For example, Normalization and Database Design Diagrams are covered before SQL code for creating a database, which seems backwards. These topics aren't mentioned by name until chapter 3, where "SQL" isn't even mentioned once. Advice to reader: If you must buy this book, get the eBook version - it makes indexing much easier. Advice to author: Create databases that readers can understand. This is an intro text, so many will be seeing databases for the first time. Using columns like STORHOUSE and ON_HAND adds unfamiliar terminology to a difficult topic, making it boring. Instead, create a database from a fast food menu with columns like PRICE, CALORIES, PATTY_TYPE - it's more relatable and engaging.
