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Tanzania Summary 6 December 2022

Tanzanian citizens file a lawsuit against Canadian gold producer Barrick Gold (Barrick) over alleged police violence at Barrick's North Mara facility. The claim, filed on 23 November in the superior court of justice in Ontario (Canada) accuses Barrick of being complicit in extrajudicial killings by police guarding the facility. Barrick denies responsibility for local police actions. Energy minister January Makamba and James Mataragio, the managing director of Tanzania Petroleum Development Corporation (TPDC) agree to addendums on the Ruvuma Production Sharing Agreement (PSA) providing for natural gas production. The move shows positive movement in exploring the country's gas resources. The government also commits to accelerating commercial production, aiming for the Rovuma gas project to be completed within 12-18 months. Investigations into the Precision Air flight that crashed into Lake Victoria on 6 November, resulting in 19 fatalities, reveal significant flaws in Tanzania's disaster preparedness and emergency infrastructure. The investigations also highlight that a 2016 African Development Bank-funded project to enhance communication and safety mechanisms for Lake Victoria failed to have any operational impact on rescue operations.

Case filed against Barrick Gold over alleged human rights abuses

Tanzanian citizens filed a lawsuit against **Canadian** gold producer **Barrick Gold (Barrick)** over alleged police violence at the miner's **North Mara** facility with the superior court of justice in **Ontario** (Canada) on 23 November. The suit, filed on behalf of alleged victims and their families, accuses Barrick of being responsible for the violence committed by mine police and security which has included killings, torture, and shootings.¹ It is the first case filed against Barrick in a Canadian court for alleged violations abroad, but a precedent was set in 2019 when the Canadian superior court ruled that a lawsuit against Canadian metals miner **NevSun Resources Ltd** for alleged abuses at an **Eritrean** mine could be heard in Canada.²

Tanzania is the fourth largest gold producer in **Africa** and accounts for 1.3% of the total global gold production.³ In the year ending December 2021, exports reached \$2.743 billion and accounted for 89.95% of mineral revenues.⁴ Barrick is a sector leader with its two mines - North Mara and **Bulyanhulu** - projected to achieve production in excess of 500,000 ounces of gold this fiscal year.⁵ Barrick operates these mines through **Twiga Minerals Corporation**, a joint venture between Barrick (84%) and the Tanzanian government (16%).⁶

This is the third lawsuit filed against Barrick regarding alleged human rights abuses by security services around its North Mara mine. A security presence is important to protect both the mine as well as the safety of villagers who routinely enter the site to collect a low-grade rock from which they can extract trace amounts of gold.⁷ However, the violence with which the police respond to these

intrusions is widely criticised. Plaintiffs claim that Barrick “has had effective and practical control” over Tanzanian police tasked with mine security and allege that the company’s security agreements contribute to the police being regarded as North Mara’s “private and heavily armed security force.”⁸

United Kingdom (UK) based RAID (Rights and Accountability in Development), a nongovernmental organization which promotes responsible conduct and respect for human rights by companies working in Africa claims that in late 2020 Barrick removed weapons from their internal security provider **Nguvu Moja** which subsequently contributed to an expanded role for local police:

“Barrick’s extensive use of police, rather than private security, seeks to minimise the company’s legal liability for violence against local residents.”⁹

In multiple reports, RAID regards Barrick’s North Mara mine as “one of the deadliest in Africa”.¹⁰ RAID’s research alleges that since Barrick acquired the mine in 2006 there have been 77 people killed and 304 injured by police acting as mine security.¹¹ A spokesperson for Barrick, in response to the recent allegations, said the claim is “riddled with inaccuracies” affirming that “Barrick has no control or direction of any nature over the Tanzanian police.”¹²

Barrick released a statement on 29 November noting that tensions escalated at North Mara when 100 illegal miners armed with machetes and spears attempted to breach the mine’s perimeter wall. Unarmed private security officers were unable to prevent the intrusion, prompting the mine to ask the police to enter the site and remove them. The parties clashed leaving two police officers injured and one illegal miner dead.¹³ At the time of writing, the Tanzanian government has not yet commented on the incident, potentially exacerbating the villagers’ feelings of animosity towards the police as well as Barrick whom they view as being responsible for police action, resulting in a continuation of violent clashes.

President **Samia Suluhu Hassan** (2021-present), throughout her presidency, has committed to creating an investor-friendly mining sector to boost its contribution to Tanzania’s gross domestic product (GDP) to 10% by 2025.¹⁴ It is unlikely that the recent accusations against Barrick will result in any policy changes affecting the relationship between mining companies and Hassan’s government but if the government does not acknowledge incidences of alleged human rights abuses and the role of the police, there may be an increased risk of instability between the local population and mine employees.

Barrick has also made significant contributions to the Tanzanian economy and civil society, committing up to \$70m for investment in value-adding national projects which include training, skills development and scientific facilities in addition to road infrastructure.¹⁵ In what could be observed as an attempt to redeem its reputation, **Barrick Corporation** announced on 28 November that for every ounce of gold sold by its two Tanzanian mines, it would spend \$6 on improving healthcare, education, infrastructure, and access to potable water for the communities around their mines.¹⁶ Barrick president and chief executive **Mark Bristow** said that the investment program was the latest evolution of the company’s successful partnership with the government.

Allegations of human rights abuses in foreign-owned and operated mines are not uncommon. UK mining company **Petra Diamonds** agreed in May 2021 to pay out GBP 4.3m (\$5.28m) in compensation over allegations that claimants were shot, stabbed, and beaten by local security contractors and Tanzanian police.¹⁷ The preceding cases to the one filed against Barrick on 23

November indicate that a monetary settlement could be sought but companies should be aware of increased scrutiny over potential human rights issues and accountability. Ensuring that human rights are upheld by local contractors would boost legitimacy for international observers as well as the local residents around the mines.

Tanzania ramps up engagements on gas projects

Energy minister **January Makamba** and **James Mataragio**, the managing director of **Tanzania Petroleum Development Corporation (TPDC)**, signed an update to the production-sharing agreement (PSA) for the **Ruvuma** onshore gas project on 25 November. TPDC and **ARA Petroleum Tanzania (APT)**, a subsidiary of **Oman's Zubair Corporation**, set out the relevant terms for gas production and development of the **Ntorya** gas field in the PSA. APT is currently a 50% interest holder and operator of the Ruvuma PSA but announced its intention in September to acquire UK-headquartered **Scirocco Energy PLC's** 25% interest by end of this year. The other 25% is held by **Ndovu Resources Limited**, a wholly owned subsidiary of **Irish** oil and gas company **Aminex PLC**.¹⁸

The PSA was initially signed in 2005 for oil exploration and appraisal activities and only had terms for oil production, but in 2011 gas was discovered in the **Ntorya-1** well and under the new addendums, the government has committed to supporting the development of gas resources and agreed to accelerate commercial gas production in Ruvuma.¹⁹

Makamba stated in the signing ceremony that the government intends to see the project completed within 12-18 months.²⁰ Mataragio reinforced this sentiment stating that the research and discovery of gas is completed and the construction of a 30km gas pipeline from the field to the **Madimba** processing and pumping station should be ready within six to nine months.²¹ Ruvuma shareholders are expecting to invest \$500m for the development and production of the gas field which is expected to produce approximately 45.3 billion cubic metres.²²

Makamba reiterated that this is an important agreement for Tanzania as the addendums provide for an increase in government benefits in the project from 68% to 75%. The successful implementation of this project will benefit Tanzania through the collection of 12.5% in royalties, 30% in corporate income tax, and 30% in additional profit tax, as well as employment opportunities for Tanzanian citizens.²³ **Charles Santos**, executive chairman of Aminex, commented that the signing ceremony was a "*tangible sign*" of the government's commitment to Ruvuma and energy production. Santos further highlighted:

*"The Ruvuma PSA addendum is just the latest demonstration of the determination of all parties to work constructively and rapidly together to advance this significant project."*²⁴

The signing of the addendums signals to investors that oil and gas exploration in Tanzania is moving forwards and it is a positive indication for the Host Government Agreement (HGA) between the government, **Anglo-Dutch Shell** and **Norway**-headquartered **Equinor** for the \$30 billion liquefied Natural Gas (LNG) project which is expected to be finalised by year-end. The development of Tanzania's gas resources is particularly important due to Tanzania's increased reliance on gas-fired electricity plants as prolonged drought has negatively impacted water supplies thus reducing hydro-power generation on which much of the country depends.

Airplane crash exposes flaws in government's disaster preparedness

Investigations into the **Precision Air** flight that crashed into **Lake Victoria** on 6 November, resulting in 19 fatalities, have revealed significant flaws in Tanzania's disaster preparedness and emergency

infrastructure.²⁵ The flight was carrying 43 passengers from **Dar es Salaam** to **Bukoba** airport, considered one of the hardest airports to land in as the airport has no control tower and insufficient lighting, in addition to the runway being surrounded by hills and located next to the lake.²⁶

A preliminary report by the state agency **Air Accident Investigation Branch (AAIB)** cited “*wind shear*” and reduced visibility due to adverse weather conditions as a likely primary cause for the crash but claimed that more passengers could have been saved if official rescue operations were launched faster and emergency workers better equipped.²⁷ The single police marine unit for the region was notified 15 minutes after the crash but did not arrive until 4 hours later with police divers that had insufficient oxygen in their cylinders as well as a lack of fuel.²⁸ The ten firemen from Bukoba fire station were not equipped for offensive operations.²⁹

The **Tanzania Airports Authority (TAA)** declared on 9 November that Bukoba airport was safe for landing after TAA director **Mussa Mburu** announced that on an assessment of technical and safety standards by the **International Civil Aviation Organisation (ICAO)**, Tanzania scored 67% in airport safety and security, above the minimum requirement of 60%.³⁰

President Hassan called an emergency cabinet meeting following the event to strengthen the country’s disaster response while **France’s** high commissioner **Nabil Hajlaoui** confirmed that the **Bureau of Enquiry and Analysis for Civil Aviation Safety** would assist in the air crash probe alongside a team of technical advisers from **ATR**, the French company that produced the plane which crashed.³¹

The role of the emergency services was heavily criticised by the media, and defence minister **Innocent Bashungwa**, responded to public concerns by saying the government will work on the issue.³² Works and transport minister **Makame Mbarawa** noted the general lack of official preparedness for such disasters but further announced that the preliminary AAIB report was released without official sanction and should therefore be dismissed.³³

James Mbatia, former chairman of the opposition party **NCCR-Mageuzi**, called the response to the crash “*the highest level of systemic negligence*”³⁴ The acute lack of equipment preparedness was further noted by **Khalil Iqbal**, secretary of the **Tanzania Pilots Association (Tapa)**. Under ICAO’s requirements, airports located near a body of water must have several emergency services to help in case of accidents. One of the requirements is that such airports must have an emergency operations centre, a mobile command post, and a communication centre.³⁵

Lake Victoria is listed as the most dangerous water body in the world with an average of 5,000 deaths by drowning per year, and in October 2016, the **African Development Bank (AfDB)** approved \$36m in funds for a regional maritime project and transport strategy for the **East African Community (EAC)**. The project aimed to establish a maritime communication system for safety on Lake Victoria through the construction and equipping of a maritime safety coordination centre and search and rescue centre. AfDB documents show completed purchases of land for the centre as well as logistical costs, but it is not yet clear when and how the project will be completed.³⁶ The slow and inadequate response of the emergency services to the crash shows that there is a wide disparity between the project’s goals and the reality on the ground. The operational capacity for communication and

coordination was absent in practice. Bashungwa stated that moving forward, the disaster management department in coordination with the defence and national service ministry will develop a database of rescue equipment in the government in the private sector.³⁷

The government has yet to release its own investigative report on the tragedy. The preliminary AAIB bulletin was the first of three reports required by international aviation rules; an official government report will be released before the end of the year and the final report by ATR will be issued within one year of the crash.
