

Enabling Social Innovation in Estonia

INSTITUTIONAL FRAMEWORK

Official Definition of Social Innovation 🔗

Estonia has **no official legal definition** of social innovation. The term is used informally in government to describe **new solutions to social and community challenges**, often linked to social entrepreneurship ^{2,3}.

Government Body for Social Innovation ✓

No single SI agency exists. The main coordinating body is the **Department of Citizenship Policy and Civil Society** at the Ministry of the Interior. Other contributors include the **Ministry of Social Affairs** (for social services) and **EU Structural Funds** authorities (via ESF+) ^{2,7}.

Government Strategy for Social Innovation ✓

No standalone SI strategy. SI appears in:

- **Welfare Development Plan 2016–2023** (modernised social services, NGO–state cooperation) ⁷.
- **Estonia 2035** (inclusive innovation, digital public services).
- **EU cohesion programmes 2021–2027**, which fund SI pilots

Policies, Laws & Regulations ✓ 🔗

No SI-specific laws. Key enabling frameworks:

- **Non-profit Associations Act & Foundations Act** – primary forms for mission-driven organisations ⁴.
- **Commercial Code** – used by social enterprises trading for impact ¹¹.
- **Public Procurement Act (2017)** – allows social criteria and innovation-friendly procurement ⁸.

Official Statistics 🔗

No SI-specific statistics. Data indicate a small but active social economy: around **1,600 employees** in NGO-based economic activity and hundreds of social enterprises ^{4,7}.

Government Programs ✓ 🔗

- **ESF/ESF+ pilots** on social inclusion and service innovation ^{2,7}.
- **Municipal innovation pilots** in youth work, community services and digital inclusion.
- Participation in **Interreg/Horizon** projects focused on SI.

ECOSYSTEM

Stakeholders



- **Estonian Social Enterprise Network (SEV)** – national umbrella supporting social enterprises ⁴.
- **Good Deed Foundation** – incubates and funds early-stage initiatives ⁵.
- **Regional Development Centres** – advise NGOs and social enterprises ².
- Universities (Tallinn University, University of Tartu) – offer SI-related research and training ^{9 10}.

Support Initiatives



- **NULA Social Innovation Incubator** – accelerator for NGO/municipal innovations ^{5 6}.
- **Good Deed Impact Fund** – Estonia's pioneering impact investment model ⁵.
- University-based labs and incubators offering mentoring and prototyping

Collaboration



Co-creation across ministries, SEV, NGOs and academia (e.g., policy reviews, ESF+ pilots) ².

Events & Awards



- **Impact Day** – major Baltic event showcasing social enterprises.
- **NULA Demo Days** – public presentations of new solutions.

FINANCE

Financing Schemes



Estonia does not publish SI-specific annual totals; available sources suggest **several million euros per year** flow into SI-related activities through:

- **ESF/ESF+ grants** (social inclusion, labour market, innovation) ^{2 7}.
- **Philanthropy & impact investment** (Good Deed Foundation and corporate donors) ⁵.
- **SME innovation support** accessible to social enterprises.

Financing Inclusivity



Funding often targets **long-term unemployed, youth at risk, people with disabilities, rural communities**. Barriers persist for **early-stage and rural innovators** ^{2 4}.

SOCIETY

Public Awareness of Social Innovation



Awareness of “social innovation” is moderate; the public more often recognises **social enterprises, civic tech and digital public-sector innovations** ^{2 4}.

Research



- OECD studies identify Estonia's SI ecosystem as emerging but promising ².
- Universities research SI, social entrepreneurship and public-sector innovation ^{2 10}.
- Estonia contributes to the **European Social Enterprise Monitor** ⁷.

Education



- Universities offer **courses** on social entrepreneurship, social innovation and impact measurement ⁹ ¹⁰.
- Non-formal training (e.g., NULA, SEV workshops) strengthens practitioner skills ⁴ ⁶.
- No data on % of graduates with SI-focused training.
