For more than half a century, Western's Writer-in-Residence program has brought students, faculty and the wider community into conversation with leading Canadian authors.

Over the years, Western has welcomed some of Canada's most iconic literary voices — novelists, poets, short-story writers, playwrights and essayists — to share their expertise, mentor emerging authors and enrich campus and community cultural life.

Building on this legacy, the Student Writer-in-Residence program was established in 2013 by the University Students' Council and the Department of English and Writing Studies. The only program of its kind in North America, it empowers undergraduate writers to contribute to creativity on campus through peer mentorship, workshops and events that nurture talent across disciplines.

These trailblazing programs remind us of the unique power of art to unify, inspire and uplift, enriching not only the lives of individuals but also the broader university and London community. Together they:

- Provide mentorship and guidance to writers at every stage in their journey.
- Offer a public platform for cultural dialogue and creative exchange.
- Strengthen artistic and creative expression on campus and in the wider community.
- Nurture the next generation of writers and cultural leaders.
