Charity Scam Checklist

Initial Response to Donation Requests

- I took time to think about the donation request rather than responding immediately
- I didn't feel pressured by urgent or emotional appeals
- I asked specific questions about how my donation would be used
- I received clear, detailed answers about the charity's programs

Research Steps

- I verified the exact name of the charity (watching for "soundalike" names)
- I searched for the charity on one of these watchdog sites:
 - Charity Navigator (charitynavigator.org)
 - Better Business Bureau's
 Wise Giving Alliance
 (give.org)
 - ☐ CharityWatch (charitywatch.org)
- I checked if the charity is registered with my state's charity regulator

- I searched the charity's name online along with words like
 "complaint," "scam," or "review"
- I visited the charity's official website (verifying the URL is correct)
- I called the charity using a phone number I found independently (not one provided in the solicitation)

Red Flags to Watch For

- The charity did NOT:
 - Request cash-only donations
 - Offer to send a courier to collect my donation
 - Ask for payment via wire transfers or gift cards
 - Thank me for previous donations I don't remember making
 - Use high-pressure tactics or make me feel guilty
 - □ Refuse to provide written information about their organization



Transparency Verification

- The charity provided or has available:
 - ☐ Financial information or annual reports
 - Clear explanation of their mission and programs
 - ☐ Information about their leadership team
 - ☐ A physical address (not just a P.O. box)
 - Details about what percentage of donations go to programs versus administration

My Personal Giving Plan

- I've created a charity budget for the year
- I've researched causes that are important to me
- I've prepared a list of pre-verified charities I trust
- I've planned my disaster relief donations in advance

If I Suspect a Charity Scam

- Report to the Federal Trade
 Commission at
 ReportFraud.ftc.gov
- Contact my state's charity regulator or Attorney General's office

- File a report with the National Center for Disaster Fraud (for disaster-related scams) at 866-720-5721
- Alert the legitimate organization if scammers are impersonating them
