Goodbye to an Old Friend

The Chinkapin Oak outside the Lawrence Hall front entrance has been a fixture for all of our years. Its beautiful branches and lush foliage a sight to see. Shenandoah Hall and Health Care residents facing the Lawrence Hall entrance often watched birds in its boughs.

Unfortunately several years ago, the tree was hit by lightning and has slowly lost its vigor. Last year, Bartlett Trees, nationally recognized tree experts, assessed the tree and recommended trimming away deadwood for safety and some live branches in an effort to reinvigorate it. Unfortunately no new growth has appeared.

With increasing frequency, small pieces of deadwood littered the ground; it had become clear that the tree was becoming as unsafe as it had become unsightly. SVWC Administration made the difficult decision to have it removed. Knowing its importance to the community, efforts are underway to have any solid wood made into furniture or decorative pieces for our community and to go to CCAP.

The good news is, there is a backup. Just north of the tree, away from Lawrence Hall, is a second Chinkapin Oak, now, about 12 inches in diameter. Just as in a forest, the younger tree will grow toward the sunlight and fill in the gap left by our old faithful tree. Over time, we'll be able to watch this process.
