They commended Billy Carson for writing an engaging and informative book that they couldn't put down. However, some reviewers criticized the content, calling it overpriced and lacking in substance. The critique argues that Carson misinterprets biblical passages to draw parallels with Thoth's teachings, ignoring contextual differences. For instance, on page 50 of Carson's work, he cites a passage about purification through fasting in the sarcophagus, drawing a tenuous link to Luke 23:43. However, this connection is based on an oversimplification and lack of consideration for the time period, context, and cultural backgrounds of each text. Furthermore, the critique points out that Carson misuses passages like Malachi's Prophecy (Malachi 4:5-6) to support reincarnation without addressing its true meaning. The prophecy actually speaks of sending Elijah before a significant event to turn hearts towards their children, which is fulfilled by John the Baptist as the "Elijah who was to come." This clarifies that John represents a spiritual sense rather than literal reincarnation. The critique concludes that Carson's focus on reincarnation overlooks central Christian teachings about new birth and spiritual resurrection (John 3:3 and 1 Corinthians 5:1), emphasizing instead his own perspective without sufficient evidence. The Bible and Alchemical Texts: A Misguided Connection Carson's Argument Lacks Clear Biblical Support One of the major issues with Carson's argument is his assertion that the Emerald Tablets of Thoth are the original source from which the writers of the Bible borrowed much of their content. This interpretation is not supported by linguistics or Egyptology. Finally, Carson's claim that the Catholic Church slowed the advancement of scientific knowledge is a misrepresentation of history. He points to the case of Giordano Bruno, who was executed by the Catholic Church, but this does not accurately reflect the Church's stance on scientific progress during that time period. While Bruno was indeed executed for his unorthodox theological views, it's essential to note that this had no bearing on his scientific theories or the heliocentric model he proposed. Unfortunately, Billy Carson's book significantly misrepresents the relationship between the Emerald Tablets and biblical texts. His attempts to draw parallels between Thoth and Jesus are based on shaky ground, lacking substantial exegesis and context. Furthermore, Carson's claims about reincarnation and alchemical influences on biblical texts overlook established Christian doctrine and historical scholarship.
