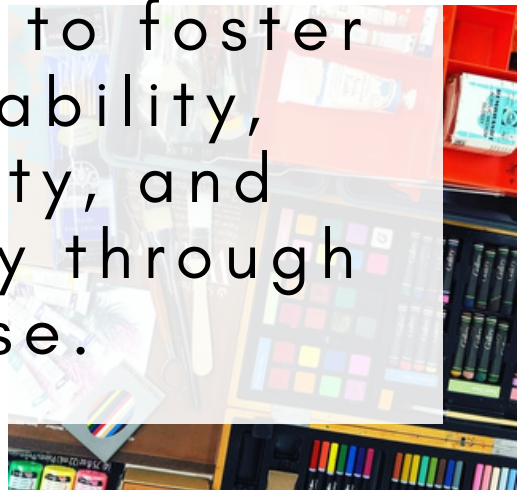
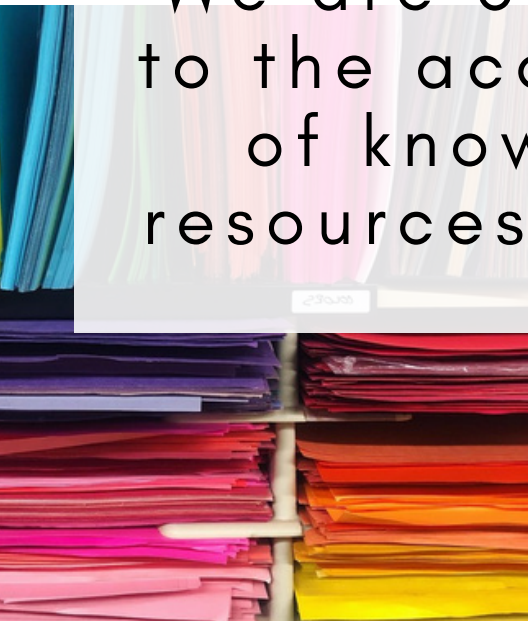

A LETTER FROM THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

Dear supporters and friends,

This year, Turnip Green launched a new program: Materials for Partners, which established a process for collecting and distributing materials to organizations and schools, and expanded our Commercial Drop-Off program that allows more materials to be donated by businesses and commercial donors to our Creative Reuse Center. Both programs reflected a growing desire in Middle Tennessee to make more sustainable choices and to connect with one another in doing so. I am deeply inspired by the partnerships formed through these efforts and the path they create for continued growth and investment in Turnip Green. In 2024, we saw a 35% increase in customers in our Creative Reuse Center and a 31% increase in materials donated compared to the previous year.

Providing materials to the community increases access to creative endeavors and supports art as a pathway to economic opportunity and career development. In 2024, we proudly launched two new artist-centered events and invested in our workshop program. Each of these are designed to empower emerging artists - offering opportunities to develop new skills, share their creativity with the community, and build sustainable careers.

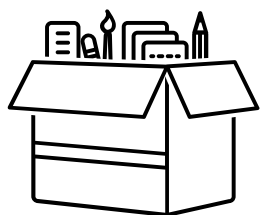
Through the work we do every day, I feel an immense hope as we come together to build a more sustainable, connected, and creative future.

2024 IMPACT CREATIVE REUSE CENTER

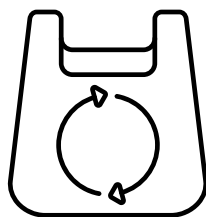

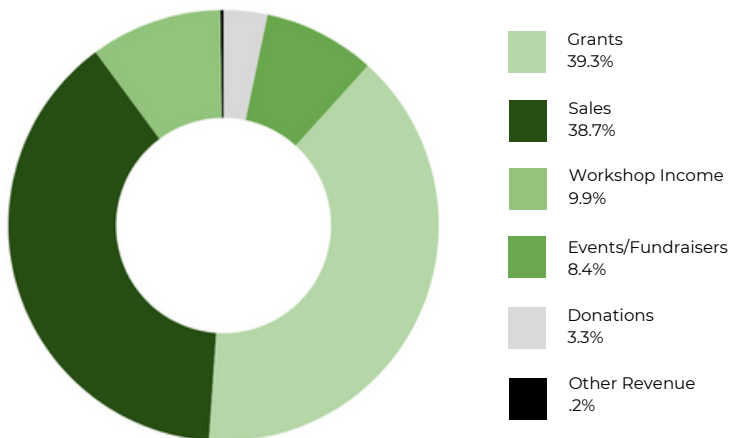

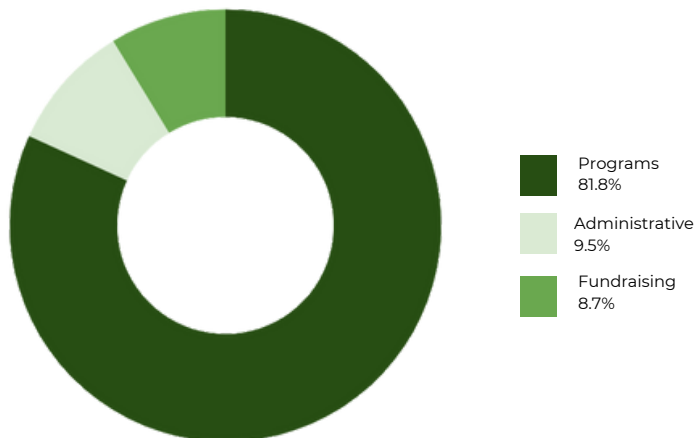
FINANCIALS
