In the first chapter of the Gospel According to Luke we read the story about a young woman named Mary who is engaged to a man named Joseph. She is making plans to get married, to set up housekeeping, and to raise a family.

Everything is going great. But then, suddenly, everything changes. Things aren't going as planned -- at least not according to Mary's plan. Although still a virgin, she becomes pregnant before she gets married, and questions begin to race through her mind. What will Joseph think? What will he do? What will others think? How can this be? Mary is frightened, to say the least.

Amid this chaos, an angel appears – an angel named Gabriel. And to Mary, Gabriel says, "Fear not. I am an angel. And my message is that God loves you. He loves you very much and has special plans for you. This child to whom you will give birth will be the Savior of the world. And remember with God nothing is impossible." (Sort of reminds you of the old TV show Touched by an Angel, doesn't it?)

rately, very often there was a voice, a voice that spoke to me.

Sometimes the voice was present in the words of a friend or acquaintance, other times it was simply felt, and still other times it wasn't even recognizable, but was there, nonetheless.

Often in my life I have wondered and been afraid, and more than once have asked, "How can this be?"

During this time of year, it is especially helpful to remember that God is present with us in ways both seen and unseen, and that God continues to be revealed to us in a myriad of ways: sometimes through the acts of kindness shown to us by others; sometimes in events we call coincidences; sometimes in events we call miracles. And sometimes through the birth of a little child, whose arrival we joyfully celebrate this time of year.

Thomas Pandolfi Returns

The Bistro Concert on Friday, December 8, will feature the return of the internationally acclaimed classical pianist Thomas Pandolfi. Since early in his career, his passion has been to make the works of the great composers availa-



ble to music lovers everywhere, in venues modest and grand. His program will feature works by Gershwin, Debussy, and Chopin.

Pandolfi studied as a full scholarship winner at The Juilliard School in New York City as both an undergraduate and master's degree student. As a young prodigy he caught the attention of Vladimir Horowitz and composer Morton Gould.

He has sold out some of the world's famous concert halls, including The Kennedy Center, Lincoln Center's Alice Tully Hall, Strathmore, Kiev Opera House (before the war in Ukraine), Bucharest's Romanian Athenaeum, and London's Cadogan Hall. He has toured four times in China, three in the U.K., seven in Romania, and across the US and Canada.

Morton Gould said of a Pandolfi program, "It's the finest performance of Gershwin ... since the composer himself". *The Washington Post*: "... a master of both the grand gesture and the sensual line...". He is recognized as one of the great interpreters of Polish masters such as Chopin and Paderewsk.

This will be his 12th appearance in the Bistro Concert series. From his earliest performances here, we have found Pandolfi to be a gifted educator, offering audiences charming and concise insights about each piece and its composer.

The performance begins at 7:30 p.m. Admission is \$10 cash at the door. Part of the proceeds benefit the Fellowship Fund. The Bistro Concerts are sponsored by Atlantic Union Bank.


