Fortunately, administrators have several options to manage extensions in Chrome, including configuration settings that offer more granular controls than traditional blacklisting and whitelisting methods. One approach involves blocking or allowing extensions based on their behavior or permissions. Permissions define what access an extension needs to function correctly, such as device permissions for accessing devices or site permissions for accessing websites. The manifest file declares these permissions, and understanding them is crucial for determining acceptable extensions for the organization's environment. Chrome Browser Cloud Management provides a useful tool for discovering which extensions are installed on enrolled machines and their associated permissions. For G Suite customers, this functionality can be accessed through the Device Management section of the Admin console.By identifying which extensions are live in the environment and creating a baseline of allowed or blocked permissions, administrators can centrally allow or block extensions based on those criteria. This approach eliminates the need for lengthy whitelists or blacklists and provides an additional layer of protection by blocking extensions from sensitive sites while allowing them to run on other sites.Admins can control which browser extensions are used by their organization through options. The force install feature lets administrators automatically install extensions without notifying the users. Users cannot uninstall these extensions once they're installed. For more information, refer to the enterprise documentation.Your organization's private Chrome Web Store is accessible via a unique URL that specifies your Google Workspace domain. Only users signed into Chrome with their organization credentials can access it. To enable this feature, admins must go to Devices > Chrome > Apps & extensions > Users & browsers > Additional settings > Chrome Web store permissions.The domain publishing option allows administrators to publish an extension on the private Chrome Web Store for all users in their organization to install. This way, only users within your organization can see and use these extensions. Publishing extensions this way also speeds up the review process. When enabled, a new option appears in the developer console's distribution page.Additionally, there are features like collections, blocklist, and allowlist that administrators can use to control which extensions are available or blocked for their users. These controls are set using policies in the extensions atomic policy group.The typical usage of organization extensions pertains to workflow and core business operation support. Note that users cannot remove force-installed extensions. If the "Only to my domain" option is not visible under private publishing, ensure that you are logged in using your domain identity and that domain publishing has been configured by your administrator.Extension update issues may arise due to Chrome's update pull interval from the Chrome Web Store. Ensure that users remain logged into Chrome with their domain identity for several hours at a time.When an extension is published to a domain but not visible on the Chrome Web Store, check the following: A review process occurs between submission and availability, which can take some time; extensions roll out gradually, so some users may see updates before others; and verify that you're accessing the private Chrome Web Store URL.Chrome Browser Cloud Management offers powerful and flexible management capabilities for both cloud and on-premises environments at no additional cost.
