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About Today's Service

Happy New Year! Covenant follows the liturgical year, an ancient Christian calendar that shapes our worshipping life around the story of Jesus's birth, life, death, and resurrection. This week, Christians around the world begin the new liturgical year with the season of Advent: four weeks of anticipation, patience, and preparation before celebrating the birth of Jesus at Christmas. At Covenant, we have an Advent wreath with four blue candles. The blue color symbolizes the broad hopefulness of the season. The first candle lit today also represents hope. At the start of each week of Advent, we will light an additional candle, in turn symbolizing peace, joy, and love. We will light the center candle, called the "Christ candle," on Christmas Eve.
