But when we are judged by the Lord, we are disciplined so that we may not be condemned along with the world. - 1 Corinthians 11:32

I. A STRONG REBUKE

- The church in Corinth is suffering from:
 - 1) Factions; 2) Gluttony and selfishness; 3) A lack of concern for the poor. The Lord's Supper has become only another meal that brings condemnation (Vss. 17-22).
- Paul offers no commendation for such inward-focused actions surrounding a sacrament (Vss. 17, 22).

II. THE LORD'S SUPPER—AN OVERVIEW

- Paul's instructions come from Jesus, not from oral tradition or personal experience, although oral tradition may also have been delivered to him (Vs. 23; Gal. 1:11-12; Eph. 3:3).
- At the "Last Supper," Jesus shared both bread and wine with his disciples. The bread represented his body, the wine, a new covenant in his blood (Vss. 24-25; Matt. 26:26-29; Mark 14:12-25; Luke 22:7-23; John 13-17).
- The sacrament/ordinance of the Lord's Supper is a visible, tangible, portrayal and proclamation of Jesus' sacrifice (Vs. 26).
- The entire communion gathering revolves around the events that took place "on the night when [Jesus] was betrayed."

III. A WARNING AND DIRECTIVE

- We should examine ourselves before partaking of the Lord's Supper. It is not just any other meal; it is a remembrance and a participation in the body and blood of Jesus (Vss. 27-29).
- Refusal to do so may lead to restorative discipline in the body of Christ (Vss. 30-32; 2 Thess. 3:14-15).
- We are to defer to one another. The Lord's Supper is about unity, fellowship, and remembrance (Vss. 33-34).

The Lord's Suppe Corinthians 11:17-3 August 31, 202 **KNOW**: The Lord's Supper is a serious sacrament. Unity is also a serious command of the Lord, as is caring for one another. The Lord's supper is about fellowship, unity, and remembrance. It is a participation in the body and blood of Jesus.

DO: Enter into Communion in a worthy manner.
