About Today's Service

This Sunday, Christians following the liturgical calendar observe Christ the King Sunday as the end of our church year. This day was designated by Pope Pius XI in 1925 in response to the increasing threat of the rise of fascism in Europe leading up to World War II. It serves as a reminder that Christ's status as "king" is separate from any political group on earth—Christ is not Caesar, and Caesar is not Christ.

Covenant is an affiliate church of the Baptist Joint Committee on Religious Freedom (BJC), a nonpartisan group of Baptists committed to religious freedom in the United States. Founded in 1936, the BJC is driven by the historic Baptist principle of *soul freedom*: the belief that faith should not be dictated by any government authority and the necessity of advocating for the separation of church and state. The BJC's offices are located directly across from the Supreme Court, reflecting their status as a political watchdog. Their work is focused on national-level political advocacy, filing amicus curiae ("friend-of-the-court") briefs in favor of religious freedom and collaborating with other religious groups for joint advocacy opportunities.

In 2019, the BJC launched Christians Against Christian Nationalism, an interdenominational movement focused on combatting the threat of Christian nationalism. The movement is centered on **raising awareness** of the dangers of Christian nationalism, through media, events, and curriculum development; **political advocacy** through signing petitions, testifying in court, and speaking with representatives; and **local organizing** to build relationships with community leaders, partners, and members on a grassroots scale.
