Since our last newsletter in May, the Farm Cornwall team have been busy on farms and attending several agricultural shows. At the Royal Cornwall Show it was great to see so many familiar faces and also meet some new farmers who weren't aware of the work we do. We met with Steve Reed MP and Shadow Minister Robbie Moore, both of them asked for our take of what is happening on the ground. We also had the ear of Prince William for a while, he was very supportive of the work we do, in particular the mental health aspect of farming. And if one meeting wasn't enough, Edward met with Prince William again at Groundswell where the topic of conversation was focussed on the younger generations and children in farming. It is very important that we continue to champion for farmers and farming, and to feedback what we see and hear on the ground.

One thing that has struck us this summer is how Cornwall has largely (although not entirely) avoided the summer drought that is affecting vast areas of England. Go beyond Okehampton and West Dartmoor and the fields are scorched, grass is non existent and even maize is burning off. Fields have been catching fire and winter rations are being fed. In contrast, we had several farmers tell us at Camelford Show that this summer had been a good one - multiple silage cuts, crops flourishing in the ground and livestock content. Cornwall has certainly escaped the worst of it.

Grants and funding update

Blink and you miss it! The government opened up the long awaited capital grant scheme in early July, and shut it on 1st August claiming that the money had been allocated. For many it was a difficult process, the RPA using previous capital grant agreements to block new applications. We are aware of some new applications being blocked by capital grant agreements dating back to 2017, so they have clearly long expired. For those that were able to jump through the hurdles and get an application submitted, it is now a case of waiting to hear whether you have been successful.

Higher Tier is due to reopen imminently but that is restricted and is not a free for all. For the vast majority of farms there will not be anything to apply for now until 2026.

BPS payments are being sent out in August with many receiving their payment early in the month. There is just one payment this year, and this is with a 76% reduction from the average amount previously worked out. For delinked payments in 2026 and 2027, Defra plan to apply a 98% reduction to the first £30,000 of any delinked payment and any amount above £30,000 will be reduced by 100%.

What do Farm Cornwall do?

We often hear people say "I had no idea Farm Cornwall did that", so we thought it might be useful/interesting for us to give some examples of the work we have been doing over the past year. Every day is different for us and every farm is different, but the aim is always to support the farm to provide a positive outcome.

Animal Health

Through Trading Standards we came across a farmer who through ill health had not registered some calves on his farm. He had a series of illnesses which we could align with his cattle births and apply late as some of these calves were now 10 months old. All 24 were awarded proper trading passports, the most Edward has dealt with on one farm was 60 and again all calves were awarded full trading passports.

Housing

We supported a family that had decided to retire due the farmer's own ill health, he was in his mid fifties with diabetes. We were able to work with the landlord and Addington Fund to provide a house in a local village where both he and his wife could live there for the rest of their lives.

Farm Assurance

A farm had their dairy business put on hold following a failure to meet the standards. We worked with the family to ensure that the "failure trigger" points were corrected, with the help of the milk buyer and the farmer's own vet. In the closure period the milk unfortunately produced on the farm had to be poured down the drain (let into the slurry store). Cows were continued to be milked, cows and youngstock fed, muck was shifted and wages had to be paid. Imagine no milk sold for 14 days and the mental health pressure that puts upon the family.

Suicide Prevention

Both Louise and Edward are Asist Suicide Prevention trained and in Edwards 15 years of employment at Farm Cornwall he has sat on beds, in barns, in workshops and farm offices being told why a person no longer wants to be here at least 5 times. He remembers sitting in a farm building on a foul day with rain driving in through the doorway talking to a farmer as why he no longer thought his life was worth living and how he intended to do it. All the time for three hours water dripped from the strip light above them, he didn't take his life and he recovered from this to continue farming until retirement.

Debt

This is the most common issue we see, farmers often don't open the post, they avoid talking to the person they owe money too, even going as far as having a succession of pay as you go phones, used almost as "burner phones". Leaving some people on the back burner for too long even though their bill isn't the highest. We would work with the farmer to come up with payment plans, cash flow budgets for the banks, look at technical issues which could be affecting production like achieving milk quality and best price. Look at cost of production and pence per litre and compare from experience whether those costs are higher than comparable farms. Often the biggest difference lies in the amount of debt being serviced, costly equipment HPs, cost of repairs, is all the equipment required after all you can only sit on one at a time.

We have even help set up IVA Individual Voluntary Arrangements with insolvency practitioners where debt levels are too high to manage on individual payment plans.
