BILLS THAT IMPACT US

Hate Crimes Bill Still Warranted In SC

Thank you to county councils and city councils, which have adopted Hate Crimes Ordinances. We also encourage school districts to enact Hate Crime Policies. Despite the prevalence of hate crime legislation in many states, South Carolina remains one of the few without a statewide hate crime law. While federal hate crime statutes can be applied in certain cases, their scope is limited, and they do not cover all bias-motivated crimes that might occur within the state. This absence means that individuals who commit crimes motivated by hate in South Carolina may not face the same enhanced penalties as they would in jurisdictions with such laws. Advocates for a state-level hate crime law argue that its implementation would provide stronger protection for vulnerable communities, deter bias-motivated violence more effectively, and align South Carolina with the majority of other states that have adopted similar legislation. HATE CRIME ORDINANCES IN SOUTH CAROLINA

Municipal Association Establishes List of Hate Crimes Ordinances

A growing number of cities and towns in South Carolina have responded to the General Assembly's lack of action in passing hate crimes legislation by passing their own hate crimes ordinances, which the Municipal Association of SC has compiled a list.

Unborn Child Protection Act Senate Bill 323

As of September 2025, the most significant abortion bill currently under consideration by the South Carolina Senate is Senate Bill 323 (S.323), the "Unborn Child Protection Act." It is scheduled for a hearing before the Senate Medical Affairs Subcommittee on **October 1, 2025**. The bill would implement a near-total ban on abortions in the state and expand existing restrictions.

Key provisions of S. 323

If passed, S. 323 would:

• **Create a near-total ban.** It prohibits abortion from the moment of conception by equating it with homicide, effectively eliminating the current six-week "fetal heartbeat" cutoff.

- **Eliminate exceptions.** It removes the exceptions for rape, incest, and fatal fetal anomalies that were included in the current six-week ban.
- **Criminalize providing information.** It would be a felony to provide information about obtaining an abortion, including by phone or online.
- **Restrict birth control and IVF**. It would define a "human embryo" as a fertilized egg and alter the definition of a legal contraceptive, potentially leading to restrictions on some forms of birth control and in vitro fertilization (IVF).
- **Mandate propaganda in schools.** The bill would require public schools to show students a video called "Meet Baby Olivia."


Protect Freedom of Speech
