

“Simon, son of John, do you love me?” Peter was grieved because he said to him the third time, “Do you love me?” and he said to him, “Lord, you know everything; you know that I love you. Jesus said to him, “Feed my sheep.” - John 21:17

I. PETER—THE DEVELOPING CHRISTIAN

- Prior to his denial of Christ, Peter proved to be humble, wise and courageous (Matt. 16:13-19; Mark 1:16-20; Luke 5:7-11, 22:33; John 1:42, 18:10).
- Peter appears to have been a born leader. His encounter with Christ changed his heart immediately, but his courage and leadership grew gradually (Luke 5:8).
- Peter would lead the apostolic band both prior to and after Jesus’ death and resurrection (Matt. 14:28-29, 15:15, 17:1, 18:21, 19:27; Mark 5:37, 11:21; Luke 8:45, 12:41; John 6:68, 13:6-9; Acts 1:15-26, 2:37-41, 3:11-26, 15:6-11).

II. PETER—THE REDEEMED COWARD

- Peter went from “hero to zero” in a matter of hours. He is both you and me in a nutshell (cf. John 13:36-38, 18:15-18, 25-27).
- Whereas Judas felt sorry for himself and committed suicide, Peter felt sorry for his sin and was restored. One felt worldly sorrow, the other godly sorrow (Matt. 26:75, 27:3-10; 2 Cor. 7:10).

III. OUR ENCOUNTER WITH JESUS

- An encounter with Jesus changed Peter forever (1 Peter 1:3-9).
- Our encounter with Jesus produces in us:
 1. Faith (Mark 9:24),
 2. Repentance (Mark 14:72; Luke 19:8),
 3. New life (2 Cor. 5:17),
 4. Courage (Acts 21:13; Rev. 2:10),
 5. Endurance (Rom. 5:3; Phil. 1:6),
 6. Character producing hope (Rom. 5:4),
 7. Fruit of the Spirit (Gal. 5:22).

KNOW: Peter, like all of us, was flawed. He was also transformed by an encounter (and life) with Jesus. What he was, we are. What he became, we can be.

DO: Receive the grace and mercy of Jesus. Live like you've received them.
