Food Justice Terms

Food Desert

Typically, food desert refers to access to healthy foods and how far away those foods are from the community. However, this term is not being used as much due to its failure to address the larger context around food systems and the root causes of health inequalities related to food.


Food Swamp

More specific than the term "food desert," a "food swamp" refers to areas where there is an abundance of unhealthy food options (fast food, corner stores, gas stations, etc.) but a lack of access to healthy food options. A "food swamp" could be called a "food desert."

Food Apartheid

Describes the inequitable structural, historical, and political perspectives and policies related to the forces that have shaped what entities of food — healthy or not — exist in a community.

Who is employed in the various stages?

- What is their job?
- What are any positive or negative impacts of that job?
- What is the pay like?
- What are working conditions like?
- Are there risks involved in this job?
- Where are these employees located?

Where is the food produced, and how much land does it take to produce?

- What was previously on the land that's being used to produce this food?
- Did any groups of indigenous peoples live on and steward the land currently being used to produce this food?
- Did these groups get displaced? If so, where? Are they now consumers of the food produced, or is it being distributed to other locations?

Who is a consumer, and who is not a consumer?

- What allows certain people to be consumers and not others? (i.e., location, income, etc.)
- Where do consumers exist? Is it the same location where employees worked and produced the food?
