## Foundation Grants of Mork

#### Healthcare Wall of Valor

While touring another senior living community during a CARF survey, I noticed a striking tribute to veterans: a wall dedicated to honoring those who served. Inspired by this idea, we set out to create something equally meaningful for our Residents.

Working closely with the Healthcare Activities Coordinator, we compiled a list of veterans in our care and reached out to their families. We envisioned something more than photos and paper; a tribute that would be timeless. That vision was realized through the creation of beautifully handcrafted wooden medallions representing each of the six branches of the U.S. military. These pieces were made by a veteran in Arizona and now serve as the centerpiece of our Wall of Valor.

Unveiled just before Veterans Day, the ceremony brought together Residents, their families, staff, and special guests. The occasion was filled with heartfelt words, music, and deep gratitude. As new veterans join our community, their photos are added to the display. When a veteran passes, their photo is returned to their family in appreciation of their service and legacy.

#### Informational Hotline



community life in specific and meaningful
ways, including: Capital Improvement,

Library, Lynn Shearouse Cultural Arts/
Horticulture/and Music Therapy, Memory
Support, the Mother Nature Team,
Nursing Healthcare Equipment, Nursing
Scholarship, Woodworking, and the
Unrestricted Foundation Fund.

We're also implementing fresh communication strategies in 2025 to expand awareness about each of these funds—and to help donors explore giving opportunities that align with their passions.

SVWC residents continue to demonstrate extraordinary generosity. As changes in tax laws and estate planning tools emerge, the Foundation will remain a trusted resource for philanthropic guidance—helping donors make impactful choices now and in the years to come.



**IN 1987** SVWC welcomed its first residents.


