What is IELTS Speaking Part 3?

IELTS Speaking Part 3 is the **discussion stage** of the test. It follows your Part 2 response and lasts **4–5 minutes**. The examiner will ask **deeper, opinion-based questions** connected to the topic of your Part 2 speech.

In Part 3, you must:

- Discuss ideas beyond personal stories
- Use examples, comparisons, and arguments
- Demonstrate complex grammar and vocabulary
- Speak with confidence and structure

Today's topic: Technology and Media – a common IELTS Part 3 theme.



Sample IELTS Part 3 Questions

Practice answering these common questions on this topic with your tutor:

- How has technology changed the way people work or study?
- What are the dangers of relying too much on digital media?
- Do you think people will read fewer books in the future? Why or why not?
- Should children be allowed to use mobile phones in school?

Tip: Give 3–5 sentence responses with opinions, examples, and logic.



Grammar Focus: Passive Voice

The **passive voice** is useful in IELTS Part 3 when discussing trends, systems, or actions where the doer is unknown or not important.

Structure:

be (is/are/was/were) + past participle

Present Passive:

- "Information is shared quickly on social media."
- "Technology is used in classrooms to aid learning."

Past Passive:

- "Newspapers were replaced by digital platforms."
- "Old media was dominated by a few companies."

Vocabulary for Technology & Media

Key Vocabulary:

- digital literacy, screen time, media bias, social platforms, streaming, cyber security
- online education, virtual reality, artificial intelligence, data privacy

Verbs & Phrases:

 consume media, stay informed, go viral, broadcast, rely on, access content

Activity:

Choose 3 terms and use them in your own example sentence related to tech or media.



Expressing Opinions & Speculations

IELTS Part 3 encourages you to **speculate about the future** or give **balanced opinions**.

Phrases to Use:

- "I suppose it might..."
- "It's likely that..."
- "There's a chance that..."
- "Personally, I feel that..."
- "Some people argue that..., but I think..."

Example:

"It's likely that most news will be consumed online in the future, as people want faster updates."

Task: Use one speculation phrase to predict how media might change in 10 years.



IELTS Practice: Technology Impact

Question:

How has modern technology changed communication between people?

Answer should include:

- 1 opinion phrase
- 1 passive sentence
- 1 example

Sample Answer:

"Technology has transformed how we connect. These days, messages are **sent instantly** via apps, and video calls are **used** regularly. Personally, I feel that although it's convenient, it sometimes reduces face-to-face interaction."



Activity: Old vs New Media

Compare **traditional media** (newspapers, TV) with **modern media** (social media, online news).

Use:

- "Compared to..."
- "Whereas..."
- "On the other hand..."

Example:

"Compared to traditional newspapers, online platforms offer instant news. However, accuracy can sometimes be an issue."

Task: Speak for 1 minute comparing two forms of media using at least two connectors.

Grammar Focus: Modal Verbs for Possibility and Obligation

Use modal verbs to discuss rules, predictions, and social opinions.

What are Modal Verbs?

- might / may / could possibility
- should / shouldn't advice or expectation
- must / mustn't strong necessity

Examples:

- "Social media might be addictive for some users."
- "News websites should be more responsible with facts."
- "People mustn't share private information online."

Mini Task:

Create one sentence with **might**, one with **should**, and one with **must**.



Discussion: Media Influence

Practice answering the following question:

Should governments control what we see in the media? Why or why not?

Instructions:

- Give your opinion
- Include one modal verb (e.g. should, must)
- Add one real or imagined example
- Use a contrast phrase

Example:

"I think governments **shouldn't** control media completely. While it's important to prevent harmful content, people also have the right to access different views. For example, in democratic countries, media freedom is respected."



Roleplay Activity: Technology Debate

Situation:

Imagine your tutor is your classmate and they say: "Phones should be banned in schools."

Respond to this opinion with:

- Opinion
- Reason
- Contrast idea
- Passive voice or modal verb

Example:

"I understand their concern, but I disagree. Phones **can be used** for educational purposes, like online dictionaries. Instead of banning them, schools **should** teach students how to use them responsibly."



Idioms and Natural Expressions

Try these topic-related idioms:

- "glued to their screens" always using a device
- "double-edged sword" something with both pros and cons
- "spread like wildfire" become popular very quickly
- "hit the headlines" become major news
- "old-school" traditional, not modern

Task: Use one idiom to describe how you or others use technology.

Include:

- 1 passive sentence
- 1 example
- 1 contrast or speculation phrase

Grammar Challenge: Passive Voice & Modals

- TV is watched by millions daily.
- Media should protect people's privacy.

Extension: Create your own correct sentence using both passive + modal.
