Article: Shopping Without Cash

In many places, people do not use **cash** to shop anymore. Instead, they use cards or phones to pay. This is called cashless payment.

When people go to a shop, they can use a card to buy things. The card is put into a machine or touched on top. Some people use their phones to pay. They open an app and scan a code or tap the phone.

Cashless shopping is fast and easy. People don't need to carry coins or count money. In some cities, buses and trains also accept phone payments.

But not everyone likes cashless shopping. Some older people still prefer using cash. In some places, small shops do not have machines.

Still, more and more people now shop without using cash.
