2.0 Meeting Notes – August 22, 2024

Welcome, Introductions, and Agenda

Kyle Clark, International Association of Chiefs of Police (IACP), introduced himself, welcomed participants to the Florida Impaired Driving Coalition (FIDC) meeting, and thanked everyone for joining. He facilitated a round of introductions and provided an update on items of interest happening at the national and international levels and their importance for reducing impaired driving related fatalities and serious injuries.

He noted that the IACP passed a resolution recommending the adoption of impaired driving laws to include any impairing substance emphasizing that Florida is part of a decreasing number of states that have not adopted such laws. Additionally, toxicologists are adding to the list of professional endorsements for the inclusion of Drug Recognition Experts (DRE) testimony as expert witnesses in evidentiary hearings.

Kyle also mentioned the International Road Policing Alliance (IRPA), an organizational project supported by the IACP that aims to promote safer mobility and decrease deaths and serious injuries from road crashes worldwide. He encouraged coalition members to participate in the IRPA as subject matter experts. He said that the IRPA is developing a directory so members of the alliance can find and utilize the expertise of its members. He said membership is free and highlighted how participating in the IRPA and the IACP may increase access to new technologies.

The IACP in collaboration with the National Sheriffs Association and the National Traffic Safety Board (NTSB) are conducting research to develop a best practices guide to reduce wrong way driving. The NTSB is also looking at the role of speeding in traffic crashes and for discrepancies between databases and crash reports.

The IACP Impaired Driving and Traffic Safety (IDTS) Conference was held August 16-18, 2024 in Washington, DC. There were over 1,400 attendees and 41 workshops. The next IDTS conference will take place from May 5-7, 2025 in Indianapolis, Indiana.

Lakeisha White, Florida Department of Transportation (FDOT), introduced herself as the new program manager for the impaired driving emphasis area. She provided her background and said she looked forward to continue the great work of the coalition

Danny Shopf, Cambridge Systematics (CS), gave an overview of the agenda and the meeting followed.

FIDC Strategic Action Plan Subcommittee Breakout Session

Attendees joined into subcommittee groups based on the following Action Items:

- 1B.3 Develop a visual representation of Florida's full impaired driving countermeasures system which maps out what happens to someone when they receive a DUI (enforcement through treatment)
- 2C.5 Evaluate opportunities to develop underage impaired driving pilot program (perhaps in conjunction with existing programs, like Drive with Care) in an area(s) with high rate of underage impaired driving



• 6A.6 – Develop and update model language that would allow agencies to utilize oral fluid testing kits and align with national best practices

2024 Impaired Driving Fact Sheet and Data

Chanyoung Lee, CUTR, presented on the 2024 Impaired Driving Fact Sheet and the data contained within it. He discussed fatalities involving an impaired driver from 2013-2022, noting that 2022 is the most recent year for which data is finalized. Chanyoung elaborated that the next pieces of data are based on a five year time frame of 2018-2022. As a percentage of Florida's total traffic fatalities, approximately 30 percent involve an impaired driver.

The number of fatalities and serious injuries involving an impaired driver is above the yearly average for the months of March, January, and December with elevated numbers of fatalities and serious injuries in November and April as well. As expected, fatalities and serious injuries involving an impaired driver are highest on Saturday and Sunday. By time of day, fatalities peak during the 2am hour, likely reflecting when most bars close, and serious injuries peak during the 9pm hour. Chanyoung noted that for 2020 and 2021 the highest number of fatalities and serious injuries is from midnight and 3am and that there was an increase in 2021 and 2022. He emphasized that interestingly the year of the vehicle involved in impaired driving crashes was older during these years, indicating that in the aftermath of the events of 2020, people that had newer cars were possibly driving less and working remotely and people who had no other option than to drive to in-person jobs drove older vehicles. More analysis is needed to confirm this hypothesis.

Chanyoung next discussed the type of impairment in fatal crashes by month and time of day, breaking the fatal crashes down by alcohol only, drugs only, and alcohol and drugs. He then displayed the age and gender breakdown of crashes involving impaired drivers from 2018-2022. As expected, young males remain the demographic group overrepresented in crashes involving an impaired driver. Analyzing the data by residency and vehicle type, Chanyoung said that Florida residents were overwhelmingly involved in 96 percent of fatal and serious injury crashes involving an impaired driver. Vehicle type resembles the vehicle registration patterns of the state as well.

The next data point Chanyoung analyzed was the number of Driving Under the Influence (DUI) citations by agency from 2013-2022. He emphasized that the large annual decrease of 16.9 percent that occurred in 2020 quickly rebounded by 17.4 percent the following year.

Lastly, Chanyoung compared the percentage of impaired driving fatalities to the total fatalities by county in 2019, 2021, and 2022 by month. Duval County had the highest percentage of impaired driving fatalities with 63 percent of the county's total fatalities in November for the average of the years listed above. He noted that although Miami-Dade and Palm Beach counties had greater numbers of total fatalities, the percentage of fatalities involving an impaired driver is less. Surprisingly, in Marion County 60 percent of the total fatalities during the average of the years for the month of September involved an impaired driver.

Participants had the following questions and comments:

• Chanyoung asked for the coalitions insight as to why the percentages were so high in Duval and Marion counties?



- Kevin Milan, Miami Beach Police Department, said that officers may need more resources and that some agencies may not be following up on crashes that require more paperwork than others.
- Melissa Gonzalez, Florida Department of Highway Safety and Motor Vehicles (FLHSMV), asked what data elements from the crash report are being used for the data analysis that was presented?
 - Chanyoung said crashes involving an impaired driver are flagged based on alcohol and drug test refused and Blood Alcohol Content (BAC).
 - Melissa asked how many of those elements are validated?
 - Chanyoung said they are validated based on the Fatality Analysis Reporting System (FARS) and toxicology results.
 - Danny suggested that the data elements that are flagged within the crash report may not include suspected drugs or alcohol. So the results of those crashes may not be reported and counted under impairment?
 - DaNa' Perry, FLHSMV, said the submissions from the Medical Examiners' offices are completely voluntary and may not be a reliable method of data validation. She emphasized that crash data is reliant on officers.
 - Chris Craig, FDOT, asked if there was a reporting mechanism to determine gaps in the crash data?
 - Melissa said the FARS data that is reported to the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA) is the most comprehensive file. To validate the conclusions made here, the exact data elements would be needed to replicate the query from the FARS file. Suspected alcohol or drug use presents challenges because it is often blank on the crash report, even in crashes where impairment has been confirmed by other means.
 - Melissa said Traffic and Criminal Software (TraCS) provides a proactive example that could be included in future vendor trainings.
 - Chris suggested it is an agency level challenge and asked how to appropriately encourage agencies to ensure reporting as accurately as possible?
 - Laura Anstead, Citrus County Sheriff's Office, asked if all agencies us TraCS?
 - Melissa said that even if TraCS sends out reminders to be filled out, agencies are not required to collaborate.
 - Rachel suggested she can request that TraCS does not accept blanks in the alcohol or drugs suspected field.
 - Melissa said that may slow down the required 24 hour reporting of fatal crashes.



- Juan Cardona, FDOT Law Enforcement Liaison (LEL) District 2, suggested it could be a lack of enforcement. In comparing Miami-Dade and Duval counties there is a 500,000 difference in the number of citations and Miami-Dade does not have a lack of resources.
- Chris Craig said Duval is likely to participate in subgrant activities this next fiscal year and to connect him with agencies or contacts in Marion County, and to think about additional data points to include in next year's fact sheet.

3.0 Meeting Notes – August 23, 2024

Recap of Day 1

Kyle welcomed participants and thanked them for attending Day 2 of the FIDC meeting. Kyle gave a detailed recap of Day 1 that included the following:

- DRE program testimony in evidentiary hearings endorsements now include toxicologists.
- IACP passed resolution supporting the adoption of laws incorporating any impairing substance into DUI definitions.
- The March edition of Police Chief Magazine will focus on Road Safety and Kyle is a guest editor. The magazine will be collecting articles for police leaders and professionals.
- NTSB and IACP reviewing best practices for wrong way driving
- Action Plan breakout sessions on Action Steps 1B.3, 2C.5, 6A.6
- 2024 Impaired Driving Fact Sheet and discussion
- Updated Action Plan goals 2, 4, 6

Danny reviewed the agenda and the meeting followed.



Spanish SFST Tear Sheets

Chris Craig provided copies of Standardized Field Sobriety Test (SFST) tear sheets. He asked the coalition for their input on if the tear sheets should be translated into Spanish since some agencies were asking some of the LELs for Spanish versions.

Participants had the following questions and comments:

- Larry Coggins, Mothers Against Drunk Driving (MADD), said the numerous Spanish dialects across
 Florida make it challenging to have an accurate translation that effectively reaches all Spanish speakers
 across the state.
- Juan said that officers that work in areas with a prevalence of Spanish speakers can translate as needed, but different dialects pose challenges especially in court.
- Kyle noted that the IACP translates materials for countries that request it, but regionally and at the state level translating these tear sheets could cause more problems than they address.

Paid Media – Drive Sober or Get Pulled Over

Chris Craig presented the Drive Sober or Get Pulled Over - Labor Day paid media campaign. The campaign will be focused on men ages 18-34 in all Florida Designated Media Markets (DMAs) from August 14th -September 2nd with a \$1 million budget. Ads will be run on radio, digital audio, digital video, social media, and billboards. Chris displayed the different materials for each type of safety marketing. He then discussed the investment by channel and media market. He played the latest Drive Sober or Get Pulled Over videos that NHTSA will be running concurrently with the FDOT media campaign. Chris noted that all the ads emphasize a positive approach encouraging viewers to drink responsibly and noted that the billboards are consistently rated to be the form of media that the public is most aware of as indicated post-campaign awareness surveys. He thanked the law enforcement partners for their participation in the Drive Sober or Get Pulled Over enforcement wave component of the campaign and opened the floor for questions.

Participants had the following questions and comments:

- Melissa asked for clarification on the voice choices for the radio adds.
 - o Chris said the voice choices were made based on the recommendations by the media vendor.
- Why is there not more being spent on social media?
 - Chris said the social media companies want to maintain a diverse advertisement space, so they limit the volume of ads that can be purchased by a single campaign.
- Tom Moffett, FLHSMV, asked what the total paid media budget was for the whole fiscal year?
 - o Chris said it is close to \$11 million.



Materials Approval and Update

Danny lead the coalition in a review of the DUI Diversion Program Fact Sheets, Medical Marijuana Poster Dispensary Poster, and Oral Fluid Testing Fact meet developed by the coalition.

The edits for each material are documented below.

DUI Diversion Program Fact Sheets

The coalition agreed to verify that each of the Judicial Circuits that do not specify the BAC caps participating in the diversion programs do not in fact have BAC caps for participation in each respective program. The following Judicial Circuits were identified for further verification:

- 8th
- 13th
- 11th
- 15th

The coalition agreed to add a disclaimer laying out the limitations of the fact sheets.

Medical Marijuana Poster

Todd Schimpf, Florida Department of Health (FDOH), said the poster is currently being reviewed by his agency.

Oral Fluid Testing Fact Sheet

The coalition agreed to change "pulled over" to "arrested."

Action Plan Report Out

Danny lead the coalition in the Action Plan Report out on the following goals. Updates to the Action Plan can be found in Appendix A:

Public Comment Period

Ellen Snelling, Tampa Alcohol Coalition, shared resources related to Florida Amendment 3, Marijuana Legalization Initiative, and said if coalition members want speakers related to that initiative to contact her. She emphasized that if Amendment 3 passes it will impact the coalition's work.



Wrap Up and Next Steps

Melissa shared with the coalition that FLHSMV submitted a State Electronic Data Collection (SEDC) grant application to upgrade FLHSMV's crash database. If approved, this five year project should start in December. As part of the update, feedback will be solicited on crash report revisions and to gather requirements to align with the 6th edition of the Model Minimum Uniform Crash Criteria (MUCC).

GOAL 2: PREVENTION

Objective 2A: Responsible Alcohol Service
