The district's administrative offices are located on the south bank of the St. Johns River in a six-story building at 1701 Prudential Drive. Duval County Public Schools is governed by the Duval County School Board, a body comprising seven elected officers who each represent a specific geographic area. Each school board district has two council districts, and the current board members are Kelly Coker, April Carney, Cindy Pearson, Darryl Willie, Warren Jones, Charlotte Joyce, and Lori Hershey. These members serve four-year terms with two-term limits.The district operates 163 regular-attendance schools, including 102 elementary schools, 24 middle schools, 2 K-8 schools, 2 6-12 schools, and 19 high schools. Additionally, DCPS has an adult education system through its Bridge to Success program and Parent Academy, as well as dedicated ESE schools, a hospital/homebound program, virtual school, and six alternative education centers. The district uses an attendance model of Kindergarten through Grade 5 for elementary schools, Grades 6-8 for middle schools, and Grades 9-12 for high schools since 1991.DCPS offers a wide variety of programs to its students, including pre-Kindergarten education available to all children from the age of 4. The district also has magnet schools that offer specialized courses in fields such as the arts, aviation, culinary skills, language, law & legal occupations, mathematics, public service, science, and technology. Some schools serve both neighborhood students and those residing outside their specified boundary, with admission determined by lottery.In recent years, Duval County Public Schools has received significant funding for educational initiatives, including a 1.2 million dollar School Improvement Grant in February 2016 to develop STEM labs in 11 Title-1 schools. The district operates both dedicated magnets and non-dedicated magnet schools that offer specialized courses to students.Duval County's educational landscape is shaped by its diverse range of schools. Alongside neighborhood schools with magnet programs, there are 34 charter schools operating within the county's boundaries under state-sanctioned contracts. Notably, Duval County Public Schools (DCPS) does not oversee daily operations and governance for these charters, despite being publicly funded.According to recent data, traditional or boundary schools in Duval County have consistently demonstrated strong performance. In 2024, an impressive 91% of such schools scored at least a grade of A, B, or C. Charter schools, on the other hand, saw 78% achieve these marks. The district has also been home to some of the most challenging high schools in the US, as Stanton College Preparatory School and Paxon School for Advanced Studies ranked among the top 25 in 2015.Additionally, several Duval County schools have made notable appearances on prestigious lists. For example, Newsweek's "Catching Up" list features 33 disadvantaged schools nationwide that encourage students to participate in Advanced Placement programs. While these schools are not included in the Best High Schools list due to their lower pass rates for AP exams, they demonstrate a commitment to academic rigor and preparation.Duval County's educational performance is further highlighted by its rankings among Florida's 72 school districts. According to FCAT data, Duval County stands at 51 for high schools, 52 for middle schools, and 42 for elementary schools. This performance has been sustained over time, with the district introducing programs like Educators of Change in 2007 to identify future teachers from outside the education sector.The county's growth is also reflected in its educational infrastructure. Atlantic Coast High School, which opened in 2010, was constructed at a cost of \$78 million and aimed to alleviate overcrowding at existing high schools. The district serves over 128,000 students across various categories, with an exceptional graduation rate of 78.8%. The student body is composed of diverse ethnicities, including African Americans (43%), Caucasians (34%), Hispanics (13%), Multiracial individuals (5%), Asians (5%), and Native Americans (
