OUR PROJECTS STRENGTHEN LOCAL ECONOMIES AND COMMUNITIES

Large-scale data center development creates a ripple effect across local economies — through job creation, local sourcing, tax revenue, and workforce development. At Crusoe, we work to ensure that the benefits reach as far into the community as possible. Across all projects to date, Crusoe has supported over 13,000 jobs and invested over \$20 billion locally.

→ Jobs

We prioritize hiring local residents and invest in workforce development

- Construction brings a major surge of employment. At our Abilene Stargate campus, where more than **8,000 workers** were on site daily at peak, half of the workforce was hired in Texas.
- Full-time roles spanning data center technicians, facilities engineers, and operations managers become available once our campuses are operational. Our Abilene Stargate Campus will support approximately **1,700 full-time jobs**.
- We partner with community colleges and apprenticeship programs to ensure local residents can learn the skills needed to access these roles directly.
- Through Crusoe Industries, we're building local manufacturing capability for critical electrical components and reducing dependence on global supply chains. To date, we've created over **1,000 skilled trade positions** in Tulsa and the Denver area.

→ Investment

Our projects support the local economy

They contribute to local property tax revenues and drive spending at local businesses.



- The Development Corporation of Abilene estimates approximately **\$1 billion** in direct and indirect economic impact from the first two campus buildings over 20 years.
- The full Abilene Stargate campus is expected to deliver up to **25%** of the City of Abilene's and up to **32%** of Taylor County's 2025 budgeted property tax revenue once operational.
- In 2025, **\$20 million** flowed into local Abilene businesses through daily meals for construction workers.

- Contributing to local youth 4H programs

- We design our projects and plan energy supply proactively to avoid stressing local electricity grids or raising utility bills for residents and businesses in our host communities.

Our facilities minimize water use

- Closed-loop cooling systems do not consume or evaporate water to cool the equipment.
- High-efficiency fixtures minimize everyday building water use.
- Native landscaping minimizes the need for irrigation.
- Continuous leak detection ensures what little water we do use isn't being lost.
