A Voice for the Voiceless: North Korean Defector Seohyun Lee Inspires Full House



Seohyun Lee shares her compelling personal story about escaping communism and embracing freedom in her new home in America.

As a young woman, Lee had never even seen the northern part of her own country, a stark reminder of the extreme restrictions placed on North Koreans.

In 2014, after a harrowing experience that included witnessing the disappearance of a close friend at the hands of North Korea's secret police, Lee and her family made the decision to defect.

"We risked everything in the pursuit of freedom," she said. In 2016, following a media leak that put their safety in jeopardy, the family sought asylum in the United States.

The Luce Center welcomed human rights activist and North Korean defector Seohyun Lee to speak before a full-capacity audience of students, members, and guests on May 9. Lee shared a deeply powerful and emotional account of her family's escape from North Korea and her ongoing fight for freedom.

Born and raised in **Pyongyang**, Lee grew up in a privileged household due to her father's high-ranking government position. But even within North Korea's elite, she lacked basic freedoms. "I had certain privileges," Lee told the audience, "but I did not have the basic human rights you have here today."

Since then, Lee has become a powerful global advocate for human rights, speaking at TEDx, briefing the United Nations Security Council, and serving as a Korea Unification Opinion Leader recognized by South Korea's Ministry of Unification. She has received multiple awards, including the North Korea Freedom Scholarship and serves on the Global Advisory Council at the McCain Institute.

During her remarks, Lee emphasized how easily Americans can take their freedoms for granted. "Freedom of movement—the ability to go from point A to point B—is something many of us overlook, but for people like me, it's a profound privilege," she said.

When asked what Americans can do to help the North Korean people, Lee stressed the importance of information and education. "Knowledge is power," she said. "Support organizations that provide opportunities for North Korean defectors to study and grow. They will be the messengers for those still inside."

Lee's closing words served as a rallying cry: "North Koreans are not aliens. They are people like you, who carry love and family responsibilities. Please don't forget them."

As a token of gratitude, we presented Lee with a **Grizzly Coolers** tumbler—a symbol of resilience in itself, following YETI's controversial decision to cancel our custom order due to the phrase "conservative women." In honoring her with this gift, we affirm our mission: to prepare and promote conservative women leaders who, like Lee, speak truth with courage and conviction.



You won't always see it spelled out on a billboard, but the message is everywhere—especially here on social media: be the ambitious, high-powered "girlboss" or the perfectly traditional "tradwife."

Pick a side. Get in line. Never look back.

The pressure many young women feel is as misguided as it is limiting.

Because real life is more complex and more beautiful than a slogan.

And the either-or mindset flattens the richness of a woman's calling. It suggests your value comes only from fitting into one of two cultural molds. But God's design is far more personal. He gives each of us unique gifts—intelligence, creativity, compassion, strength—not to be hidden, but to be used boldly and faithfully in the world.

Some women will pour their creativity into writing, teaching, or running businesses. Others will focus on the profound responsibility of raising children and shaping the next generation. Many will do both—though not always at the same time. Every season carries purpose and dignity.

As Kate Obenshain Keeler, Luce Center Board Member and popular conservative commentator, puts it: "It's not an either-or proposition."

Real life allows for seasons. For nuance. For paths that don't look like anyone else's. It's not about choosing sides—it's about living with purpose, conviction, and courage.

Kate has advice for today's young women:

"Stop listening to social media's lies. Be brave. This journey is going to look different for each of us. Look to God for your identity and His plan for your life. Fix your eyes on God and everything will fall properly in its place!"

"He who has started a good work in you will bring it to completion." Philippians 1:6

Let's affirm the value of women's work and support young women as they discern how best to live out their calling with courage and conviction.
