1 Connect your device via USB or other means, depending on the item. For instance, a phone or tablet uses its charging cable, while a flash drive plugs directly into a USB port. A camera's SD card is inserted into the PC's card reader.2 If transferring photos from an iPhone or iPad to a computer, open iTunes first. Allow your device to appear in iTunes before proceeding; otherwise, it won't recognize it as storage.3 Open Start, then click on Windows logo to access the Start menu.4 Type "photos" and press Enter to find the Photos app on your computer.5 Click Photos in the Start menu to launch the app.6 Click Import and select From a USB device to scan for connected items with photos.7 Select photos to transfer onto your computer by checking boxes or using Select all link.8 Change import folder if needed, then click Import selected to begin importing.9 Open an Internet browser and search for pictures using keywords related to the image you want.10 Click on the desired photo to save it.You will be redirected to another webpage if you click on a picture. If this happens, click the "Back" button in your browser and proceed to the next step. To do this: Right-click on the enlarged photo (or click on the right side of your mouse or use two fingers on the trackpad). If your computer uses a trackpad instead of a mouse, you can also use the 'List Options' key on the right-hand side of your keyboard between the Alt and Ctrl keys. Click "Save image as," from the drop-down menu. Enter a name for your picture in the "File name" field of the File Explorer window that opens. Choose where to save your picture by clicking on a folder in the left-hand pane. Then, click "Save" at the bottom of the window.To download images from websites, follow these steps:You can easily save images to your device in a few simple steps. First, find the image you want to download on a web browser. Some images cannot be downloaded due to file format or copyright protection.For iPhone, tap and hold the image then select "Save to Photos". For Android, tap and hold the image then select "Download image". On desktop, right-click (or control-click) the image and select "Save Image As".To start, open a web browser such as Safari or Google Chrome. Navigate to a website or search for an image on Google. Tap Images below the search bar to see associated images.Tap and hold the image firmly to open a pop-up menu. On iPhone, tap "Save to Photos". On Android, select "Download image".To download an image with a description from a website or device, follow these steps:1. On your phone, tablet, flash drive, or SD card, connect it using its respective cable.2. Open iTunes if you're using an iPhone or iPad, and allow the device to appear in iTunes.3. Click on Start > Type "photos" > Click Photos > Import from a USB device.4. Select photos to transfer onto your computer by checking their boxes or clicking Select all.5. Change the import folder if necessary.For specific devices like GoPro, follow additional steps as recommended.1. To change where photos are saved, click the "Change" button near the top of the window and select a new folder.2. You can save pictures to an external disc by inserting it into your PC's player and waiting for "External Disc" to appear in "This PC." Then drag the photos from one folder to another or copy and paste them onto the empty disc, burning it afterwards.To keep your pictures safe, choose "Save as" and give them a name. Proper labeling and storage are essential to make the most of this option.Printing Favorite PhotosFinally, printing photos provides a physical copy that can be displayed or stored in a safe place. This method also serves as an insurance policy against digital file loss. Framed prints or photo albums offer a great way to showcase favorite memories while keeping them protected.Do this at home if you have a good-quality printer or take files to a photography shop to print them onto photo paper, but it's not a backup solution for your entire digital library. Printing at home or in a shop will get expensive, so only print extra special photos. Bonus Tip: Use Photo Recovery Software It can't replace backing up your digital photos, but this software can recover files accidentally deleted or wiped out.
