Lesson Goals:

- Practise the present continuous tense
- Use vocabulary related to daily life and cultural elements
- Build fluency through questions and sentence building
- Speak with better rhythm and pronunciation
- Learn by imagining real-life communication

Word	Spoken Definition
Café	A place to relax and have coffee or snacks
Temple	A traditional place of worship
Technology	Modern machines, computers, phones etc.
Cityscape	The view of a city, especially from high places
Festival	A special event with dancing, food, and music
Street food	Quick and tasty food sold outside
Modern	New and up-to-date in design or ideas
Traditional	From the past, cultural and respected

Grammar Focus: Present Continuous

Grammar Rule:

We use the **present continuous** to talk about what's happening **now** or around now.

Structure:

Subject + am/is/are + verb-ing

Examples:

- "She is eating Korean street food."
- "They are walking in Seoul."
- "I am learning English today."
- "We are talking about South Korea."

Used for current actions or temporary activities



Grammar Speaking Practice: What Are You Doing Now?

Discuss:

- What are you doing today?
- What are people doing in your home right now?
- Are you learning anything new these days?
- What is your friend doing this weekend?

Tip: Create sentences using: "I am...", "She is...", "They are..."

Tip: We don't say 'I learning', we must use 'am' before the verb!



Common Contractions

Using contractions allows us to have natural speech and flow, improving fluency:

I am → **I'm**

| will **→ |'ll**

You are → You're

You will → You'll

He is → **He's**

Do not → **Don't**

She is → **She's**

Cannot → Can't

It is **→ It's**

Will not → Won't

We are → We're

They are → **They're**



Grammar Add-On: Negatives and Questions

Grammar Rule:

Negative:

"I'm not going", "He isn't working", "They aren't cooking"

Questions:

"Are you going?", "Is she sleeping?", "What are they doing?"

Examples:

- "I'm not watching TV."
- "Is he studying now?"
- "They aren't working today."

Ask & Answer: Use the Present Continuous

Discuss:

- 1. What are you doing this week?
- 2. What is someone in your family doing right now?
- 3. What are people doing in the park or street today?
- 4. What is something you're not doing, but want to?

Tip: Build fluency with natural grammar:

"I'm relaxing...", "She isn't working...", "Are you learning anything?"



Pronunciation: Word Stress & Fluency

Read the words below with your tutor, focusing on pronunciation and fluency:

- Eating
- Modern
- Traditional
- Visiting

Focus:

- Word stress (e.g. TECH-nol-o-gy)
- Natural pauses
- Verb endings: -ing sounds



Listening/Reading: A Day in Busan

Your tutor will read out the following passage:

"I'm spending the weekend in Busan. Right now, I'm sitting in a café near the sea. People are walking along the beach and eating spicy rice cakes from street food stalls. Some are taking photos of the sunset. I'm drinking iced coffee and writing about my trip. The weather is perfect!"

- What are people doing on the beach?
- What is the speaker drinking?
- What would you do if you were there?

Tip: Try to use present continuous in answers
