Celebrating the New Year



Campus Connectivity to be Enhanced

Now that Phase I of the Villas is complete, SVWC is finalizing plans to connect the sidewalk from Travertine Way to the existing campus. A sidewalk will be added next to the parking spaces on the west side of the Wappacomo parking lot. This sidewalk will extend to the three-way stop sign where pedestrians can then cross the road and use the existing sidewalk system by the cottages.

Another sidewalk will be added that will follow the road around the back of Wappacomo Hall. Several bollard lights along this route will need to be relocated. The new sidewalk will continue past the greenhouse and a crosswalk will be added near the loading dock area. The new sidewalk will then tie into the sidewalks by the Vitality Center. These changes are highlighted above in red.

Options are also being explored that will add additional parking spaces for staff in the hope that it will alleviate some of the congestion in the North Lot. Spaces for golf cart parking are also being considered.

A new electric vehicle has been ordered that will be used to shuttle residents around campus. The estimated delivery timeframe is March or April. This is in addition to the bus service that runs for appointments, trips, programs, and community events. We encourage residents to utilize these services to avoid any parking frustrations.

A slightly larger luxury bus has been ordered that will be used for longer trips. This bus is being built and we are hoping for delivery by July. A smoother riding bus will hopefully entice more residents to participate in day and overnight trips.

I would be remiss if I did not remind everyone that the speed limit on campus is 14 miles per hour. We have many residents and pets enjoying our lovely grounds so please drive carefully and cautiously.

Pool Refurbishment is Underway

SVWC'S pool renovation has been in the planning stages for over a year. It is very exciting to see this project begin. If one had wandered into the pool area prior to its closing, it would quickly become obvious that the decking was starting to split and separate from the underlayment.

The maintenance team has done a great job of applying short term solutions, but we knew the day would come for a total replacement. In a similar vein, the pool liner had started to pull away from the sides, all markings were faded, and bubbles under the liner were growing in number and size.

The time had come for the pool, which opened in 2007, to have a much needed facelift. Instead of replacing the vinyl liner, a new aggregate finish will be placed on top of the original plaster. In researching commercial pool companies and visiting with sister communities, the vinyl liner seemed to pale in comparison to other options. In addition, the pool companies are no longer using them for commercial pools.


A small team from SVWC travelled to Sunnyside Communities in Harrisonburg, Westminster Canterbury in Richmond and Lynchburg, as well as Randolph College in Lynchburg. During these visits, we obtained information about their choice of pool liner, pool decking, vendors, and how the end result impacted their swimmers. As a result of the research the following three vendors were selected: National Pools, Paintworx, and Blue Ridge Coatings.

There are five stages of this project: demolition, painting, tile work, decking prep and installation, finish and prep to reopen. The estimation for completion of the project is 8-10 weeks.

When we speak about the season of Lent we often speak in terms of taking a journey – traveling for 40 days along a road that eventually takes us to Jerusalem, to the temple, to confronta-



tion, to supper in an upper room, to a betrayal, to a trial, to a crucifixion, and finally to a resurrection.

And it's a journey we take with Jesus, as he travels to Jerusalem and to the end of his ministry. We are told that as Jesus turned toward Jerusalem he lamented over the city with the words, "Jerusalem! Jerusalem! How often I desired to gather your children together and you were not willing."

Jesus knew full well the fate that awaited him in Jerusalem, and yet was determined to go there, regardless. Using the Internet 25 years ago, as reported in the *Westbury World* for February, 1999:

Surf's Up on the Internet

Residents don't need computers and fax machines in their homes to enjoy the marvels of cyber-world – SVWC provides those services.

Fax messages can be sent and received. Give your outgoing fax to Sue (just outside Mike's office). The charge for sending messages is ten cents per page plus the cost of the long distance call. There is no line charge for local calls. Incoming messages are free. The telephone number for incoming fax material is:

(540) 665-9781

This number must be used for fax material – it is not enough for the sender to know your personal phone number. Give them the fax number.

The computer terminal in the Activities Room is available for sending and receiving email as well as for exploring the Internet. If you need instructions in sending e-mail or "surfing the net," ask at the front desk. You won't need instruction to receive e-mail – it will just show up in your mailbox.

Incoming e-mail must be addressed: "resident@svwc.org"

Your name must not be included in the address. Instead, instruct senders of your email to type your name in the subject box.

Each morning the e-mail file is checked, messages are printed out, and placed in your box by the front desk.

Bistro Concert: John O'Conor



John O'Conor, one of the world's prominent pianists, will perform in the Bistro on Friday, February 16. He has a worldwide reputation as a masterful interpreter of Beethoven and the Classic and early Romantic repertoires.

O'Conor, who trained first in Dublin and then in Vienna, is also highly regarded as a mentor to many gifted young pianists, some of whom have performed here in the Bistro. He serves currently as Distinguished Artist in Residence, Professor of Music and Chair of the Piano Division, Shenandoah Conservatory; Professor of Piano, Glenn Gould School at the Royal Conservatory of Music, Toronto; International Visiting Artist, Royal Academy of Music, Dublin; and as Visiting Professor, Showa University of Music, Japan. Lots of frequent flyer miles.

The Chicago Tribune noted: "Piano virtuosity can take a variety of forms, but one of the rarest belongs to John O'Conor. [He] ...favors inner expression and atmosphere over showmanship and bravura. In technically complex passages he ... find[s] the ideas behind the flurry of notes."

His program will feature Beethoven's Bagatelle Op. 126 and the Pathetique Sonata followed by a delicious sequence of nocturnes by John Field, Chopin, Grieg, Scriabin and Debussy designed to show that Field, a fellow Irishman, composed pieces using the nocturne form even before Chopin. These are all pieces he particularly enjoys playing.

Admission is \$10 at the door (cash only, please). Part of the proceeds benefit the Fellowship Fund. The concert begins at 7:30 p.m. Atlantic Union Bank sponsors the series.
