. The COVID situation has propelled us to relook at our programmes and redesign them so as to move closer to our beneficiaries and deepen our impact on our children. Further, with continued patronage from our donors, we feel reassured that we can continue our focus on key areas, collaborations, due diligence process, and the impact we create.

I wish you a healthy and happy year ahead and as we count our blessings in your partnership, my team and I continue to plough along with our programmes and ideals to bring a better and brighter future to our children inspite of all the challenges and obstacles we continue to face.

ORGANIZATION OVERVIEW

Who We Are

Ekam Foundation Mumbai Mumbai is a registered charitable trust under the Bombay Public Trust Act 1950. Since its inception in 2014, Ekam Foundation Mumbai Mumbai has focused its work in the area of improving child healthcare outcomes in underprivileged sections of the society. To address the above, we have three key programmes (a) Surgery Support Programme (SSP) which provides affordable, immediate relief and medical intervention to critical health issues, (b) School Health **Programme (SHP)** which addresses long term preventive healthcare outcomes through health & hygiene awareness workshops in schools, and helps with financial Fund (EEF) which Education aid/scholarships to deserving indigent students, especially girls. Good health and well-being, hygiene and sanitation, and, quality education and gender equality, all come under the top goals of the Sustainable Development Goals chartered by the UN. The SDG's comprehensive agenda recognizes that it is no longer sufficient just to focus on economic growth, but on fairer and more equal societies, and a safer and more prosperous planet. At the core of this global agenda is the principle of universality: 'Leave No One Behind' - development in all its dimensions must be inclusive of all people, everywhere, and should be built through the participation of everyone, especially the most vulnerable and marginalised. India's national development goals converge well with the SDGs, and India will play a leading role in determining the success of the SDGs, globally. According to UNICEF, COVID-19 is having a devastating impact on children and their families, with current estimates suggesting that an additional 117 million children will be living in poverty by the end of 2020.

Beyond income, the pandemic is deepening poverty across every dimension of a child's life, including health, education, nutrition, housing, water and sanitation. Children, despite being less affected by the virus itself, are bearing a disproportionate burden of the implications of the COVID-19 pandemic. Schools have been closed for months, impacting not just children's education, but also their nutrition, growth, social development, and protection. Containment measures have increased levels of violence in the home. The pandemic has put more families at risk of health and adverse economic conditions.

There is a greater need now for us to build and grow our presence as the third social pillar in the society – supporting the efforts of the government and the private sector in meeting social needs of the country. It is our endeavour at Ekam Foundation Mumbai to stay true to our vision and mission of working for better health, education and well-being of every child so that he/she grows up to be a meaningful and productive member not only of his/her own family but also of the community in general.

Our Journey

In 2013 we began our work with a small team of 6 highly committed and passionate social workers. We set up our first community office in Govandi, one of the most underserved settlements in Mumbai. Our experience in the field highlighted the huge need for neo-natal care to save children born with high risk. In one year's time our patient support work grew manifold, guiding and counselling marginalized families.

In 2013 we began with support to 100 children and by March 2021 we have reached out to more than 2500 children for critical life saving medical aid through our SSP endeavour. By 2015-16, our reach grew stronger with support to children from rural and tribal areas of Maharashtra. In 2017, we began operations in Kolkata for wider outreach in West Bengal, followed by Assam and other regions of eastern India since 2019. In 2018, we partnered with the student council of IIM Visakapatnam to support children in hospitals in the city and its adjoining areas. In 2020/21 we had cases being referred from Tamil Nadu and Karnataka as well.

Under our health awareness programme in SHP, we have reached to nearly 200000 children in over 1500 schools. During the pandemic when we digitally transformed our content, our team has collaborated with other expert organizations on content and facilitation for these digital sessions on road safety and protection of children against sexual abuse. In 2020–2021 we have collaborated with Arpan, an organization that works towards prevention of Child Sexual Abuse. We have introduced creative science sessions through the STEAM Academy in collaboration with museums in Mumbai for school children to have fun in learning how art and science converge

In our 9th year now, we are a team of 20 and growing. We have successfully launched the Ekam Education Fund and Scholarship Programme last financial year keeping in view of the well-being of children, and especially the girl child. In a span of two weeks during Daan Utsav (2nd to 11th October 2020) we raised over Rs. 4,00,000 for Ekam Education Fund. It has enabled us to support education of more than 20 deserving female scholars in addition to the 25 adolescent students (16 girls and 9 boys) who have already received scholarships for the academic year 2020–2021 across 6 schools in Mumbai and Kolkata

Our Goals and Strategies

We can broadly divide our goals into short-term tertiary healthcare objectives catering to immediate financial assistance for elective surgeries (SSP) and long-term goal of plugging health and hygiene issues with the ultimate aim of bringing about behavioural changes that translate into sustainable healthy habits (SHP). Converging with that platform is our programme on education support that has been launched recently due to the challenges of the pandemic (EEF).

The Surgery Support Programme (SSP) is run with the aim of providing access to safe, affordable and timely surgical support to the less privileged children. Our target is to support around 500 children per year with an average ticket of INR 50,000 per child for non-cancer/CHD cases, and 1,00,000 per child for cancer/CHD cases. Our base is in Mumbai catering to Maharashtra majorly, while our outreach has extended to West Bengal, Assam, Uttar Pradesh, Bihar, Andhra Pradesh, Gujrat, Tamil Nadu, Karnataka and Madhya Pradesh.

Under the long-term health awareness programme of SHP, we have reached close to 2,00,000 primary and middle school children from BMC and LEP schools in Mumbai in running sessions on personal hygiene and nutrition between 2015-2019. In the Covid year the platform moved to a digital content also covering programmes on road safety and personal safety and protection where we did 70 "sessions with smaller batches of students covering 1000 kids in 2020. This was clubbed with 150 more science based learning sessions with the Steam Academy. Our aim is to complement this school programme with our newly launched Education Fund, EEF where we are supporting deserving underprivileged children with school fees, and girls with scholarships after completion of their 10th. Our target is to cover 50 children per year where we supplement 75% of their annual fees, or provide with gadgets like tablets for studying; and separately give scholarships to 10 deserving girls in 2021 for them to continue their studies till their 12th grade. EEF pans the entire country as applications are screened and selected in favour of the most deserving.

Our main strategies can be summed up as :

- Collaborative and comprehensive approach we are supported well by our donors and patrons, & the medical fraternity and school network who continue to inspire us to do more and do better.
- Integrity transparency and accountability for all our actions which help our partners have faith in us and establish long term connections in support of our cause.
- Strong ethics of due diligence for best utilization of funds
- Flexibility without compromising on compliance or corporate governance
- Research on programme implementation for impact assessment


We believe that our impact has to be deep and long standing. So, instead of primarily concentrating on how many cases we target to cover, the focus is rather how well we are creating an impact or contributing to a child's overall health. The EEF has assumed larger importance in the pandemic aftermath due to the financial and economic adversity faced by the lower income communities. It has given us a new need to support children with academic interest and dreams of a better future. COVID-19 is having a devastating impact on children and their families. Beyond income, the pandemic is deepening poverty across every dimension of a child's life, including health, education, nutrition, housing, water and sanitation. Children, despite being less affected by the virus itself, are bearing a disproportionate burden of the implications of the COVID-19 pandemic. Schools have been closed for months, impacting not just children's education, but also their nutrition, growth, social development, and protection. Containment measures have increased levels of violence in the home. We are in continuous efforts to work in sync with this scenario and help children in need to the maximum possibility that we can. The SSP and SHP are long standing programmes that have been running successfully - now we want to augment this platform of health and education and make our three programmes more robust in reach and implementation.



OUR PROGRAMMES

Surgery Support Program

Ekam Foundation Mumbai was started with the idea of providing access to safe, affordable and timely surgical support to less privileged children. Under this flagship programme, our team of social workers provide financial and emotional support for timely medical intervention to children from some of the most underserved communities. The thrust of the programme is to arrange subsidized elective surgeries for a variety of medical conditions like cancer, congenital heart diseases, spine and orthopaedic, ophthalmic, ENT, heart ailments, liver and bone marrow transplants, NICU and PICU support, burns and accident, and other medical and life-saving procedures essential for ensuring positive health outcomes through a network of public, trust-based and private hospitals. Most parents from economically weaker sections find themselves at crossroads when their limited financial resources need to be spared for their children's healthcare. This is true for both acute conditions that need immediate attention and chronic diseases where expensive prolonged treatment and care are needed. Most often parents come to the end of their resources in the process of treating the ailing child. Also, in such challenging times it can be hard for the caregivers to deal with complex structures of large hospitals and overwhelming medical jargon. It is here that Ekam Foundation Mumbai steps in to provide necessary medical aid and emotional support for families to wade through the difficult medical journeys of their children. In 2020- 2021 we have provided financial and psycho-social support to 558 children and their families for timely and accessible medical treatment. Out of these children 97% of them underwent successful medical intervention and have recovered and rehabilitated. We continue to follow up with their parents, especially in the aftermath of COVID 19, as majority of them being daily wagers, small farm labour, domestic workers, drivers etc. have been further pushed to the margins.



The Need

The National Health Profile (2017) published by the Central Bureau of Health Intelligence states that about a quarter of all rural households, and one in five urban families in India, are forced into debt or sale of assets to meet hospitalization costs. There is a wide gap between the demand and supply of secondary and tertiary Public Healthcare. For example, in the city of Mumbai Public Healthcare infrastructure was planned in the 1950s and 70s when the city population was about half of the present one. At the same time suburbs and satellite cities like Thane and Navi Mumbai have grown faster than the island city of Mumbai. However public healthcare infrastructure has failed to keep the same pace and the inability to improve human capital places a constraint on economic growth. In the city of Mumbai where around 50% of the population lives in slums, private healthcare is unaffordable for the majority of the population. Consequently, families sometimes have to forgo essential, and otherwise expensive, treatment that can restore the quality of their child's life.

Each year India loses more than 1 million babies under the age of 1 year. Greater than 95% of these deaths can be prevented with access to good healthcare. It is therefore imperative to provide the vulnerable children with access to quality and timely healthcare.

Project Details

Ekam Foundation Mumbai has propagated its helpline number to the key stakeholders like Community Development Officers, Doctors, Health workers, Medical Officers, Anganwadi-Sevika and School Teachers. On identifying children needing hospitalization and surgery support from underprivileged background, they get referred to the Ekam helpline. Ekam Foundation Mumbai also gets referrals from its partnership with other NGOs, who identify cases at grass root level and refer it to Ekam Foundation Mumbai for financial assistance from rural areas. Helpline acts as guidance and counselling center. Ekam Foundation Mumbai runs due diligence to verify economic back ground of the family and medical history of the child and prescribed line of treatment and Standard financial practices including external audits and cost. reporting/approval of budget and audit statements, as well as core values of transparency, accountability and integrity are integrated into our policies, practices and protocols.

Quantum of Support


Quantum of support depends on nature of illness, cost of the treatment, family economic background and other resources available at disposal. Generally, Ekam Foundation Mumbai partly supports the expenses of child, however in exceptional cases Ekam Foundation Mumbai can support 100% cost of the treatment depending on the need and resources available.




Present Locations

Our beneficiaries come from various parts of the country. Mumbai being the hub sees migrants from Jharkhand, Uttar Pradesh, Madhya Pradesh, Gujrat and other states. From 2017, Ekam Foundation November Mumbai started its operations Kolkata, West Bengal, and its catchment areas. In 2018-19, we expanded our operations to Assam and Andhrapradesh, and by 2020-21 to Tamil Nadu and Karnataka, thereby reaching out to more children in parts of northeast and southern cities of India.

Beneficiary Approval Process

The Patient Welfare Officer mans the 24/7 dedicated helpline, which acts as the guidance and counseling centre for the children and their families in need.



The Patient Welfare Officer looks into the socio-economic status and the medical history of the applicant.



The medical history of the child is communicated to the Medical Director.



Parents are requested to contribute in whatever small amount they can; they are also advised to seek part funding from other NGO's, while Ekam acts as a last mile funder by making available the remaining amount for the treatment. In rare instances, Ekam Foundation Mumbai may support the entire cost of the treatment depending on the treatment cost and family's economic position.



The Medical Director and Medical Committee members assess the history of the ailing child, his/her socio-economic status and approve Ekam Foundation Mumbai's financial support.



After seeking approval from the National Medical Director, the Patient Welfare Officer hands over an acknowledgement letter to the treating hospital.



Post-surgery/treatment, availing one-month credit period, Ekam Foundation Mumbai makes payment to the hospital directly. No payment is made to the beneficiary's family. The hospital is requested to acknowledge receipt of payments for maintaining audit trail.

Stories of Strength



Rajaryan, who comes from a family of fruit vendors in Pune, had symptoms of Jaundice and prolonged bloating when he was admitted to a hospital and was soon after diagnosed with Wilson Disease. The doctor told the family that a liver transplant was urgently required to save his life. For the family who was already grappling with the situation of prolonged treatment and scant resources due to the aggravating circumstances brought about by Covid, the greatest concern was the need for ample financial support to raise over 20 lakhs for the surgery. As they approached various trusts through the reference of the hospital where the surgery was scheduled, they also reached the doors of the Mumbai office of Ekam. Once the funds were organised the surgery was performed successfully in November 2020 and follow up treatment went smoothly too. The Ekam team has continuously been in touch with the family for follow ups as he developed post-transplant infections. Despite the financial and medical challenges, Raj has been able to respond well to all his treatment and is rehabilitating well back into a normal childhood. Meanwhile, the family is gradually getting back on its feet as they are paying off their debts. It is cases like these that remind us that correct diagnosis is crucial for timely medical intervention. "Many ups and downs were seen during the treatment, but it made the process easier with the aid of doctors and assistance from Ekam Foundation Mumbai"-Rajaryan's father.

3 months old Shivanya Hegadkar is the youngest of three daughters in a family of farmers hailing from Maharashtra. She had been suffering from excessive breathing issues and doctors detected a heart defect that needed a complicated heart surgery with a cost of 3 Lakhs.

The lockdown had put restrains on the families earnings and they did not have enough funds for the child's treatment. Namdeo who was the only earning member had hopes that little Sivanya would recover completely to have a happy and fulfilling life. So, when Ekam stepped in to part-fund the surgery cost, it took off a huge weight from Namdeo's chest.

"Shivanya is my youngest daughter. We were feeling very helpless seeing our daughter fighting this severe disease at such a young age. Now this little child is almost 9 months old and growing beautifully.

An economically less privileged cultivator's family at Chattisgarh was very happy when a cute baby girl was born. They already had a healthy and lively baby boy of five years, now with a daughter their small home was brimming with joy. But after a little while they found that the baby Nancy was having breathing difficulty and often turning blue. The local hospital told them to take the baby to a superspecialty hospital because it seemed she was suffering from a heart problem. Baby Nancy's was detected with a congenital heart problem which looked life threatening. This kind of paediatric cardiac surgery is very critical and expensive. But Nancy's father had one goal only -to save her life. After lot of discussions and searches he came to Kolkata and met doctors from a super-speciality hospital renowned and reliable for paediatric heart surgery. The cost was huge even after hospital discount, so the parents began to appeal for help. Ekam Foundation Mumbai came forward to support Nancy's surgery. She was only 4 months old in March 2021. Arterial Switch and VSD Closure surgery was performed successfully and her life was saved. A new life began for her, painless and healthy. he family is grateful to all those who came forward for saving the life of their precious daughter.

Abid, though belonging to a mason's family in Ranchi, was a bright student and very keen to pursue his studies. He was the youngest among his two brothers and three sisters. While his brothers joined his father's work, the family supported him to pursue his studies in college. Many dreams were spun. But last year when he was 17 he suddenly became very sick. The illness continued. He had to stay back at home. The family doctor at Ranchi after an extensive series of investigations diagnosed Aplastic Anaemia, the cure for which is bone marrow transplant only. Already the condition of Abid was deteriorating. Blood transfusion also was not of much help.

The family strived their level best to organize money for his treatment. First they went to AllMS, Delhi but prolonged waiting led to further deterioration. By the advice of their family physician at Ranchi they decided to come down to Kolkata and met a BMT specialist at a Cancer Hospital in Kolkata. No more time could be wasted, although the cost was still beyond their reach. They, on the advice of the hospital appealed to Ekam Foundation Mumbai. Finally their appeal was heard and a substantial donation was sanctioned. It was an Alogenic transplant. His own sister donated her stem cells. They sold their many valuable things to raise money.



After prolonged stay he was discharged to return home. When he came for check up his doctor told him he was free of the disease but he will have to live life a little cautiously and take medicines for long time. Abid and his family are very happy and convey heartfelt gratitude to Ekam Foundation Mumbai for supporting his treatment cost and save his life. Abid has started his studies again with a dream that some day he will get a good job and take care of his family.



A good education is a foundation for a better future



School Health Programme

Ekam Foundation Mumbai initiated its School Health Programme (SHP), an awareness program focusing on Health and Hygiene among the primary schools of Municipal Corporation of Greater Mumbai (MCGM), with the sole intention to bring about a behavioural change among the children and thereby bringing down morbidity and mortality on account of common communicable diseases and to promote overall health. In the past, team Ekam Foundation Mumbai has covered the following topics through this programme (a) hand washing and personal hygiene, (b) toilet etiquette and sanitation, (c) oral health, (d) safe drinking water and (e) Healthy Eating Habits with focus on nutrition and dietary practices. School is always considered an important platform, offering an efficient and effective way to reach many children, and through them, their families and community members. But the pandemic in 2020 changed everything. Schools shut down and children had to shift to online classes which were doubly challenging to the children from poorer communities, given bigger financial constraints on their families and lack of tools and gadgets to study online.

The strength of the SHP lies in continuous reinforcement of the messages imparted through each module conducted earlier. The dos and don'ts of each session are discussed at length with the children so it gets ingrained in them. In the pandemic year we kept this model of imparting awareness education online and evolved it further to include topics on road safety and maintenance of good health in monsoon. For children living in run-down neighbourhoods and slums, there is a further risk of being subjected to sexual abuse in their own communities. The Ekam team has collaborated with other expert organizations on content and facilitation of prevention of child sexual abuse. Under our School Health Programme we are continuing our sessions on POCSO and gender sensitivity and plan to reach out to all our 2500 children by end 2021.

all our 2500 children by end 2021, in 2021, Ekam Foundation in collaboration with STEAM Academy has launched an innovative basic science education programme for secondary school students blending textbook content with museum based objects. The objective is to fill the gaps in book based knowledge and to foster curiosity in Stem subjects

In 2020–2021 we have collaborated with Arpan, an organization that works towards prevention of Child Sexual Abuse. As part of our capacity building work Arpan organized 'Training of Trainers' for our team at Ekam and the school teachers we work with. The training helped the team learn how to implement sessions in an online format on sensitive topics.







Ekam Education Fund

According the Ministry of Human Resources and Development 6.2 million children are out of school in India. There is also a wide gender gap within the ambit of Right to Education (ACT), as the school dropout rate continues to be higher for girls compared to boys. Traditional norms and socio-economic boundaries set for girls put greater responsibilities of household chores or sibling care on them, thereby leading to their higher dropout rate.


Keeping in view the well-being of children, and especially girls or children with disabilities, we started Ekam Education Fund in 2019 to help underprivileged children access good quality education in institution and schools that provide value based education across country.

Low End Private (LEP) or 'Budget School' is the term coined for those projected as responding to the growing demand of poor families for good quality private English medium education. There has been a significant growth of the private sector in elementary education in India in recent times. According to the Indian Human Development Survey (IHDS) carried out in 2005, as many as 51 per cent of children in urban areas and 21 per cent in rural areas were enrolled in private unaided schools. Further as per IHDS report 15 per cent of enrolment of children aged 6-14 years in the lowest income quartile, as compared to 52 per cent in the top quintile, in private unaided schools. Also, there is a serious dearth of public schools for secondary level education in highly populated settlements.

These LEP schools charge low tuition fees, and hence meet the demand from poorest of families for private, good quality education. Location of these schools is usually convenient, closer to the marginalized settlements and hence easily accessible to children, especially girls.

These children are often first generation learners. The vast majority of low income parents aspire to send their children to English medium schools so as to secure a middle-class job. This underlines the need to serve the vast children population studying in these schools. Therefore, Ekam Foundation Mumbai targets low end private schools, which cater to children from the low-end income group of the society. These schools typically charge fees between Rs 500 a month to Rs. 1500 a month but most parents working as daily wagers cannot even afford that.


In the aftermath of COVID-19 restrictions, they are further marginalized and millions of children, especially girls have been at risk of dropout. Ekam Foundation Mumbai supports education fees of underprivileged children studying in standard 6th to 12th under this programme and guides them through the completion of their academics. After thorough evaluation in 2019–20, we identified 25 (16 girls and 9 boys) adolescent students who have received Ekam Education Fund (Scholarships) for the academic year 2020–2021.



Ekam Education Fund Scorecard

In a span of two weeks during Daan Utsav (2nd to 11th October 2020) we raised over Rs. 4,00,000 for Ekam Education Fund through a small but growing retail base.

It enabled us to support education of total 28 (19 girls and 9 boys) deserving scholars through 2021, whom we identified after a thorough evaluation in 2019–20 across 6 schools in Mumbai and Kolkata. Now this cohort is growing and has at present 35 scholars who will be supported in the academic year 2021–22 as well. As a part of the EEF we have launched the Sri C.V. Kumar Scholarship and the Unnati Scholarship for girls who have graduated class 10th and aspire for higher studies. In this academic year, 12 girls have been awarded these scholarships.







Muskan was studying in class 10th during the pandemic. She lives with her younger brother and grandparents in Mumbai. They migrated from Assam in 2008 and the family is taken care of by the grandfather alone. It would have been heartbreaking for me if I had to dropout in Class 10th after years of hard work. Monitoring and Evaluation

We maintain a robust and ethical system of data collection for our beneficiaries across programmes and any research that we conduct. For SSP we have developed control sheets to monitor the medical journey of each child. From the time of admission to follow-ups with hospitals and finally to successful recovery, each patient is assigned a social worker from our team for constant socio-psychological support. We develop monthly budget and outreach trackers along with qualitative reports for all our programmes. As we intend to further automate our processes we will soon be developing a data tabulation app for efficient data collection and analysis for our programmes. We have successfully catered to over 2600 kids since our inception. Our outreach has expanded and our network of hospitals has grown from 16 hospitals in 2017 to more than 130 hospitals. Our ticket for average support has gone up to 1 lakh for cancer and critical CHD cases as now we have donors specifically sponsoring big ticket prominent cases.

This health awareness programme at the school level as envisioned has completed its coverage of nearly 1000 municipal schools and more than 50 LEP schools even before the onset of the pandemic. With schools going online, we have successfully transformed to digital content and our staff also has been adequately trained to impart such programs digitally. In the aftermath of the pandemic, the EEF has given us a new need to support children with academic interests and dreams of a better future. We are in continuous efforts to work in sync with this scenario and help children in need to the maximum possibility that we can. We are working with other NGOs in training our team in POCSO related topics which we impart to the children in special safety and prevention sessions. Our target in EEF school fee support is to cover 50 children per year where we support upto 75% of their annual tuition fees, or provide with gadgets like tablets for online study; and separately give scholarships to 10–15 deserving girls in 2021 for them to continue their studies till their 12th grade.

Other than the actual running of the programs we have periodic newsletter updates, yearly reports (Annual Report) and quarterly review sessions with our advisory board to assess ourselves. This year we are doing a visioning exercise with an external evaluator to help us align our vision and goals with our work and help build better visibility.

The Year In Highlights

- In August 2020 Ekam Foundation Mumbai supported the Paediatric Ward of MCGM COVID Hospital in BKC, Mumbai with 5 units of EMCO Multipara monitors. The new paediatric ward of the hospital began with crucial support to children with disabilities in their fight against COVID 19.
- CSA sessions was conducted by our team and school teachers with 200 children (10-14 years) from December 2020 to February 2021. Over the three months, participants learnt A) Personal Safety Education B) What is Child Sexual Abuse? and C) A brief understanding of what the law says (POCSO Act)
- In October 2020, Ekam Foundation Mumbai donated DVD players and an air purifier to Atman Academy for a facility that caters to children with disabilities, in Thane
- In collaboration with Red Is The New Green organization, Ekam Mumbai distributed over 500 eco-friendly, long lasting and affordable sanitary pads in slum settlements across M East Ward
- We have augmented our network across Maharshtra, West Bengal, Assam, Tamil
 Nadu, Andhra Pradesh, Karnataka and have reached over 100 hospitals
- In a span of two weeks during Daan Utsav (2nd to 11th October 2020) we raised over Rs. 4,00,000 for Ekam Education Fund through an online event of Tambola.
- From January 2021, we have collaborated with STEAM Academy for science based learning for school kids.
- We published our Annual Report in-house for two successive years, saving on design cost.





Way Forward

The unprecedented challenges of 2020 have rolled into an equally uncertain 2021 and we are all finding newer ways to adapt to the 'new normal'. Our team at Ekam Foundation Mumbai works from both home and office to ensure that none of our beneficiaries suffer due to lack of resources in these rough times. Though it has been overwhelming to balance safety measures and yet continue our timely support to children, we have only emerged more resilient. We are reimagining all our programmes in the light of this pandemic and subsequent restrictions on meeting people. Our Surgery Support programme continues across all our locations virtually, in close collaboration with hospitals and other stakeholders. Other than the SSP we will continue mobilising funds for our interim programme of Covid-relief work and reach out to hospitals in need, both in cities and rural areas of Indi

Our Ekam Education Fund & Scholarships will continue its support to many more adolescent girls in 2021–22 as there has been a high risk of dropout due to extreme financial losses. Further, as experts predict 20% of girls will drop-out of schools in India by next financial year. In efforts of transforming the classrooms, taking them to the online world has had its gendered impact.

Despite the use of the internet penetrating the remotest corners of the country, there is wide gap in access for women and men. According to a study by Oxfam, 80% parents feel that the online classes during the lockdown have failed, especially for the marginalized communities. Some students have been luckier than others who can get access to the sole smart phone in the family. We will continue to monitor and guide the students who have received our scholarships; going forward we will also be conducting life skills and leadership modules with them. Some of them are already part of our SHP programme and will become peer leaders in their communities on child health and nutrition.
