General Notes

• Order of Examination

Candidates will begin their assessment with Performance Pieces, followed by Technical Exercises.

• Performance Pieces

Candidates will perform three prepared pieces. At least one piece must be chosen from the relevant KMCP grade repertoire book, and up to two pieces can be free-choice selections. Each performance must demonstrate technical skill, musical expression, and stylistic interpretation reflective of K-pop standards.

Expectations of Knowledge, Skills and Understanding

KMCP assessments are designed to evaluate a candidate's ability to demonstrate progressive mastery in K-pop performance, highlighting technical and musical expertise. Successful candidates should exhibit a deep understanding of their selected pieces and the technical exercises required at their grade level. Learners should have developed practical and technical skills necessary to perform accurately and musically. This includes precise articulation, rhythm, pitch, and dynamic control. Candidates are also expected to showcase stylistic understanding, creativity, and musical interpretation aligned with K-pop industry standards.

Quality Assurance

All KMCP assessments are evaluated by certified examiners following rigorous standards to ensure fairness, consistency, and adherence to KMCP's established protocols.

CANDIDATES ACCESS AND REGISTRATION

Free choice pieces must meet the following criteria:

- 1. Demonstrate a comparable level of technical and musical difficulty as the graded repertoire.
- 2. Showcase the candidate's strengths in K-pop performance, including keyboard technique, expression, and stylistic interpretation.

Free choice pieces maybe selected from various K-pop genres, including:

 Dance
 R&B/Soul
 Hip-Hop
 Fusion K-pop

The submission of a backing track (instrumental MR) for free-choice pieces is optional.

General Notes

The following general notes apply to all KMCP Grade Examinations:

FREE CHOICE PIECES

For all Keys grades, candidates are able to play a number of free choice pieces in the examination:

• Grade Examinations: Two Free Choice Piece (the remaining One pieces must be selected from the official KMCP grade book).

Free Choice Pieces must meet the technical and musical standards required for the respective grade and showcase a range of techniques and stylistic elements appropriate to the level.

Free Choice Pieces may be performed:

With a backing track (excluding the tested section on the track).

As a solo piece (without a backing track).

Please note: If the Free Choice Piece does not align with KMCP criteria, it may negatively impact the final marks. Candidates are encouraged to carefully select pieces that meet the required standards.

If you have any questions or doubts about the appropriateness of your chosen Free Choice Piece, please contact KMCP support via email, and a representative will provide assistance.

NOTATION

All pieces are required to be performed using standard notation. If candidates wish to perform alternative arrangements (e.g., personal improvisations, simplified or modified versions), they must ensure the musical and technical integrity of the piece is maintained. Pieces should be performed with the required level of complexity and artistry suitable for the grade level.

Exclusions for all arrangements

- Candidates are not allowed to remove or simplify essential sections of a piece.
- Any adjustments that reduce the technical or musical challenge of the piece are not permitted.
- For All Grades: If two-handed or open-voiced chords notated in the pieces are unachievable, candidates may similarly reduce the number of notes in the voicing or play the chord as a spread chord, as long as it fits the stylistic context.
- For All Grades: Candidates have the freedom to execute notated chords using either hand or a combination of both hands.

Exclusions and guidance for Keys arrangements

- Patch Settings: Suggested patch settings in arrangements are provided as guidelines. Due to
 differences in keyboard instruments, candidates may need to use equivalent or similar sounds.
 However, candidates will be assessed on their ability to manipulate sound settings during
 performance (e.g., setting patches, switching sounds, assigning layers, and using modulation effects)
 as indicated in the score.
- Notated Pitches: Notated pitches represent the audible pitch of the assessed part unless otherwise specified or where the patch sound includes alternative timbral possibilities, such as synth patches spanning multiple octaves.
- Patch Assignment: Patch assignments for left and right hands are provided as recommendations and may be freely interpreted, provided the sound manipulations indicated in the score are followed (refer to the first exclusion).

ADAPTATION AND PERSONALISATION OF PIECES

Candidates should perform pieces as notated, except where they choose to embellish or rework sections. (Note: This does not apply to technical exercises or unseen tests, which must be performed exactly as written.) For sections marked for ad lib., improvisation, or development, candidates will be assessed on their ability to present personalised material in a manner that is stylistically appropriate and matches the grade level. All personalised performances must have a clear foundation in the original notated material.

KEYBOARD SPECIFICATION

Candidates must use a suitable keyboard that meets the requirements of their grade level.

Additional equipment may be used if necessary, provided it adheres to the following criteria:

- Level 1 –2 and Grades 1–3: A keyboard with at least 61 keys, including touch sensitivity. Only piano and basic accompaniment sounds are required.
- Grades 4-5: A keyboard with at least 76 keys, supporting a variety of tones, effects, and accompaniment functions.
- Grades 6-8: A full-size 88-key keyboard is mandatory. Advanced sound layering, sound effects, and touch response must be supported.

Keyboard instruments with multiple voice/timbre options and the ability to store and manipulate settings according to the level are suitable for KMCP Keyboard Exams. Alternatively, MIDI keyboards and laptop setups may also be used. However, for piano arrangement pieces, it is essential to use a realistic piano sound.

Additionally, it is recommended that keyboard instruments or laptop/MIDI keyboard setups have the following functions :

Level 1 and Grades 1-3

- · Single patch settings and registrations
- · Basic layering (e.g piano/pad)
- Pitch band/modulation (grade 3 upwards)

Note: octave transposition facilities for smaller keyboards may be required, depending on repertoire selection

Grade 4-5

- Multiple patch settings and registrations
- Splits
- Pitch bend/modulation

- Layers
- Octave transposition facilities

Grade 6-8

- Multiple patch settings and registrations
- Multiple splits
- Pitch bend/modulation

- Multiple layering
- · Octave transposition facilities

Please note that digital pianos may not have the full range of functions required for KMCP Keyboard Exams.

For further inquiries, candidates can contact the KMCP office via email at piareno@piareno.com Candidates are advised to confirm practical arrangements with their chosen examination center in advance. Additionally, candidates should arrange for their own assistance to transport and set up their equipment on the day of the exam.

All equipment must be practical and reasonably portable to avoid disrupting the exam schedule. If any required outcomes for a particular grade cannot be demonstrated or are demonstrated less effectively due to limitations of the equipment, this may be reflected in the marks awarded.

Candidates are not permitted to use pre-programmed backing tracks or internally generated, pre-programmed rhythms during the exam.

MAKING NOTES IN THE EXAM

KMCP exams are conducted online, and candidates are not permitted to make notes or record anything in any form during the exam.

However, for Technical Exercises, it is allowed to reference study materials that include notes made during the preparation process. These notes must have been prepared prior to the exam, and no additional notes or modifications are allowed during the exam.

In Sight Reading, candidates are evaluated based on the provided sheet music, and the use of additional notes or materials is not permitted.

Candidates are advised to practice thoroughly and prepare well in advance to ensure no reference materials are needed during the exam.

Level 1

The Level 1 Keys exam is designed for candidates who are at the beginning of their musical journey. This level introduces fundamental skills, basic techniques, coordination, and foundational musical understanding. It is suitable for those who have been learning for a short period and are ready to build confidence in playing simple pieces and exercises.

PREPARED WORK

Candidates are required to perform a total of Three pieces, consisting of :

One performance pieces selected from the relevant grade book.

Two free choice piece, which must meet KMCP standard and can be freely chosen by the candidate.

EXAM STRUCTURE

The Level 1 exam lasts 15 minutes and follows this structure:

- Performance Pieces
- Technical Exercises (Scales and Arpeggios)

Pieces

Candidates must select One performance pieces from the KMCP grade book and prepare two additional free choice piece. The free choice piece must meet KMCP standards and showcase the candidate's musical skills and stylistic understading.

Setting the level of backing track

At the beginning of the exam, candidates will perform the first few bars of their first chosen piece as a sound check. This will set the levels for the exam and will take place along to the backing track. Note: the sound check is undertaken for the first piece only.

TECHNICAL WORK

At Level 1, candidates are required to perform technical exercises grouped into three categories : Scales, Arpeggios, and Chord Voicings.

General Guidelines:

- All exercises must be played separately with both hands, in a straight feel, ascending and descending.
- Exercises should be performed at the specified tempo using the given rhythm.
- Candidates must play from memory for all technical exercises. Use of any materials during the performance of technical exercises will result in a mark deduction.
- Fingering suggestions in the syllabus are optional.

Rhythm: Eighth notes, finishing on a quarter note

Candidates are required to perform the chord voicings from memory.

The tempo and rhythm for this group are free (no click or backing track).

Level 2

The KMCP Level 2 Keys exam is designed for candidates who have progressed beyond the beginner stage and have developed fundamental musical skills. At this level, candidates are expected to demonstrate a foundational understanding of musical concepts, as well as improved coordination, technique, and stylistic interpretation.

Candidates at Level 2 will showcase their ability to perform with greater confidence and accuracy, highlighting their growing musical understanding and expressive capabilities.

GRADE EXAMS

PREPARED WORK

Candidates are required to prepare a total of Three Performance Pieces, One of which must be selected from the KMCP repertoire, and Two can be a Free Choice Piece. In addition, Technical Exercises, including scales, arpeggios, and chord voicings, are part of the prepared work.

EXAM STRUCTURE

The level 2 exam lasts 20 minutes and follows the structure below:

- Performance Pieces
- Technical Exercises

Pieces

KMCP repertoire pieces are designed to assess an intermediate level of technical skill, notation accuracy, tonal consistency, rhythmic control, and expressive performance. Each piece aims to showcase the candidate's musical understanding and technical proficiency.

Setting the level of the backing track

At the beginning of the exam, candidates will perform the first few bars of their first chosen piece as a sound check. This will set the levels for the exam and will take place along to the backing track. Note: the sound check is undertaken for the first piece only.

TECHNICAL WORK

At Level 2, candidates are expected to demonstrate increased technical skills and musical understanding. There are three groups of technical work for this level: Scales, Arpeggios, and Chord Progressions. These exercises focus on improving finger independence, rhythmic precision, and dynamic control.

GROUP A: SCALES

Tempo: 60bpm Range: 1 octave

Rhythms: Eighth notes, finishing on a quarter note

- G major (right hand)
- G major (left hand)
- E natural minor (right hand)
- E natural minor (left hand)
- G major pentatonic (right hand)
- E minor pentatonic (right hand)

GROUP B: ARPEGGIOS

Tempo: 96bpm Time signature: 3/4

Rhythms: Quarter notes, finishing on a dotted half note

- G major broken chord (right hand)
- G major broken chord (left hand)
- E minor broken chord (right hand)
- E minor broken chord (left hand)

GROUP C: CHORD VOICINGS

- G major
- C minor

Candidates need to play either the G major vocings or the G minor voicings from memory.

Exercises should focus on clear note articulation and even timing.

This test is performed in free time, and candidates must showcase the speed and accuracy of their responses.

Grade 1

The Grade 1 Keys exam is designed for candidates who have been learning for six months to one year. By this stage, candidates are expected to have mastered the fundamental skills from Grade 1 and have progressed to demonstrate improved technique, rhythmic precision, coordination, and musical understanding.

At Grade 1, candidates will also begin to explore foundational improvisation concepts as part of their musical development.

PREPARED WORK

Candidates are required to perform Three Performance Pieces and complete Technical Exercises, which include scales, arpeggios, and chord voicings.

EXAM STRUCTURE

- Performance Pieces
- Technical Exercises

Pieces

Candidates must prepare Three pieces, of which Two piece can be a free choice.

All pieces should demonstrate a variety of techniques and styles.

Free choice pieces must adhere to KMCP guidelines for the grade 1 level.

Setting the level of the backing track

At the beginning of the exam, candidates will perform the first few bars of their first chosen piece as a sound check. This will set the levels for the exam and will take place along to the backing track. Note: the sound check is undertaken for the first piece only.

TECHNICAL WORK

At Grade 1, there are three groups of technical exercises: Scales, Arpeggios, and Chord Voicings. All exercises must be played with both hands separately and adhere to the specific rhythm and tempo requirements.

Scales and arpeggios are performed ascending and descending in a straight feel.

GRADE 2

The Grade 2 Keys exam is designed for candidates who have typically been learning for one to one and a half years. By this stage, candidates are expected to have built upon the foundational skills from Grade 2, demonstrating enhanced proficiency in techniques, rhythmic accuracy, coordination, and musical understanding.

In Grade 2, candidates will also have the opportunity to apply their knowledge to more complex pieces, further developing their interpretation skills and musical expression.

PREPARED WORK

Candidates are required to play Three Performance Pieces and Technical Exercises, which cover scales, arpeggios, and chord voicings. One of the Performance Pieces can be a free-choice piece.

EXAM STRUCTURE

The Level 2 exam lasts approximately 20 minutes and includes :

- erformance Pieces: Three prepared pieces, including one free-choice piece.
- Technical Exercises: Scales, arpeggios, and chord voicings relevant to Grade 2 requirements.

Pieces

The pieces in the syllabus are designed to build upon the foundations of Grade 2, enhancing technical accuracy, tone quality, consistency, and stylistic expression. Candidates are encouraged to select pieces that showcase their musical growth at Grade 2.

Setting the level of the backing track

At the start of the exam, candidates will have the opportunity to check the backing track levels using the first few bars of their first Performance Piece. Adjustments can be made to ensure sound quality. Once confirmed, the exam will proceed.

TECHNICAL WORK

At Grade 2, there are three groups of technical work: Scales, Arpeggios, and Chord Voicings.

Scales

Candidates are required to play major scales, minor scales (natural, harmonic, or melodic), and pentatonic scales. Scales must be performed in straight feel, ascending and descending, with hands together for major and minor scales, and hands separately for pentatonic scales.

Arpeggios

The Grade 3 Keys exam is designed for candidates transitioning from the beginner level to the intermediate stage. At Grade 7, the Technical Work section assesses candidates' proficiency in scales, arpeggios, chord voicings, and technical studies.

Candidates are required to prepare and perform one technical study of their choice, aligned with the KMCP syllabus guidelines, to a provided backing track.
