A participating group is entitled to up to \$2,000 in project funding, and the teacher is entitled to a \$1,000 teacher stipend. Each participating group needs to submit all required documents (MOU,

Examples of participating groups would be a biology class that goes over the lessons and works on the community-based project together in class or an afterschool club that meets once a week to go over the lessons and works on the community-based project together.

Can a participating group work on more than one project?

Can one teacher lead multiple participating groups?

For example, if one teacher facilitated the lessons during three different biology class periods and three different projects with those different biology classes, that would be considered three participating groups. In this case, the teacher would be entitled to three teacher stipends since they are effectively doing three times the amount of work.
