

## Identifying Clauses and Phrases (Part Two)

In each of these sentences, underline independent clauses, double underline dependent clauses, and cross out nonessential phrases.

Example: Even though the boy, ~~who had been running all day~~, was tired, he was ready to get back to work.

1. Not for the first time, an argument had broken out over breakfast at number four Privet Drive because of a loud, hooting noise.
2. After Harry's uncle Vernon, who had a bit of fried egg dangling from his mustache, exchanged dark looks with his wife, he yelled at Harry.
3. Harry tried to argue back, but his words were drowned out by a long, loud belch from the Dursleys' son, Dudley, who then asked for more bacon.
