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Westbury World's 25th Anniversary

Editor's Note: Twenty-five years ago in July 1997, the first issue of *Westbury World* was published. Following is a condensation of the history of its creation by the late Les Hubert, its founder and sole editor from 1998 until his death at age 100 in September 2014.



Until 1997, SVWC published a monthly newsletter called *The Chatterbox*, edited by the director of the Activities Department. It consisted mostly of notices of scheduled activities, items from residents about visiting families and other contributions, especially

original poetry. *The Chatterbox* was distributed to residents, families of those in Health Care or Assisted Living (then called "Catered Living"), the Board of Trustees, and future residents.

In late 1996, the Executive Committee of the Residents Association proposed to assume responsibility of the monthly newsletter. The purpose was to produce a high-quality publication that better reflected the community's character. Such a product would be more interesting to residents and other readers.

The committee's idea was to find a resident who would co-edit the paper with a staff member. Duplication and distribution would remain a staff responsibility. The resident editor would assemble a Publications Committee to assist in producing a monthly edition. Once these objectives were achieved, the publication was launched in July 1997. Before then, a contest was run to find a name for it. Committee member Lynn Young's entry, *Westbury World*, won first prize, a lifetime subscription.

Some residents were upset by the prospect of *The Chatterbox's* demise. To calm their misgivings, the first paragraph of the first article of the first issue of *Westbury World* (Volume1, Number 1, July 1997) stated: "What?! Another publication? More papers to read? Don't be alarmed. *Westbury World* is really *The Chatterbox* with a new name, a new format and with additional elements. The mutated creature has not shed *Chatterbox's* features. Rather, it will add newsy stories about our community."

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From the President/CEO



Every two years, SVWC partners with Holleran to conduct a resident engagement/ satisfaction survey. This year, the survey ran from March 14 to April 4. Resident engagement is defined as (1) Creating a culture where resident voices are heard, per-

sonal connections are rich, fulfillment of life goals is achieved, and well-being is enhanced and (2) A campus environment that supports and encourages successful aging. There was concern that the restrictions resulting from the Covid pandemic would be reflected in the results and that was certainly the case.

Survey results are measured and quantified by the following four domains: voice, connection, fulfillment, and well-being for residents in Independent Living (IL) and Assisted Living (AL). The Health Care (HC) survey was strictly a satisfaction survey. On a scale of 1-8, SVWC scored a 4 on the IL and AL engagement index. Engagement results were listed by domain followed by satisfaction results. The highest and lowest scoring factors were listed, as well as areas of strength and areas of opportunity.

Some of the highest-scoring factors included friendliness of staff, quality of the billing department, quality of transportation, emergency medical response, and the opportunity for privacy and care in AL The lowest scoring factors across all three levels of care include the temperature and quality of food, as well as the variety of menu selections. There is also an opportunity to educate residents on the role and activities of the Foundation.

The overall satisfaction score on a five-point scale for IL was 4.31, while AL and HC both scored 4.42. An important question that is asked on each survey is would you recommend SVWC to a friend or relative? 85.1 percent of IL residents said they would recommend SVWC. 97.8 percent of AL residents responded they would and 100 percent of HC residents (or responsible parties) said they would also recommend SVWC.

A representative from Holleran presented the results to department directors and the cor-

porate Board of Trustees in May. On June 8, Donielle Palmer and I presented the results to residents after Coffee with Administration. Holleran's presentation and the reports are on the resident portal.

Now that the survey is over, what happens? Low-scoring factors and areas of opportunities will be incorporated into departmental goals and monitored going forward. The survey will be completed again in the spring of 2024 and target surveys may be completed in the interim to monitor specific areas.

While it is important to focus on improvements, it is also important to celebrate successes. Since staff friendliness scored very high in all three levels of care, we do plan to celebrate and thank our staff for their incredible service and dedication to SVWC. Stay tuned for more details.

I do want to thank everyone who participated in the survey. The engagement and satisfaction of our residents always have been, and always will be, our top priority.

Another Bistro Concert

In his prior Bistro performances, Justin has been joined by two other outstanding jazz musicians. They played together some years ago in one of Washington's top jazz spots. For July, only Aaron Clay is available. Aaron, a member of "the President's Own" U.S. Marine Corps Band, has played double bass in many Bistro performances. (A drummer for July will be named soon.)

In the past, we have called Justin's music "Greenwich Village Jazz." It is meant to point to his virtuosic, nuanced style of easy swing that typifies the sophisticated jazz often heard in the Big Apple. Many in the Bistro audiences have been astonished by the brilliance of his playing.

Great news. As SVWC continues to open, not only will residents be able to attend this concert, but those on our futures list who are fully vaccinated and boosted will be invited.

Again, as in May, because we are short of staff, the tables will not move from the Bistro. They will be rearranged to improve sight lines and make space for the trio. Those who dine in the Bistro before the concert are asked to finish eating by about 6:45 so there is time to clean the tables before concertgoers enter.

Admission will be \$10 per person at the door, cash only (to pay the musicians). This far in advance, masks will not be needed, but this could change. Seats will be available about 7:00, after tables are cleared.

We hope you will enjoy this second step toward the full Bistro Concert format, when we can again invite the public.

Afghan Refugee Update

Since last November, Winchester has welcomed 88 newcomers from Afghanistan. Men without their families came first. Jobs were found for them. Families arrived later. Two babies were born here. The kids are in school. All are settling in, learning new ways of living. The trauma of their brutal exodus haunts them all.

A little girl sits in her classrooms and cries. Culture shock greets teens in high school. The women feel isolated. The men struggle with manual night work. Many are now finding work better suited to their high levels of education. The kids learn English quickly. Their mothers worry they will abandon their own culture. One illiterate older fellow without family is floundering. Life for our newcomers is turbulent, but they are safe and learning to thrive.

Church World Service, the State Department-designated resettlement agency for our area, is slowly building a local professional staff. They will gradually supplant the network of volunteers, many from SVWC, who achieved the initial welcome. Resettlement is currently paused. No newcomers have been sent here since April. More will surely come, but federal authorities have provided no plan yet. So, we wait, ready to help.

Lawrence Gallery Features Needlework Exhibit


On June 13, the Lawrence Gallery Art Committee installed a new show called "Fancy, Fun and Family Needlework", which will remain until September 9. Seventeen residents are sharing their creations in the Gallery and in the glass display cases by the Gift Shop. Nine residents are exhibiting for the first time.

Several residents had been in previous Embroidery Guild of America shows held in the Gallery but were able to bring additional items for display. The diversity of needlework includes cross-stitch, needlepoint, applique, bargello blackwork, hardanger, and crewel, in quilts, pillows, footstools, fancy dresses, and a Christmas tree skirt. They range in size from a five-foot diameter tree skirt down to a three-by five-inch quilt for a dollhouse bed.



Establishing a Wildflower Meadow

Mother Nature's Team has taken the first steps to create a mini wildflower meadow above Goff Pond. It will feature warm-season grasses and wildflowers native to Frederick County. Once established, such meadows support pollinators, add beauty, and reduce maintenance needs.

Recently, the first steps were taken toward establishing the meadow, which will take three years. Its area, less than 0.1 acre, was tilled; and clear plastic was spread to solarize and eliminate the existing cold-season grasses and weeds. The plastic will remain until the first frost next fall, when it will be removed and the seeds for the meadow spread. Selective mowing and some hand treatment over the next two years will eliminate weeds that appear.

After the third year, a single annual mowing and monitoring of stubborn weeds will be the only maintenance required. We look forward to seeing the beauty and the increase in pollinators: butterflies, and other flying insects, and birds.
