Parking and Transportation Services

It is hard to believe that 2024 is quickly coming to an end. Time stands still for no man. It is a blessing that the second phase of our Villa project will be completed over the next several months. SVWC started welcoming new residents into Villas 1 and 2 in



late October. Villas 4 and 5 will become occupied before the end of the year and the last villa, Villa 3, will be completed and turned over to SVWC by mid-January.

With the growth of our campus, I want to mention the addition of two new parking areas and highlight the services provided by our Transportation Department. The first new parking area will contain 15 spaces and will be located along the perimeter road down from Villa 3. This parking lot can be used by visitors or Villa residents.

The second lot will be located to the right of the first three-way stop on campus. This parking area will be used by employees, which will allow for more parking in the North Lot for visitors to the campus.

The SVWC Transportation Department has several vehicles that provide a quick and easy way to get around campus or the greater community. The buses, van, or SUV provide transportation to medical appointments Monday through Friday.

There is also transportation to Walmart, Martins, Costco, and the Apple Blossom Mall on a regular basis.

With the addition of our new GEM electric vehicle, residents can get door-to-door service anywhere on campus by simply calling the Front Desk. The GEM runs Monday through Friday from 8 a.m. until 4:45 p.m. when the buses start the dinner runs. The buses will pick up Villa and Cottage residents for dinner and special events such as Thursday Night Programs, Bistro Concerts, etc.

The buses and GEM do not run on the weekends (except to churches on Sunday mornings) because parking is typically not an issue on the weekends.

A copy of the transportation schedule is lo-

cated on the resident portal, in the information racks, or you can call the Front Desk at #0 or (540) 665-0156 for more information.

SVWC is looking at longer-term parking solutions as part of our master campus planning process.

As part of her college curriculum, she studied art in London and attended the Art Students


League in New York City. She worked in the Circle Galleries

Making apple butter, as reported 25 years ago in the *Westbury World* for November, 1999:

Tradition-Making

Making apple butter at SVWC isn't yet a tradition, but it's already occurred twice, and next year, it will happen again. Next October (or for the chronological purist, a year from October) it will be a tradition carried over from the last century.

Ernie picked up six bushels of apples. SVWC residents and staff peeled them in preparation for the early morning cooking. Christy Shanholtzer brought in her great-grandfather's copper kettle (pronounced "kittle") and his stirring paddle. Ernie assembled the firewood, and residents dropped in throughout the morning, taking turns stirring and singing, "Twice 'round the outside, once through the middle..."

Christy, from our Dining Service, was helping her family make apple butter even before she was as tall as the "kittle." The huge, round-bottomed kettle is a valuable family possession that she lends to SVWC, and watches over. She said some families put copper pennies into the kettle, but her family doesn't believe it prevents burning--only constant stirring is effective. That's lucky--how long will copper pennies be found outside of coin collections?

Proceeds from the sale of the final product went to the Fellowship Fund, but more important, Mike Peasley pointed out, was the fun enjoyed by all of the participants. They all look forward to next fall.



Irish Flare in the Bistro

Husband and wife duo Tara McNeill and Alexander Bernstein combine virtuosic classical playing with traditional Irish flare. Their Bistro Concert program on Friday, November 15, will take us on a musical jour-



ney through Irish tunes, original compositions, and also covers beloved film favorites. Many of the songs are featured on the duo's debut album, *Across the Atlantic*.

Tara is a principal performer with Celtic Woman, an all-female musical group launched by one of the creators of Riverdance. Founded 20 years ago for a one-time event in Dublin, the group quickly gained fame in the United States, touring frequently across the country, appearing on PBS and holding top of the chart billing for record times.

Tara, a gifted vocalist and violist, joined Celtic Woman eight years ago. She has performed with them around the world and recorded numerous albums with them. The group has appeared at the Red Rocks in Colorado, the 3Arena in Dublin, Wolf Trap in Virginia, and the popular London Palladium.

Tara and Alex married in 2018, then continued separate careers from opposite sides of the ocean. In 2023 they recorded "Across the Atlantic," an album of spirited Irish tunes and original compositions heard last fall in a captivating faculty recital at Shenandoah University's Goodson Hall.

Alex's academic training includes a bachelor's degree from Harvard University, then Masters and Doctorate degrees from the Royal Irish Academy of Music in Dublin under the tutelage of John O'Conor. He then served four years as Professor of Piano at Shenandoah Conservatory and recently crossed the Atlantic to join the faculty of the Royal Academy in Dublin.

Their concert begins at 7:30 p.m. Admission is \$10 cash at the door. The concert series is sponsored by Atlantic Union Bank.
