

How do we get access to educator networks, training opportunities, and resource persons to grow our program and build capacity?

What challenges should we expect when working with these partners?


What are some indicators that can tell us which connections are growing more important to the program?

What does collaboration mean in our site? Are there traditional or local ways of working together that we can emulate or tap into?

Will we need permissions from government agencies, village bodies, or individuals? Will these permissions require contracts that we can draft already?

How do we keep ethical considerations in mind when involving children in our program?
