## A CONCURRENT RESOLUTION Honoring the 6888th Central Postal Directory Battalion

The South Carolina Legislative Black Caucus is proud to announce that a

concurrent resolution was made on February 27th, 2025 by the General Assembly to recognize and honor the remarkable members of the 6888th Central Postal Directory Battalion. Known as the "Six Triple Eight," this all-Black, all-female unit of the Women's Army Corps made history during World War II by clearing a massive backlog of mail for U.S. troops stationed in Europe. Their dedication and persistence ensured that millions of letters and packages reached soldiers, strengthening the connections between service members and their loved ones.

Despite serving their country with distinction, the women of the 6888th faced both racial and gender discrimination. Yet, through resilience and determination, they not only completed their mission ahead of schedule but also paved the way for future generations of Black women in the military. This resolution is a long-overdue acknowledgment of their sacrifice and service, ensuring their legacy is honored and remembered. The 6888th Battalion embodies the spirit of perseverance and excellence, and we celebrate their contributions to history with deep gratitude and respect.

As we reflect on the impact of the 6888th Central Postal Directory Battalion, we recognize that their story is a powerful reminder of the role Black women have played in shaping our nation's history. Their bravery and dedication serve as an inspiration for all who continue to fight for justice, equality, and recognition. The South Carolina State Legislative Black Caucus remains committed to uplifting and preserving the legacies of Black trailblazers, ensuring their contributions are never forgotten.

# Historically Black Colleges & Universities (HBCU) Day in South Carolina

On February 22, 2022, Governor Henry McMaster signed House Bill 4576, officially designating the third Thursday in February as Historically Black Colleges and Universities (HBCU) Day. This landmark bill, introduced by Representative Deon Tedder (now Senator Tedder), acknowledges the strengths and myriad contributions of South Carolina's eight HBCUs: Clinton

College, South Carolina State University, Allen University, Morris College, Benedict College, Claflin University, Voorhees University, and Denmark Technical College.

Excitement and anticipation filled the State House as Presidents and students from these esteemed institutions gathered to mark the occasion. The students, dressed professionally in school blazers, tiaras, and crowns, exemplified the qualities of future leaders. Their presence demonstrated that HBCU students are diverse, confident, and ready to accept the challenges of leadership.

The day commenced with a networking breakfast, providing students and Presidents with opportunities to participate in empowerment sessions and engage with members of the South Carolina Legislative Black Caucus. College and University Presidents proudly introduced themselves and their student leaders, creating a sense of family and unity among the HBCU community.

During the morning, HBCU delegations participated in sessions focused on financial literacy, the significance of HBCUs, and Black Wall Street, while the Presidents and their student leaders attended the Weekly Meeting of the South Carolina Legislative Black Caucus. The highlight of the day was Governor Henry McMaster's address to the students, where he expressed his support and encouraged them to continue their education.

The attendees then walked to the State House, where they participated in a press conference, showcasing their leadership and readiness to tackle future challenges. Before heading to Benedict College for lunch and an HBCU competition, the students took their traditional photographs on the steps of the State House.

# Groundbreaking Ceremony for New Interstate Access for Scout Motors

The South Carolina Department of Transportation along with local and state officials and Scout Motors leadership participated in the groundbreaking ceremony for the new Scout Motors Drive Interchange Project. The South Carolina Legislative Black Caucus was represented by Chair, Rep. Annie E. McDaniel, Sen. Tameika Isaac Devine, Rep. Hamilton R. Grant, Rep. Jermaine L. Johnson, Sr., and Rep. Kambrell H. Garvin.

Officials at Scout Motors anticipated the additional traffic their new plant would cause in the area. With a new state-of-the-art facility being built off of the I-77-North interstate, the facility is designed to create over 4,000 permanent jobs. there is a need to provide options to keep the traffic flowing smoothly.

The new interstate access for the Scout Motors Interchange will provide a dedicated connection to I-77 to help keep truck traffic confined and provide access for future economic development.

The South Carolina Legislative Black Caucus looks forward to

collaborating with fellow members of the South Carolina Legislature to bring more companies to South Carolina to boost the economy and provide jobs.

## Standing on the Shoulders of Giants

Black History Month & Pre-Women's History Month Reception

It was the remarks from some of the past chairs of the South Carolina Legislative Black Caucus that set the tone for the evening at the Black History Month & Pre-Women's History Month Reception. This reception honored some of the past chairs of the South Carolina Legislative Black Caucus and it recognized a famous South Carolinian who was featured in the movie *The Six Triple Eight*.

Speaking on behalf of her father, The Honorable Theo W. Mitchell, who was the second chair of the South Carolina Legislative Black Caucus, Dr. Megan Mitchell-Hoefner reminisced on her days as a child where she interacted with the SCLBC members at various events. She would sit and listen to them strategize as they prepared for the legislative session during their annual meeting. The lessons she learned from them helped

to prepare her for the future.

As the first African American woman to be elected as a member of the South Carolina Senate and the first female chair of the SCLBC, The Honorable Maggie W. Glover made sure that those persons in attendance knew how to accomplish their goals. She began her remarks by quoting The Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. when he said: "It may be well that the greatest tragedy of this period of social transition is not the glaring noisiness of bad people, but the appalling silence of good people." If you really want to accomplish something, you cannot remain silent, and you must stay with the decisions that the group makes.

Former SCLBC Chair, Rep. I. S. Leevy Johnson told those in attendance about the early days of the SCLBC where they strategized and worked hard to be a part of each legislative committee in order to stay abreast of pending legislation. They made a concerted effort to know what was going on so that they could be more effective legislators. Rep. Johnson stressed the importance of teamwork and not remaining silent. You cannot remain silent, even if you do not win.

Lieutenant Colonel Charity Edna Adams Earley was recognized by the SCLBC as one of the women portrayed in *The Six Triple Eight* movie written and produced by Tyler Perry. The movie tells the story of the first all-Black Women's Army Corps (WAC) unit to serve in Europe during World War II. These women joined the war effort to address a three-year mail backlog. Despite discrimination and war-torn conditions, they sorted over seventeen million pieces of mail ahead of schedule. Lt. Col. Earley was a charter member and served as the first President of the Beta Beta Sigma Chapter of Delta Sigma Theta Sorority, Inc., now known as Columbia (SC) Alumnae Chapter.

The South Carolina Legislative Black Caucus stands on the shoulders of many African American giants who have empowered them to help to shape the laws of South Carolina and this nation. The inspirational stories of our giants are a reminder of the struggles they endured to protect our freedoms. We must learn from them as we continue the fight for justice and equality.

# FARMASIS Women Can Provide A Lifeline for the Health of Everyone

Speaking to a captivated audience at a meeting of the South Carolina Legislative Black Caucus (SCLBC), Bonita Clemons passionately proclaimed that farming has always been in her blood. Her love for the profession was evident throughout her interactive presentation. From a young age, Clemons knew she wanted to farm, and even after graduating from Benedict College, her passion for farming remained unwavering. She pursued her dream and is now making a healthy difference in the lives of many. In a male-dominated industry, Clemons was named the South Carolina Farmer of the Year in 2023 by the South Carolina Black Farmers Coalition.

Clemons shared with the SCLBC her desire to educate other Black women about farming, which led her to establish FARMASIS. At FARMASIS, Clemons hosts weekly outdoor classes off of Farrow Road, where she teaches women the "whys," "hows," "ins," and "outs" of farming. She provides guidance on how to make their gardens profitable, emphasizing that women can indeed make a living from farming, just like men. Clemons firmly believes that farming encourages healthier eating habits, and she proudly consumes everything she grows.

Through her dedication and efforts, Bonita Clemons is not only empowering women but also promoting a healthier lifestyle for everyone. Her work serves as an inspiration and a testament to the impact that passionate individuals can have on their communities.
