Exciting Changes Ahead for Goff Pond

Goff Pond, a small stormwater detention pond in the SVWC nature area, has served its purpose well. Unfortunately, as a detention pond—one that slows, but does not retain the water—it sometimes looks more like a mosquito-breeding ground than a pond. Recently, the Property and Planning Committee of the SVWC Board of Trustees gave permission for Mother Nature's Team (MNT) to move forward with converting the pond into an attractive feature. The SVWC Foundation Board of Trustees followed with approval to raise funds for this major effort.

Planning was underway for a fundraising drive when an anonymous donor stepped forward to pay for this renovation. A contract with Exact Stormwater Management of Midlothian was signed and work is to begin in late August or early September.

To implement MNT's vision, developed under the leadership of Sylvia Wilson in 2018, of a "permanent open waterbody," the current plan includes the following: deepening of the pond by four feet, lining the pond with a synthetic liner, planting a six-foot buffer of native grasses and wildflowers around the pond, and installing a solar bubbler and a solar fountain. In addition, native shrubs will be added to the tree-planted hillsides to reduce existing erosion.

The planned changes should result in a more stable water level, from installation of the liner; clearer water, from a significant reduction of silt, rooted aquatics, and algae; fewer maintenance needs; inviting habitat for pollinators, birds, and small mammals; and increased beauty.

If you make regular visits to the pond starting in October, you can watch the beauty increase, as the pond area grows to maturity over the next few years.
