The Thomas Jefferson Arts Academy is a public high school located in Elizabeth, New Jersey, that specializes in the visual, performing, and media arts. Located in historic Midtown, the school serves students in ninth through twelfth grades as part of the Elizabeth Public Schools. The school was established in 1928 as an all-boys high school and named after Thomas Jefferson, the primary author of the Declaration of Independence and third president of the United States. Thomas Jefferson Arts Academy ranks 115th nationally in a new ranking published by The Washington Post in 2016, out of 339 schools across New Jersey. The school's curriculum is designed to prepare students for post-secondary education while developing their creative talents through various studio programs. Students can choose from five options: Audio and Visual Media, Creative Writing, Performing Arts, Theater, and Visual Arts. Each program requires an audition and entry interview, and students are encouraged to participate in extracurricular activities to enhance their skills. AVID is a college-readiness system that provides support for students who may need academic assistance or are first-generation college attendees. The program includes daily elective courses, tutorials, and career readiness experiences to help students succeed. Graduation requirements include completing 140 credit hours of coursework, 60 hours of community service, and meeting New Jersey's statewide assessment graduation requirements. Students also have the opportunity to exhibit their work in school and throughout the community. =====As part of the audition process for media and television production, students are required to create a short video showcasing their interest in studying the subject. This can be submitted via mini-DV tape, DVD, or uploaded electronically through a designated platform. The video should clearly display the student's full name, ID number, and current school affiliation. In addition to highlighting genuine enthusiasm and creativity, the video may also incorporate visual media elements such as graphics, text overlays, or music. Alternatively, students can use cameras provided on-site to create their video during the audition session. In the creative writing component, students must prepare a comprehensive portfolio consisting of three poems, one work of fiction, and a reflection page. The poems should be substantial in length (at least 15 lines), while the work of fiction may be a first draft but must demonstrate considerable ambition or length (at least 400-500 words). The reflection page serves as an opportunity for students to express their goals, current projects, and past experiences with literary and writing endeavors. The performing arts section involves selecting an audition focus, which can include dance, instrumental music, vocal music, or theater. For dance, students participate in a mini-ballet/modern combination class and perform a five-minute solo dance, while incorporating musical accompaniment. In instrumental music, students prepare to play a piece from memory or sheet music, demonstrate proficiency on major and minor scales (up to 4 flats and 4 sharps), and execute various chords. Vocal music requires students to prepare an a cappella song (not exceeding one minute) and sing several scales while a teacher plays the piano. For theater, students perform a memorized monologue (one to three minutes) that showcases their ability to portray a character and engage with the audience. Monologues may be dramatic or comedic in nature. The audition focuses on how well the performer conveys a character's emotions and intentions. In visual arts, students submit a portfolio of original artwork featuring at least five pieces that demonstrate evidence of visual experience and artistic talents. This includes the capacity to learn different media and display strengths in color, composition, two-dimensional and three-dimensional concepts, creativity, tone, and presentation. Portfolio pieces may be original or representational drawings from life, demonstrating entry-level skills for concentrations such as Drawing & Painting, Photography, Sculpture, Creative Crafts, and Graphic Design. Thomas Jefferson Arts Academy students participate in various sports under the Elizabeth Minutemen banner, competing in the Union County Interscholastic Athletic Conference. With an enrollment of 5,049 students in grades 10-12, the school is classified as Group IV by the NJSIAA for athletic competition purposes. The school's principal is Mona Wanis, with a core administration team including two vice principals. The school website and contact information are available through various online platforms.
