The February 2025 meeting of the Special Education Citizens Advisory Committee (SEACAC) featured guest speaker Dr. Laura McKenna, an autism and education advocate, who discussed post-secondary transition pathways for students with disabilities. Dr. McKenna emphasized the importance of early planning, starting from freshman year of high school, and outlined various options including traditional four-year colleges, community colleges, trade schools, and transition programs. She highlighted the need for thorough documentation of disabilities for SSI and Medicaid applications, and the importance of long-term planning to ensure support for students' future independence and employment.

#### Introduction of Dr. Laura McKenna
