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A Tribute and Thank You to Cari and Bob Sherwood

Cari and Bob Sherwood had only been residents for nine months when they launched the Bistro Concert Series in December 2008. The Bistro Concert Series idea was fashioned after a small music venue they held at their church known as Sounds of Grace, which raised funds to establish an outreach program. They felt the same type of event could be started at Shenandoah Valley Westminster-Canterbury to raise funds for the Fellowship Fund.

Over the next 17 years, roughly 900 musicians have performed in the Bistro Concert Series. Even during the COVID shutdown, they continued to ensure musical performances were held. They were instrumental in the success of the concerts, making the contacts, scheduling performers across the many music genres, and helping with the setup of the Bistro. They ensured that the piano was tuned correctly.

Popular performers such as Thomas Pandolfi and Robbie Limon have returned year after year. The caliber of music rose over the years, attracting those who perform on the international level such as Tom Clyde Shaw, John O'Connor, Tim Roberts, Julian Schwarz and Tara McNeill. From classical to jazz to bluegrass and rock and roll, the groups brought live, quality music to an ever-growing audience. The Sherwoods nurtured personal relationships with these artists to continue to offer quality programs to SVWC every month of the year.

The concerts are open to the general public, and have provided an opportunity for people to get to know SVWC and what it has to offer.

SVWC is grateful and thankful for Cari and Bob's diligent and dedicated service. And for the approximately \$90,000 the concerts have raised for the Fellowship Fund.

A Message from Our CEO

SVWC has achieved accreditation by the Commission on Accreditation of Rehabilitation Facilities (CARF) since 1996. CARF is an independent, nonprofit accreditor of health and human services whose mission is to promote the quality, value, and optimal outcomes of services through a consultative accreditation process and continuous improvement services that focus on enhancing the lives of persons served.



Achieving and sustaining accreditation shows the community's commitment to continuously improving services, managing risk, and distinguishing service delivery. Other benefits and advantages of accreditation include person focused standards that emphasize an integrated and individualized approach to services and outcomes, improved communication with persons served, management techniques that are efficient, cost-effective, and based on outcomes and consumer satisfaction, assurance that SVWC has demonstrated conformance to internationally accepted standards, and guidance for responsible management and professional growth of personnel.

Our accreditation expires in November; SVWC is scheduled to be surveyed for reaccreditation this fall. Over the next month, we will begin to prepare for the survey. Staff will be asked to work on sections of the CARF manual, and teams will be formed that will include staff, residents, future residents, family members, and the Board of Trustees. Surveyors (except for the financial review, which is conducted virtually) will be on site for three or four days. Time will be spent touring the community and meeting with individual stakeholders (residents, family members, employees, and board members).

Once the survey has been completed, CARF will send a report outlining areas of strength and opportunities for quality improvement. SVWC will then be required to submit a Quality Improvement Plan to address the areas of improvement.

The process is intense, but one that SVWC feels is very important to the long-term success of our community. Stay tuned for more information in the coming months.

Two Bistro Concerts in February



February will enjoy two scheduled Bistro Concerts: To celebrate Black History Month, the first concert will be on the 6th, and will honor John Kirby, a Winchester-born jazzman. A sextet led by Bob Larson, recently retired Chair of Jazz

Studies at Shenandoah Conservatory, will recreate Kirby's best-known group, the Onyx Club Band, nicknamed "The Biggest Little Band in the Land." Born in 1908, Kirby made significant contributions to the development of American jazz. He exhibited skill in writing, arranging, and showcasing the latest trends in jazz. He played with some of the top jazz musicians of the day, such as Dizzy Gillespie and Sarah Vaughn. In the 1930s and 1940s, he developed "classical jazz," drawing from his knowledge of classical music and love of jazz. Those works have recently been rediscovered and praised by jazz historians.

The second Bistro Concert will be on the 20th. John O'Connor, one of the world's prominent pianists, will perform. O'Connor spent several years in Vienna, researching the original handwritten scores of Beethoven and developed a particularly unique understanding of the composer and his music composition as it transitioned from harpsichord to piano. Orchestras around the globe seek O'Connor for his masterful interpretations of Beethoven. The *Chicago Tribune* has noted: "Piano virtuosity can take a variety of forms, but one of the rarest belongs to John O'Connor. [He] ... favors inner expression and atmosphere over showmanship and bravura. In technically complex passages, he ... find[s] the ideas behind the flurry of notes." O'Connor's February program will feature Beethoven, Hayden, and Mozart.

Each of the programs begins at 7:30 p.m. Admission is \$10 (cash only). Proceeds help support the Fellowship Fund. Atlantic Union Bank sponsors the series.



Lifelong Learning

SVWC Lifelong Learning will host the eight Great Decisions sessions on Mondays in February and March starting at 2:00 p.m. and ending by 3:30 p.m. in the Abbey. Great Decisions classes are organized by the Foreign Policy Association (FPA). The FPA provides DVD video overviews and guidebooks for participants with emphasis on group discussion. SVWC resident Mark Lore arranges for local area experts to facilitate each session.

Residents, future residents, staff, Winchester residents, and other guests are welcome to attend and participate in the discussions.

On **February 2** the topic, **America and the World: Trump 2.0 Foreign Policy**, will be addressed by Dr. Jeff Coker, Dean, College of Arts and Sciences at Shenandoah University.

February 9 will address: **Trump Tariffs & the Future of the World Economy**. Financial advisors Adam Stewart & Amanda Giangola of United Brokerage Services will be our guides.

The topic on **February 16** is **U.S.-China Relations**, with resident Bob Bolan as facilitator.

On **February 23**, Patrick Farris, Shepherd University instructor, will address the fourth topic: **Ruptured Alliances & the Risk of Nuclear Proliferation**.

The FPA provides a "Master Class" on DVD for each session. These will be shown the Thursday BEFORE each Monday at 2:30 p.m. in the Aerobics Room in the Fitness Center.

Chaplain's Message

I always look forward to the season of Lent – the forty days that lead us toward Easter and provide us the opportunity to reflect on our faith and its significance in providing guidance, direction, and purpose for our lives. For me, it's a time to be extra intentional about practices like prayer and spiritual reflection, and while I don't give anything up for Lent, I do spend a little extra time thinking about matters of faith.



Lent is a period of spiritual reflection with the purpose of deepening faith, encouraging repentance, and allowing us to focus on the sacrifice and resurrection of Jesus Christ. The 40 days of Lent symbolize the 40 days Jesus spent fasting in the desert, resisting temptation, and preparing for his earthly ministry.

At SVWC, we will begin our Lenten observance on Ash Wednesday, February 18, with a worship service at 4:00 p.m. in the Chapel. For those interested, the service will include the imposition of ashes on the forehead, a sign of repentance since biblical times. The imposition of ashes is typically done with the sign of a cross, and accompanied with the words, *"Remember that you are dust, and to dust you shall return."*

This year during the season of Lent, I encourage you to spend some time in prayer and meditation, and faithfully and thoughtfully to consider the significance of Jesus' sacrifice as a sign of God's love for us all, and as a means by which our relationship with our creator is restored. And may we seek always to reach out toward one another as God has so wonderfully reached out to us.




