As soon as he had finished speaking to Saul, the soul of Jonathan was knit to the soul of David, and Jonathan loved him as his own soul. - 1 Samuel 18:1

#### I. AN OASIS IN THE DESERT

- In fleeing from King Saul, David retreated to the wilderness of the Judean desert. Many searched for him, but only Jonathan found him (1 Sam. 23:16).
- The biblical writer stresses that Jonathan, David's friend, is also Saul's son (1 Sam. 14:1-5, 43-46; 18:1-5).
- Faithfulness is the key to David and Jonathan's friendship. A shared faithfulness to God, and then, as an outgrowth of that commitment, faithfulness to one another (1 Sam. 20).
- Jonathan comes to David in his distress, and there he puts David's hand in God's hand (1 Sam. 23:16).

#### II. FAITHFUL FRIENDSHIPS IN THE LORD

- Friendships are based on faithfulness, humility, and self-sacrifice. Jonathan and David's had all three (1 Sam. 18:1-5; Matt. 18:1-5; John 15:12-17).
- Friendships are based on truthfulness as well. True friends speak into each other's lives. Acquaintances find offense when confronted truthfully, even if it is done in love (1 Sam. 20:1-4; 1 Cor. 15:33-34; Eph. 4:15-16).
- Christian marriages and friendship should go together. As should Christian families, partnerships, church relationships, etc. There is strength in friendship (Eccl. 4:9-12).

# III. WHAT A FRIEND WE HAVE IN JESUS

- Jesus commands us to love one another. This is what true friendship is built upon (John 15:12).
- Jonathan's friendship with David, the Lord's Anointed, is a shadow of the "friendship" we can have with Jesus, the Lord's Anointed (John 15:13-15).
- Friendship with Jesus is one-way. We are Jesus' friend if we follow him. Jesus demonstrates his love for us in his self-sacrifice (John 15:13).

onathan—No Love Greater 1 Samuel 18:1-5; 23:15-18 November 23, 2025 **KNOW**: Jonathan's commitment to David, who would replace him as crown prince of Israel, is counterintuitive. His commitment to the Lord was greater than his commitment to his own welfare. Jonathan is a reflection of the greater love and self-sacrifice of Christ.

**DO**: Find a friend in Jesus. Then practice Christian friendship.

- 5. What are the parameters of Jesus' love for his own disciples? (see John 15:12-17)
- 6. How do we appropriate this love of Jesus? What does it mean for us?
- 7. What are your application points from these passages?
