

Remembering Our Veterans

Thomas Pandolfi Returns

Internationally acclaimed American pianist Thomas Pandolfi will return for his 13th performance in the Bistro Concert Series on Friday, December 13. He has been a favorite among residents since his first appearance here. He has also



played in The World of Piano series at Shenandoah Conservatory's Armstrong Hall. His career has included weeks-long tours in China and frequent performances in Eastern Europe. He has distinguished himself in concerts across the United States and in top venues in Europe.

On full scholarships at The Juilliard School, he earned his Bachelor's and Master's of Music degrees, studying under Vladimir Horowitz and Morton Gould. He was cited as a "phenomenon" early in his career.

He has performed at famous venues: Alice Tully Hall at Lincoln Center, The Kennedy Center, Kiev Opera House, Bucharest's Athenaeum and London's Cadogan Hall. Closer to Winchester, he has played at The Secret Garden at the Rectory, Alexandria, VA., Washington County Museum of Fine Arts, Hagerstown, MD, and The University of Mary Washington, Fredericksburg, VA.

The Washington Post declared Thomas "a master of both the grand gesture and the sensual line." The Asheville Citizen-Times observed that "His virtuosity and strength ...might have had some believing that Liszt himself had taken over the keyboard." Other observers note his strong technical command of the score and the lyrical beauty of his expression.

His program in the Bistro this December will showcase many of Liszt's finest works. Thomas succeeds where others do not because of his passion for bringing the finest of classical music to listeners in venues large and small across the globe.

The performance will begin at 7:30 p.m. sharp. Admission is \$10 cash at the door. The series is sponsored by Atlantic Union Bank.

Lifelong Learning for December

SVWC Lifelong Learning will host one-hour sessions every Monday in December at 2:00 p.m. in The Abbey.

We begin with two topics, that each preview one of the 2025 "Great Decisions" topics announced by the Foreign Policy Association (FPA).

On December 2, our topic is "After Gaza; American policy in the Middle East." What are the possible outcomes of the war, and how might the United States use its influence to shape a long-term settlement that leaves both Israel and the Palestinians in a better position? How might Arab states in the wider region be brought into a settlement? What are America's interests in the Middle East and how can it advance them?

On December 9, our topic is "International cooperation on climate change." The 2015 Paris Agreement established a UN-sponsored framework for negotiations on climate change and global warming. What is the U.S. role in fostering cooperation on climate change? In a divided country, what is the range of possible futures for American policy leadership?

The FPA "Great Decisions" sessions with outside speakers will be scheduled for February-March-April 2025. Residents who want to order the FPA Guidebook should contact Teresa Barton soon. Books are \$30 based on Teresa's ability to order in advance.

On December 16, the Lifelong Learning program will join with the Westbury Choristers, led by Sue Correll, for an hour of holiday music including traditional carols that we all can join in singing. Songbooks will be available.

The final two Mondays, December 23 and December 30, will showcase some "best new ideas from recent TED Talks" for information and discussion.

Residents, future residents, staff, and guests are always welcome to attend. Please join us Mondays at 2:00 p.m. in the Abbey.


