About Today's Service

Karen Armstrong is a British writer and religious historian. She is best known for her work in comparative religion and for founding the Charter for Compassion. The Prayer of Dedication is taken from her autobiography, *The Spiral Staircase*. It recounts her unhappy years as a nun in a convent, academic failure, and a diagnosis of epilepsy before she was given the chance to write a documentary on early Christianity. Her work emphasizes the importance of compassion and the "Golden Rule" across different faith traditions, arguing that religion is a practical discipline for achieving a fulfilled humanity rather than a set of dogmatic beliefs.
