Word	Explanation
Desert	A dry, sandy place with little rain
Mosque	A building where Muslims pray
Date (fruit)	A sweet brown fruit grown in palm trees
Skyline	The outline of a city's buildings against the sky
Camel	An animal used for travel in hot, dry places
Souk	A traditional market, busy and full of shops
Modern	New, advanced, up-to-date
Mountain	A tall natural landform, bigger than a hill

# Vocabulary Speaking: Use What You've Learned

In English, we say *market* for *souk*. What do you call it in your language?



## Grammar Focus: "There is / There are"

#### **Grammar Rule:**

We use 'There is' for one thing and 'There are' for two or more things.

#### Structure:

- Singular (1): **There is** + a/an + noun
- Plural (2+): **There are** + (some/many) + noun

#### Examples:

- "There is a desert in Saudi Arabia."
- "There are many tall buildings in Riyadh."
- "There is a date tree in the garden."
- "There are mountains in the west."

## Grammar Add-On: Negative and Question Forms

## **Spoken Rule:**

## **Negative:**

"There isn't..." (for one thing)

"There aren't..." (for many things)

#### **Questions:**

"Is there ...?"

"Are there ...?"

#### Examples:

- "There isn't a river in the desert."
- "There aren't any camels in the city."
- "Is there a market nearby?"
- "Are there any tall buildings in this area?"

- There are places where it snows in the Saudi mountains!
