Ask 3 elders from the community about their "adventures" with wild animals in the forest or fields. Record their stories and experiences.

☐ Exploration #6: Season wheel

Create a wheel of the seasons of your place: How many seasons are there? How does the landscape and biodiversity change? Which crops are grown and harvested, and when?

☐ Exploration #10: Go on a Photo-walk

Take a walk around your site with a photography device (camera, phone, etc.). Take photos of everything you find interesting and create a collage of your pictures!

☐ Exploration #4: Plants at Home

What are some plants we eat and use to make household materials?
Collect, name, and label the leaves of these plants with their uses!

Exploration #8:Childhood Memories

Start a conversation with 3 senior members of the place with, "Your childhood must have been so different..." Record their stories and experiences.

What challenges should we expect when working with these partners?


What are some indicators that can tell us which connections are growing more important to the program?
