Jennie Salamoun



She guides the user experience (UX).

Makes sure users (people) can find and do what they need. Finds out who they are and what they care about.

Brian Maddox



He crafts the user interface (UI).

Designs the actual screens, and prepares them for developers to build. Creates new brands and expands existing ones.

"Design thinking"

as defined by...

IDEO (credited with coining the term)

A human-centered approach to innovation that draws from the designer's toolkit to integrate the needs of people, the possibilities of technology, and the requirements for business success

Harvard Business Review

A mindset and approach to problem-solving and innovation anchored around human-centered design

Interaction Design Foundation

A non-linear, iterative process that teams use to understand users, challenge assumptions, redefine problems and create innovative solutions to prototype and test




Understanding your users and identifying their (real) problems leads to:


Exploration with multidisciplinary teams, generates:
