



#### TRENDING TECHNOLOGIES


Recent investigations reveal how Israel is increasingly using AI not only in warfare, but in surveillance, narrative control, and information manipulation targeting Palestinians. Reports from The Guardian detail how Israel's intelligence unit, Unit 8200, is developing a ChatGPT-style model trained on intercepted Palestinian phone calls, messages, and data—enabling real-time monitoring and AI-generated "insights" on individuals under occupation. At the same time, AI-driven systems like Lavender and The Gospel have been used in strike targeting, raising global alarm over civilian harm and algorithmic decision-making in warfare.

Additional reporting shows Israel has engaged in coordinated disinformation and influence operations, including AI-generated content campaigns designed to shape global opinion and suppress pro-Palestinian narratives. CyberScoop recently exposed "Stoic," a sprawling influence operation that used AI tools and fake accounts to amplify pro-Israel messaging and attack critics, part of a broader push to rewrite the digital narrative around the war and occupation.

#### TRENDING TECHNOLOGIES

Why it matters: All is rapidly becoming a tool for erasing evidence, reshaping public perception, and automating oppression. Training All models on the private communications of an occupied population sets a dangerous precedent: it normalizes mass surveillance at a scale that makes accountability nearly impossible. When the same tools can also generate targeted propaganda or manipulate online discourse, the line between truth and manufactured reality blurs.

For marginalized communities, including Palestinians and broader Arab and Muslim diasporas, these developments signal how easily AI can be weaponized against vulnerable populations. And globally, they raise urgent questions about the role of Big Tech, the lack of oversight, and what happens when some of the world's most powerful technologies are deployed without transparency or ethical guardrails. The stakes extend far beyond this conflict: the future of AI will be shaped by how we respond now.

#### Viaka

Viaka brands itself as "the global hub for MENA's startup ecosystem," bringing together founders, investors, and experts tied to the Middle East and North Africa but rooted in a global community. They provide more than just networking: through their "Viaka Angel Network" and advisory offerings, they help early-stage MENA-rooted founders access capital, market insights, cross-border expertise, and tailored consulting to scale globally.

#### Alif

Alif is a startup accelerator specifically for Muslim founders working in emerging tech, offering funding, mentorship, and community support to get their ideas off the ground. Their approach combines capital, access to a curated network, and startup-building infrastructure (credits, tools, community) aiming to lower barriers for founders who, historically, might have lacked access to traditional Venture Capital pathways.



#### INDUSTRY MOVEMENTS

Why it matters: Industries around tech, startups, venture capital, where gatekeeping and homogeneity have long held sway, these organizations are actively pushing for inclusion and representation for Muslim and MENA-rooted founders. That directly supports greater diversity in who gets to build, fund, and shape technology and business. As more Muslim and Arab-led startups emerge, they challenge

stereotypes and reshape narratives about who builds tech, who leads companies, who makes creative/business decisions. That shift cascades: influencing media representation, investor mindsets, and broader societal perceptions.



#### CULTURAL RELEVANCE

#### A Turning Point for Muslim & Arab Representation

This November marked a historic milestone: more than 40 Muslim and Arab Americans won seats across local and state elections, setting new records for representation nationwide. While Zohran Mamdani's election as the first Muslim mayor of New York City captured national attention, he wasn't the only one making history—and he wasn't the only one worth highlighting. Across city councils, school boards, mayoral races, and even statewide offices, Arab and Muslim candidates saw widespread wins that signaled a broader shift in how these communities are perceived: not as outsiders, but as essential contributors to civic life.



#### CULTURAL RELEVANCE These victories arrive at a time when many Arab and Muslim Americans are navigating heavy uncertainty, from escalating crises "back home" to a documented rise in Islamophobia across the U.S. That context makes this moment even more meaningful. Increased representation serves as both a counter-narrative to prejudice and a symbol of belonging, demonstrating that our communities are not defined by the discrimination they face, but by their leadership, resilience, and commitment to public service. For younger generations, these wins expand what feels possible, showing that civic engagement, policymaking, and public leadership are not only accessible but already being shaped by people who share their identities and lived experiences. For the broader public, this wave of representation acts as a cultural recalibration, challenging longstanding stereotypes and reframing Muslim and Arab Americans as trusted, capable voices in our political future.
